- Going away visiting other cities, going home








What are Top Universities looking for?


Choosing a course

- What are you enthusiastic about?
- Assessment method: modular exams, coursework or final exams?
- Broad or narrow range?

- If you don't know what course you'd like to study, which A Levels you can take to keep your options open




Why is A Level choice important?

- A Level choices have a significant impact on university course options available to you
- Inappropriate choices might restrict your options later, and reduce your chances of getting a place on the right course for you
- Admissions Tutors often prefer applicants to have taken particular subjects, or combinations of subjects, as these provide the best preparation for their courses

Arts and Social Sciences Courses: Two AS/A Levels in Arts and Two in Maths/Sciences will be fine

For Science-based Courses it's a little trickier – but you are still likely to find Science courses you can apply for, especially if you pair your sciences like this:

Biology with Chemistry (for biological/medical sciences)

Chemistry with Maths or Physics (for chemistry-based courses)

Maths with Further Maths or Physics (for maths/physics based courses)
