Special presentations delivered by students from Jesus College, Cambridge University



Our Year 11 and Year 12 Most Able students attended two informative and inspirational presentations, delivered by students from Jesus College, University of Cambridge. They learned about life at prospects university, for future employment and the advantages of studying for a degree at Cambridge University.

The Year II presentation focused on encouraging students to think carefully

about what they would like to study at university, taking into account course structure, teaching style, examinations and later employment prospects. Our pupils were told to think carefully about their A-level choices in relation to the course and university choice. The presentation also highlighted the importance of exploring extra-curricular activities.

Our Year 12 pupils were given an overview of the application process at Cambridge, and how it differs from other universities. The presentation discussed the academic strengths that Cambridge are looking for in students, as well as offering practical advice on what students can be doing now to strengthen their applications. This included underlining what Cambridge admission tutors are looking for in a personal statement and how this may differ from other top universities. Pupils were also offered an insight in to the interview process and what happens after the interview. Both presentations also included a Q&A session, which helped to address issues relating to accommodation, finance and life at university.

Many thanks to Jesus College, University of Cambridge, for delivering these truly inspirational and informative presentations. We hope to encourage more of our Most Able cohort to follow in the footsteps of their predecessors and become Oxbridge students.

On Wednesday and Thursday this week, our Year 8 students developed their debating skills in a series of workshops led by experts in the field of Debating from the English-Speaking Union. This organisation was formed in the belief that more effective communication between nations would lead to improved global understanding. We too believe that all of us need to learn how to listen and evaluate the points of view of others. As a global community, we believe that we need to learn to disagree without being disagreeable, and we strongly believe that our children need to learn that what they think and what they have to say really

matters. The workshops were highly informative, allowing the students to develop their self-confidence, self-awareness, resilience and empathy. Teachers have been transferring the skills the students developed into their lessons and one Year 8 class have already started to debate the case for and against reducing our use of cars as transport.

Two teams represent Alperton in the Magistrates' Court Mock Trial Competition

Two teams of Year 8 and Year 9 students represented Alperton in the Magistrates' Court Mock Trial Competition on Saturday 9 March. It was the students' first experience of the legal system and they found it very enjoyable and engaging. They were well prepared for their competition as the Liaison Magistrate, Tim Harris, had organised a visit to Willesden Magistrates' Court for them in advance of the competition and they learnt a lot by observing other trials. Additionally, the English and Drama teachers, Ms Sidharh, Ms Jaffrey and Ms Wallace offered their support with the presentation.

The year 8 and 9 students studied a specially written case, and took on the roles of magistrates, defendants, witnesses, lawyers, legal advisers and ushers. The teams defended

and prosecuted the case over two rounds, winning three cases, with a split decision returned on the fourth case. They were supported and judged by experienced and practising magistrates, who were the legal advisers on the day. In his role as Defence Lawyer, Darshan (Year 9) was judged to be the best performer in Team One. Ilayda (Year 9), taking on the role of Prosecution Lawyer, was the winner in Team Two.

Tim Harris congratulated both of our teams for their commitment and skill and said:"the hard work you all had put in was so obvious in the way you performed". He also thanked them "for making this one of the best heats we have ever run at Willesden. It has never been closer in terms of the scoring".
