One of the things I have become increasingly clear about during this last year, is that it is the closeness of our school community and the sense of belonging that people have within it that has enabled us to work together so well. I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone - students, staff, parents and carers, governors - for all their contributions and support during this past year. I mentioned last week that there had been several Government announcements regarding the approach that would be taken in dealing with the ongoing pandemic in the new academic year, included in this information was the news that schools would be asked to test all students on their return to school in September, once before they enter classrooms, and again a few days later. Following those first two tests there is the expectation that students will conduct twice weekly tests at home. Following the success of many of our previous Young Writers, some forty five more of our students have become published writers and their work will feature in an anthology entitled *Unsolved:* Detective Talest. This is a great accolade for our students and staff, as we continue to have an important focus on practising extended writing skills.

This half term, the Marden High Health Ambassadors have been working in partnership with the YMCA to promote healthy habits in school. This group of year 9 students decided that mental health would be the focus of their project, and they specifically wanted to create something which would help the new cohort of year 7 students joining us in September. What then followed were five weeks of planning, filming, recording and editing a video to promote mental wellbeing and habits to aid in the transition from primary to secondary education. The Health Ambassadors used their own experiences and expertise, and interviewed staff to create a wonderful video which can be viewed here. We are very proud of what they have achieved, and as they can work on such a tight deadline, it's safe to say they may well have a future in the film and TV industry one day!

Our little concert had a mixture of treats from some of Mardens solo singers to the Yr 7 Ukulele Club, the Yr 8 Arts award and the Yr 9 Ensemble. We were also delighted to have some of the year 11 leavers, who returned to share some close harmony with us. A small but appreciative audience of teachers and fellow performers made for a lovely event. Here is to more music at Marden!

And finally ... our successful activity week drew to a close with students having the opportunity to pour an ice bucket over Mr Anderson and Mr Shields. In a streamed live event during form time, names were drawn out of a hat and two lucky students were able to pour the icy buckets to the loud cheers of their fellow students and even louder cheers from staff! 






Term three in Technology has once again been a busy one with students at Key Stage three focusing on finishing off practical projects before the summer holidays, with some excellent results!






Year 10 Design & Technology students have now started to complete their NEA coursework with students independently researching a topic assigned by AQA.

Unstuck...

As part of their Sherlock Holmes unit of work, Year 8 English students were given the task of becoming detectives themselves to solve this year's 'Marden She Wrote' case... Unstuck.

She hurriedly collected them and unsuspectingly placed them in the department cupboard ready to be given out at the end of the day. As a busy year draws to a close it's a great opportunity to reflect on this term's progress.

Year 11 left us having completed a series of assessments. The students all acquitted themselves very well and they produced some excellent work and tackled the situation in the mature way we have come to expect from Marden High students. It has been nice to see some of them return to take part in A-Level taster sessions looking at how fieldwork will be delivered in their further education.

Year 10 have just completed a series of mocks which they prepared for in excellent fashion. Many of them capitalise on some of those independent study skills which would have been emerging during lockdown. The results so far have been very encouraging and they should feel very proud about how they have ended the year.



Year 9 have been studying natural disasters this term and in their lessons we have been looking at some of the recent tectonic events which have taken place in Iceland and St Vincent. Students have compared the slow but dramatic eruption of Fagradalsfjall Volcano in Geldingadalur, which sits on a constructive plate margin with La Soufriere on the Caribbean island of St Vincent which sits on a destructive plate margin.





Year 9 students have done a great job of applying the work they have been doing in class to compare two volcanoes in areas of differing levels of economic development.



Our year 8 students have been honing their geographical skills and applying them to the narrative of surviving a zombie apocalypse. Who knew there was so much geography involved in surviving a zombie attack? Whether it's preparing for disaster, mapping evacuation routes or rebuilding settlements, our students are now well prepared for survival. We were lucky enough to put these skills to the test in some real world situations when the RAF delivered some disaster training based around their involvement in the search and rescue following hurricane Irma when it struck the British Virgin Islands in 2017. The course was delivered remotely by members of the RAF and they were very impressed by our students' problem solving skills and their teamwork.



Year 7 students have been looking at the impact of tourism around the world and reflecting on the reasons that people travel. They have been able to spend some time thinking about being more sustainable to reduce the impact on the world through their travel. Some of our students have designed some amazing ecotourism resorts and they have thought about the possibility of working in ecotourism as a future career.

Overall it's been a very productive year, our students have demonstrated commendable levels of resilience this year, they are a credit to the school community and teaching them in geography has been a real pleasure this year.

Enjoy a well earned break and we look forward to seeing everyone again in the Autumn term.

As we have moved into the summer term and certain covid restrictions have been lifted, we have been able to deliver a summer programme of activities. 









