Dear All,

We have a real treat in this half term's newsletter, which reflects some of the fantastic work our children have been doing. There is lots of amazing art work, and in particular I have been very impressed with the way Year 10 students have developed their landscape projects. There has been superb business acumen shown by the Enterprise Club, and there have been some fascinating local history investigations spanning two millennia, discovering the richness of our North Eastern heritage. There is so much more besides, and I am sure everyone will enjoy reading all about the students' achievements during these last seven weeks.

It has been advocated by experts for many years that if students can learn how to learn they will thrive in any educational or work setting. The ability and confidence to work independently will set any individual up for life. It is our role to nurture this and we are incredibly proud of the way our students have responded, with our support, to the demands of remote learning and have developed into much more independent learners as a result. While this is evident in lessons at the Langdale centre, students have also been transferring their skills to their Marden learning. Walking around either site, any observer would see a mix of teacher-led discussion, peer collaboration and autonomous working. It is also evident in the way that both Year 10 and Year 11 are approaching revision and their own individual approach to reviewing course content and preparing for exams. Year 10 students are in discussions with subject teachers about which revision books to buy and how to use them, and in Year 11 students are working out the most effective strategies to use in the coming months leading up to the summer exams. It has been brilliant to see so many students taking part in extracurricular clubs this half term. Alongside GCSE revision sessions a range of activities have taken place including Korean club, Russian and science club. The Gardening Environment club are continuing to develop the school garden and have set themselves the task of doing so whilst recycling as much plastic as possible. As mentioned, the Enterprise club has also had a successful half term making, marketing and selling Valentine's products in the run-up to Valentine's day and were sold out. If your child is interested in joining an extracurricular club please check the activities available on the website (https://www.mardenhigh.net/our-extra-curricular-activities/) and sign up via the SchoolGateway app. Also, please remember that homework club is on every afternoon at 3.15pm in the LRC, where staff are available to support students with their independent work.

There is the chance for students - as well as parents and carers - to get involved in the run-up to World Book Day with the Library Club's Half Term Literacy Challenges. There is a whole array of competitions to take part in over the half term break, and lots of house points to be won. From art challenges to 'Reading Selfies', a Costume Competition, to a 'Booky Bake-off', there are plenty of opportunities to celebrate reading, books and creativity. Ms Taylor has emailed students with the full menu of activities and entries can be sent to <u>libraryclub@mardenhigh.net</u>. There is also a group of students who are producing a video starring members of staff and students talking about some of their favourite books, which we look forward to watching on World Book Day.

Marden High PTA have met recently with a view to starting to get back to more face to face events, so look out for further details of the upcoming PTA quiz next half term. It will be wonderful to see parents and carers back in the school building especially as the PTA quizzes are always such fun. We look forward to seeing lots of people there.

Through our regular student voice meetings, we are able to ensure that students are listened to and that they enjoy that sense of participation and community we hold at the core of our values statement. Since the start of the new term we have met regularly with the Student Cabinet to encourage their autonomy in leading their own meetings and setting their own agenda, as we foster individuality and possibility. This is leading to great work being done by a large number of students to develop aspects of student communication, student wellbeing, fundraising and improving the environment. Alongside this, we have been meeting with students who have been enjoying their time at Langdale. Hearing their positive responses regarding the live streaming, the opportunities to deepen learning through research and expand their experiences through leading the management of learning through Google Classroom has allowed staff to continue with the aspects which work well and evolve those areas that can be enhanced further. Meanwhile, Mr Richards has been meeting form reps to ensure that our rewards are relevant, worthwhile, cost effective and inclusive. The Heads of Year are meeting their form reps too, building lines of communication amongst the student community so every student has a voice and can see that it is heard. Each of these meetings has produced valuable insight into student voice, student leadership and student participation which form the basis for future work with our children as they progress through school.

To enhance our pastoral support, we have commissioned the services of a school nurse for one morning per week to start after the half term break. The school nurse will support the school, parents and children with anything that stops them feeling safe, learning, attending, developing or growing. This might include support for anxiety, poor sleep, picky eating, low mood, establishing routines and boundaries at home, or bereavement, and anything else which relates to children's welfare. We are also delighted to have been selected as a "host school" for a new pilot initiative in North Tyneside called " Connect MHST", which aims to provide support for children with low to moderate emotional wellbeing needs. The team hopes to support a generation of children and young people to have the ability to cope with most of life's ups and downs. The Connect MHST will help students, parents, carers and staff to develop their self-care and self-awareness skills, and know how best to support their own emotional wellbeing. Finally, I would like to thank everyone again for all the hard work and dedication shown this half term - students, staff, parents and carers, and governors. It has been a challenging but successful and rewarding one, and we look forward to seeing everybody back on the Marden site after the half term break. I hope that staff and students get a well earned break and I hope that parents and carers are able to spend some quality time with their children.

Launch of the Chronicle 'Our School' Journalism Project







We have started the term with an exciting illustration and design brief for our year 7's 'Monster Creations'. After looking at famous doodle artists Jon Burgerman and Mr Doodle we are developing experimental techniques with tempura blocks and brushos to help encourage imagination whilst inspiring a well developed character design. These creations will be built from scratch taking into consideration habitat, diet and key characteristics. This will include storyboarding along with deep look into the character's personality to develop a visual idea of the character's physical features. These processes take a lot of creative energy and replicate those used by game designers, illustrators and animation designers. 























YR 8

Students have been working very hard in their 'Truly Scrumptious' task booklets between sites and have produced some fantastic outcomes. We are looking at food as our new topic theme with individuals focusing on their favourite edible items. The skill focus for the term is observational drawing, digital design, shading and 3D construction. Pupils have impressed us with their independently produced outcomes and determination to refine each task to the best of their ability. We will be exploring the idea of popular culture, pigmentation and colour experimental processes with the aim to produce a collaboration piece using 3D design elements. This way of working helps in careers such as Graphic Designer and Architect along with many others.

We have turned our year 9's into shoe designers in recent weeks focusing all our tasks and ideas around their favourite types of footwear. Our goal is to develop skills in drawing, design, digital art, stop motion whilst incorporating all the foundation elements of art along the way. We aim to create original footwear designs from each student which we will later develop into a ceramic final piece. Our starting point has been to sketch designs, select a range of mediums and patterns, and complete observational studies to help refine their understanding of mark making, shape line and form. Some elements of photography will come into this body of work along with editing software to support their ideas. 
The past few weeks we have been doubling down on our focus towards careers, our Year 9's have been carefully considering their GCSE choices whilst our Year 11's are planning for their futures after Marden with content in lessons being attributed to real world scenarios and potential careers, this has also been the case with some of our extra-curricular sessions.

As an effort to bring the career paths available we have been running Careers in Computing Masterclasses sessions after school, open to students in Years 9, 10 and 11. Students who feel they may have a penchant for Computing have been able to put their knowledge to the test and begin to develop skills they wouldn't likely see anywhere else.

One of the efforts to bring careers into the spotlight has been our Careers in Computing masterclasses after school. These sessions have been open to all students in Years 9, 10 and 11. The purpose of these masterclasses is to highlight the careers available in the field and provides the opportunity to practice some of these skills that may not be covered in the national curriculum.



The masterclasses have so far covered careers and skills in Computer Forensics, where students have been conducting an investigation to trace the exact location of a single photo from the internet, using whatever software and techniques are available on the average home computer. A few of our students were able to discover the exact location, time of day and exact model of the device that took the photo. Students have mentioned that the experience has highlighted the importance of data privacy and how even the most mundane photo taken on a phone may contain location data.



The Masterclass students have recently looked at Digital Art and Design, exploring 2D design and 3D modelling design, something that is a commonly required skill for CGI and Video game design.

Our Year 7 students have been wrapping up their History of Computing topic, students have thoroughly enjoyed their time-travelling trip throughout the Industrial, War, Atomic and Information eras in relation to Computing and getting to know the influential figures such as Alan Turing. Ada Lovelace and Hedy Lamarr and their exceptional and sometimes surprising impacts on the world. These students have been very keen to learn about recent events in more detail, such as the panic of the Y2K bug and the rise of Artificial Intelligence, all whilst improving on their research skills, something which will no doubt stand them in good stead in other subjects such as History and English.

Finally our Year 8 and 9 students have been making the most out of their blended learning situation, due to having access to chromebooks the ability to research and communicate via technology has visibly improved, as has their understanding and capability for digital literacy. Whilst Year 8 have been working on their creative and audience-focus skills with their promotional materials topic. Meanwhile Year 9 students have been recently looking into How a Computer works, including the purpose of a network including how to build one.

Another busy time within the Maths department with year 11 students having just finished their mock exams. They should be looking at the feedback from each test and focussing on any amber topics to ensure they continue moving forward in preparation for next year. We have also had to up roots for a couple of months to the portacabins which has been christened Mathstropolis. In addition to this we have been working hard ensuring that remote lessons at the Langdale are delivered to the highest standard.

Edexcel have finally released their guidance on the Maths GCSE taking place in the summer and I have to say it is really useful and will give students a focus on topics for each exam so they must take heed of this and ensure they're getting the most out of their final months. As always the aftermath is running well and takes place after school on Monday to support the students.



In form time on a Thursday, students have continued to work on their numeracy skills. They have been completing questions from <u>The Daily</u> <u>Rigour</u> - a free weekly numeracy newspaper which focuses on news stories in the last week and the numbers behind them. The aims of the newspaper include enabling students to develop their numeracy skills and to apply them in new and unfamiliar contexts and encouraging students to take an interest in the news. In the last couple of weeks they have seen how a per hour wage increase affects an annual income; the impact of the rise in national insurance (see example below) and the change in the energy price cap. For a recent House Challenge students have been tasked by Mrs Goldie with designing their own Daily Rigour type questions which will be used in form time after half-term.

National Insurance: No 10 insists planned rise will go ahead

Downing Street has insisted the planned rise in National Insurance will go ahead after a number of Tory MPs called for it to be paused or scrapped. The increase is due to come into

effect in April to help fund the NHS and social care.

Currently, a UK worker pays approximately £1.14 in the pound for National Insurance.

This will rise to £1.25 although anyone that earns less than £9880 will not have to pay any.

In the current system, an employee who earns £20 000 per year has to pay £1251.



This will rise by £89 in April.


Jumping on the Wordle bandwagon, Y10 and Y11 have had a go at the French version of the game over the last few weeks - always great to get in more vocabulary practice!
