Welcome everyone!

Do not panic!

- We do not want anybody worrying about these assessments. They are being scrapped after this year!
- It's important that the children know as little as possible about these tests. They will perform so much better without any worry/anxiety or stress.
- Their best is good enough. My teacher assessment will count for more than the assessments.

When, what and how?

- SATs will take place the two weeks before half term. Weeks bg. Mon 15th May and Mon 22nd May.
- They will be carried out in <u>small</u> groups with an adult close by.
- They are <u>NOT</u> timed.
- 4 assessment papers in total to assess **Reading** and **Maths**.

What about writing?

- •Is not 'tested' but children complete pieces of work throughout the year to give them their overall level BLW, WTS, EXS or GDS.
- Purely teacher judgement


Arithmetic Paper


- 20 questions
- Covers addition, subtraction, multiplication, division and fractions


Reasoning Paper

- Between 30/35 worded/problem solving questions
- Selection of questions covering all elements of the Year 2 mathematics curriculum
- Questions can be read to them (except key mathematical vocabulary)
- The paper starts off with 5 questions that are verbally read by the teacher



- Read your child's reading book weekly and stop them after a page of two. Think of questions to ask them about they've read.
- Complete homework.
- Write down a calculation and ask them to solve it.

Remember: they do not need to know about them! Don't panic or stress, they will all be absolutely AMAZING!

Other questions

- How will their score impact them at the juniors? It won't! It's just an extra bit of evidence to back up our own teacher judgement of where your child is working at either below, working towards, expected or greater depth. They barely look at them!
- Will my child be OK during them? Absolutely. Children can have breaks if need be and like I said before, they are not timed and there is no pressure whatsoever.

Other questions

- How important are they? At this point in the year, we know what your child is very likely to achieve at the end of the year based on what they've been like in class this is just a bit of extra paper to prove our judgements are right!
 They are getting scrapped next year due to new 'baselines' in Reception.
- Can you give my child some help? Unfortunately not but again, there's no pressure and we just say skip to the next question.

Other questions

 Why are some children not doing them? Some children are working below the expected standard in Year 2 so would find it extremely difficult to access them. They may have trouble reading the questions (during reading papers we cannot read the questions out) or the texts itself. Reading is the most common barrier. Again, this doesn't affect them in their juniors whatsoever. Year 3 teachers are always told where every child is working at and the steps going forward.
