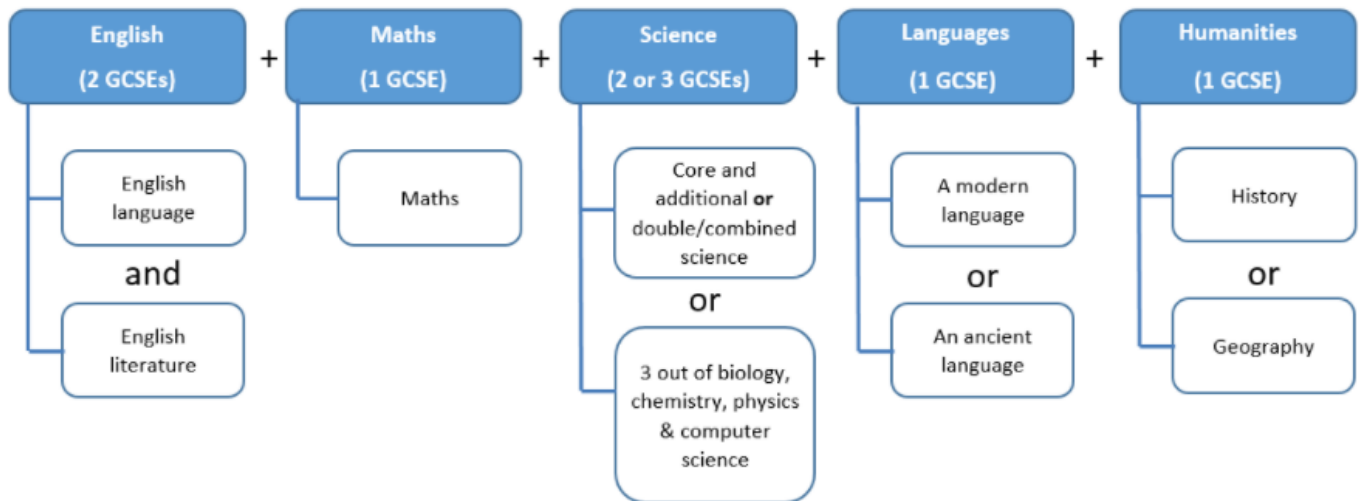


English Baccalaureate

The EBacc is a set of subjects at GCSE that keeps young people's options open for further study and future careers.

The EBacc is:



The EBacc is made up of the subjects which the Russell Group says at A Level, open doors to more degrees.

Research shows that a pupil's socio-economic background impacts the subjects they choose at GCSE, and that this determines their opportunities beyond school.

A study by the UCL Institute of Education shows that studying subjects included in the EBacc provides students

with greater opportunities in further education and increases the likelihood that a pupil will stay on in full-time education. Sutton Trust research reveals that studying the EBacc can help improve a young person's performance in English and Maths.
