Is Textiles GCSE a good choice for me?

Textiles is ideal for students who enjoy **practical work** such as drawing and designing and physically making things. While **some written and analytical skills are required**, the emphasis of the course is on practical work.

We are looking for students who have a **passion and interest in Art and Textiles**. You must be willing to **work hard** as the subject is **coursework based**, so you must **be organised** with homework and **meet deadlines** set.

Lots of students choose to study **both** Textiles and Art at GCSE: The subjects compliment each other well.




Why should I study Textiles Design?

You will build skills in the following areas: •researching and evaluating textile artists; developing ideas inspired by their work.

•Observational drawings: there are many ways to record texture and tone in textiles such as using hand embroidery, mark making, painting with batik, needle felting and fabric collage.

•Creative making: you will develop skills on the sewing machine, printing techniques such as stenciling and working with recycled materials and heat manipulation.



Why should I study Textiles Design?

You will also develop the following skills studying Textiles. These **transferable skills** will help you do well in your other subjects too:

- the ability to work independently, set goals, manage your own wo and meet deadlines
- project management
- attention to detail
- the ability to work effectively with others through collaboration and team work
- communication and presentation
- the ability to work to deadlines
- research and analytical skills
- •resourcefulness.



What will I study in GCSE Textiles Design?

Component 1-Coursework : 60%

You will complete a coursework portfolio sketchbook and final pieces that link to your theme. Each piece of coursework is marked by the centre and moderated by the Exam Board.

Students will produce a portfolio that in total shows coverage of the four assessment objectives. It must include a project evidencing the journey from initial ideas to the realisation of intentions and a selection of further work undertaken during the student's course of study.

Projects most recently undertaken are Surfaces and Identity. You can choose to develop your own theme and explore art and textiles that is meaningful to you.


Component 2-Controlled Test : 40%

(A 10 hour practical make with theme chosen by the Exam Board) Students will respond to their chosen starting point from an externally set assignment paper relating to their subject title, evidencing coverage of all four assessment objectives.

Throughout the course students will be expected to work individually, and in groups, producing drawings and photographs, creating design work, experimenting with samples in a range of media, researching relevant designers and design movements, developing ideas to final pieces, and presenting work.






AO1 Critical understanding	Develop ideas through investigations, demonstrating critical understanding of sources.

The Fashion industry employs nearly a million people across a wide spectrum of roles and provides diverse opportunities for young people .


