

It has been another busy term with regards to sport with over 50 fixtures having been played across football, rugby and basketball as well as boys representing the School with distinction at Middlesex Rugby festivals and in the Borough Cross Country Championships.

In football all year groups have again entered the National Cup, County Cup and the Borough Leagues. Maths Trip

On Monday the 20th of November, 16 A level students travelled to central London to a Maths Inspiration Roadshow. The first lecture was Are you smarter than AI? given by Rob Eastaway. Puzzle-solving is one of the ways in which humans display their creativity and ingenuity. But is Artificial Intelligence set to become as good as, or even overtake, people at solving and setting puzzles? Rob Eastaway posed some of his favourite puzzles from the New Scientist magazine's weekly column to test our creativity and ingenuity – and then see how ChatGPT got on.

The second lecture was The Shape of Escape given by Aoife Hunt. How many people can you fit into a football stadium or a music festival? How quickly are they all going to be able to get out? These are important questions for event organisers, and mathematicians can help to answer them. Aoife Hunt showed how professional consultants use GCSE and AS Level maths to understand the movement of crowds – whether at Wembley Stadium, Glastonbury or Heathrow Airport. We looked at the connection between crowd flow and quadratic equations, and how computer games are being built to predict what you will do in an emergency.

The third lecture was The Sacred Geometry of Chance by Ben Sparks. In his Nineties song Shape of My Heart, Sting sang about a gambler finding beauty in the "hidden laws" of probability that govern poker. Mathematician and musician Ben Sparks uncovered some surprising hidden laws. He looked at how emotion, art and mathematics can go hand in hand despite the stereotypes It was an enjoyable day out and Year 12 started to see how mathematics is used in the real world.



Music Department



The Music Department has been very busy this term and had a really positive start to the new academic year. In November our choir performed with other choirs from schools in the Borough at Enfield Music Service & Choir Festival. The boys were brilliant and it was great to hear other local choirs perform too. We have begun plans for our Music Concert Tour in July 2024 to Belgium, which sold out in just one week!

A number of our students have done their music grade exams, and all passed which is absolutely fantastic! Well done to those students. We took our Music GCSE and Music Tec A Level students to an African Music Concert Series at Forty Hall during Black History Month, where the boys experienced different types of West African and Contemporary African Classical music and even got to have a go on some of the instruments themselves.

One of our Music Scholars did a Composition Master class at the Royal Academy of Music where he not only, composed his own music, but also had students from the Academy perform it!

Finally, as we build up to the end of the term, we took 12 of our students busking in Enfield Town Market Square Bandstand where they performed for 2 hours in the cold, to raise money for the North London Hospice. We raised over £120! It was a wonderful occasion and lovely to see friends, family and people from the community cheering us on. The following day, we did our spectacular Christmas Concert! The Hall looked magnificent thanks to our brilliant site team, and the boys rocked the night away performing some festive hits for a packed hall full to the brim with friendly faces. Thank you all so much to those who came along to support the boys!





Geography Department

Geography trip to Iceland

In September, We took a group of Geographers to Iceland for a look at the breathtaking geographical landscapes. Having studied topics including tectonic margins, volcanoes, earthquakes and so much more, it was great to see all the things we talk about in real life.

Although a lot of early starts, long day and lots of walking, no one seemed at all tired. All of our boys were very eager to explore and see, what is, a very different environment to what they are used to.

Over the course of the next few days, we saw some amazing sights. Stunning waterfalls, hot springs, volcanoes, we got up close with lava that is just a few years old, we took a trip to the Lava Centre, learning all about tectonics, stood right next to Gulfoss waterfall, had a dip in the 'Secret Lagoon' a geothermal pool, and saw the massive waves and beautiful black sand of Reynisfjara beach. Saw the direct impacts of climate change, through the retreat of a glacier. A truly unforgettable experience.

The waterfalls were especially a highlight. The mighty Gulfoss is always a delight. Skogafoss, included a climb up the side of the waterfall on steps, and none of us were expecting it to be quite so hard, even Mr Harcourt struggled, but the view at the top was definitely worth it. Another, Seljalandsfoss, included a trip behind its flow of water, that left us pretty soggy, but our boys loved it. We managed to stay dry for most of the trip, (other than one massive downpour in the Thingvellir Valley) so it was not too bad getting a bit damp.

I'm sure the boys will fondly remember the nightly Year 11 vs 13 water polo/rugby/handball games (not sure they gave their creation a name) in the pool. Running all the way to a grand final on the last night, it was great seeing everyone getting involved, even some of the other hotel residents were cheering the boys on, and a bond formed between boys of different year groups. Even when the rain came pouring down, they were in the pool, battling it out for the win. Iceland sent us off in style with a glimpse of the Northern Lights, even if the time of year meant they weren't as green as normal, they were still a delight.

Seeing the boys out in Iceland, showing true passion for geography made all of the planning worth it, and we hope they had a truly unforgettable experience that they will remember for the rest of their lives. Geography really is a lot more than just colouring in. Thanks to all for boys for being great representatives of our school throughout the trip.

Our garden club has spent the term, since September, weeding, pruning, planting, putting up a new greenhouse, collecting leaves for composting and more.....it's been busy!


To end the term we held a festive wreath-making session for the boys; it's creative and calming but also a lovely opportunity for us, as staff, to spend quality time with them.

The Gerald Bungey Scholarship - A moving story & remembrance





All of our sixth form students who enrol in degree programmes at universities receive a £100 scholarship in their second year as a consequence of a moving story about one of our former pupils, who tragically lost his life in the First World War.

Mrs Bungey and her late husband agreed to leave half their estate to provide a memorial to their son, Second Lieutenant Gerald Edward Bungey. The yearly funding for the award comes from interest paid each year on a bequest left to the Enfield Grammar School Foundation from the estate of Mrs Maude Bungey and is paid out by our Foundation Trustees who are part of our governance structure.


Gerald attended the EGS from 1911 to 1914 and was Captain of 1st Cricket team and Football Elevens, and runner of the mile and half-mile. Joining the army soon after the declaration of war in 1914, he was killed in action on 4th August during the Battle of the Somme at the young age of just 19 years, while fighting with the 14th Fusiliers.

It makes you reflect on all those young men (many just out of school) who never had the chance to go onto any type of further education or live out their lives.

In school we have a memorial to all those alumni who never came home; Gerald E Bungey is listed in the first column.

Enlisted in the Honourable Artillery Company in September 1914. Commissioned in 14th (Res) Bn. Royal Fusiliers April 1915. To France July 1916, joining 9th Bn. On the morning of 4 August the Bn. was in the Albert Defences. They received orders to attack Ration Trench with the 8th Royal Fusiliers and 7th Royal Sussex. They left the Albert Defences at 3pm and completed the relief by 6.30 pm, taking up positions in 4th Avenue (X3a95 – X3b89) and 3rd Avenue (X3c79- X3b54). The bn. went over the top at 9.15pm. A, C and D Companies attacked, with B moving into 4th Avenue behind them. A and C reached their objectives and linked with the 8th RFs. D Coy was held up by an unseen trench between the positions. Early on the morning of the 5th B placed a bombing stop in Ration Trench at R33d36. This was later attacked by Germans with flamethrowers and pushed back by 40 yards after vigorous fighting. The battalion suffered over 300 casualties.

Killed in action 4 August 1916. Age 19. Commemorated Pier and Face 8 C, 9 A and 16 A THIEVAL MEMORIAL.
