Dear All,

Preparations for our Creativity Festival in the last week of this term are going well, with Mrs Berriman and Ms Olbrecht having arranged a rich and diverse array of activities for students, including a number of exciting outside organisations coming into school for the Festival as well as trips out of school. The idea behind the Festival is to demonstrate and celebrate the skills that our young people have developed across this year, as well as to kick start an exciting year next year when our staff will be developing further creative approaches to Teaching and Learning in order to enhance further outcomes for students. We are exploring the idea of a small contribution in the region of £5 from each student to help with the costs of organising the festival, which I'm sure will provide a fitting celebratory finale to our school year.

We speak often of hope, leadership and agency within our school community and as the summer term reaches its halfway point, it is time again to see our young leaders, full of hope, be the agents of change as our Year 10 students apply for the position of prefect. The purple tie is the outward sign that our students are prefects but it is the behaviour and standards shown by those in post that really reflect that position of leadership. It has been heartening to see our student community demonstrate the leadership qualities that are admirable and desirable in any post holder; integrity, inclusivity, creativity, authority and being supportive towards others. I look forward to the launch of the prefect application process on the 6th of June when we will hold a special assembly with Year 10, inviting them to make an application and to put themselves forward for the role of prefects and senior prefects.

We have now become quite used to the work on our roofs going on around us. There are effectively five main roofs on our school building and the decision has had to be made to replace all of them. The work is going well and is on schedule for completion early in the Autumn term. Whilst we have clearly had to make adaptations to the rooms we use, and to our movement around the site, when we consider the enormity of the work being undertaken, disruption and intrusion into lessons has been minimal, thanks again to the consummate efforts of staff and students to focus on the learning. Once the GCSE exams have finished we will see the Portakabins leave site and the return of all lessons to the main building, which will be another welcome move towards normality. In the week after half term, our theme will be Global Citizenship. Part of being a global citizen is developing a moral compass that informs our actions and interactions, and key to this is empathy. During this week's Boys Network session, the group considered empathy, with their mentors and discussed how and when we show empathy, the power of empathy and applied it to both real life scenarios they encounter now, as well as hypothetical situations they may encounter in future careers. Continuing to develop careers information, advice and guidance is one of our whole school priorities, and the Boys' and Girls' Networks remain two key programmes which support this priority. With any piece of work and experience undertaken by our students, the uploading of evidence on to GlobalBridge will provide the record of achievement students can use to reflect on their experiences and to prepare for the next stage of their education and employment.

Later this term we have an exciting opportunity coming up for Year 10 students to travel down to Cambridge University where they will stay at Jesus College, getting the chance to experience university life. Our students will have the opportunity to interact and spend time with undergraduates and academics from the university, and, through a range of social and academic activities, the hope is to broaden students' perspectives and encourage them to realise their potential ahead of their final GCSE year.

Next half term we are going to be recruiting a team of 'Student Ambassadors' from Years 9 and 10 to help support and mentor our younger students in developing their understanding and use of Globalbridge. Being a Student Ambassador will look very impressive on any Globalbridge profile and will help our young people to really stand out from the crowd when applying for further and higher education courses and future employment opportunities. So what makes a good Student Ambassador? Successful Ambassadors will be enthusiastic and active participants in Globabridge. They will be reliable and committed, and have good communication and people skills. Of course, these are also skills and attributes which will also be very well developed by becoming a Globalbridge Ambassador. Students will also need to be flexible and be able to take initiative when things don't necessarily go to plan. Students will receive further information about this great opportunity directly.

We are now in the midst of the GCSE exams and I am glad to report that they are going very well. Our students have continued with their excellent attitude and mature approach. Looking ahead, examination results will be available to collect in person on Thursday 25 August between 9.00am and 11.00am. If any student is away on results day, they can authorise someone else to collect their results on their behalf or they can get their results emailed to them via their school email address. If this is the case, they will need to fill in a form prior to results day, authorising a named person, who will need to bring suitable identification, to collect their results. It would be wonderful to see all our Year 11 students on this day, as it is another of those key rites of passage, and there is always a great celebratory atmosphere.

Over the past few months our Year 8 and Year 11 students have been working with the music group Ex Easter Island Head and the educational charity Hand Of, building their own instruments and making their own music as part of a music, arts and heritage project. The final performance by the students will be taking place on the 13th July, 7:30pm at the Whitley Bay Playhouse. # Year 7

Year 7 completed their "Monster Creations" last term and we had some outstanding outcomes across the classwork and the homework projects. We are very proud of their ability to Our terms topic is "Creepy Crawlies" and students have been very excited by the messy, experimental work we have started creating. We are exploring shape, form, texture and symmetry with elements of pen & ink, painting, drawing and card construction. We are working on layering the pages and working the surfaces for a more dynamic starting point to help pupils understand how to create better depth and interest in their outcomes. They have explored mixed media, collage and stencil work to form patterns and mark making on their outcomes. They have had more advanced drawing practice using grid drawing techniques, continuous line and speed drawing to develop their observational and fine motor skills.



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
# Year 8

Our Year 8's completed their "Truly Scrumptious" topic which included building their skills further in grid drawing, observational studies, painting, coloured pencil work, blending, understanding tonal ranges and mark making. We explored colour theory further including using complementary and analogues of colour to create harmonious pieces which stand out. They developed their understanding of developing a 2D form in a 3D one with their cupcake designs. We are now building some cultural capital focusing on our local area for a "Northern Landscapes" project. Students will be developing skills in Photography, painting, drawing, blending and painting to create a range of pieces which show a well developed understanding of rhythm, composition, colour and representation of a landscape which has meaning to them.





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# Year 9


Year 9 recently completed their "Trainers" project which explored values, texture, outlines, composition, a wide range of drawing techniques, ceramics and mixed media. They developed personal outcomes based on their favourite footwear then developed their sketches into 3D final pieces. Our topic this term is "wreck this book" which gives students a good understanding of how we work at GCSE. Themes are unique and based on students passions and interests. We will explore collage, monochromatic, analogues of colour, blackout poetry and Photography. Each section of their book will be carefully planned out and created in a medium of their choice with the overall theme running through the whole body of work. The book itself will become the final piece of work and should reflect the skills from their time in KS3. We look forward to seeing the pieces develop and will post images into the Art & Design Gallery as soon as we can.





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#### Pair of Star-Crossed Lovers | Fashion, Textiles & Storytelling

Everyone tells stories. Ancient Greek myths and the fairy tales of our childhood taught us how to relate to certain values and how the impact of stories shapes our lives. So, when fashion designers and brands use these very same narratives, they become storytellers and clothes come to life.

A designer using storytelling as inspiration is the first step in forging the connection between the consumer and an individual piece of apparel. Recognising a character or a story in the details of a garment attracts a consumer immediately before they even decide whether they truly like the garment in full. When storytelling in fashion is done right, it opens up a whole world of creativity.

Just like timeless stories, fashion can create influences, and characteristics and illustrate certain values to escape the mundane. Clothes can become the door for an audience to experience alternate realities. Where there is fantasy, there can be fashion.

This project in most of its parts is about reinvention, interpretation and storytelling using fashion as the platform.



This project will appeal to those who enjoy getting hands-on with the making part of the fashion process. Students were challenged to use the famous piece, 'Romeo & Juliet', as inspiration for their work – researching and exploring parts of the story which resonated with them to create a customised panel of fabric for a top-secret finished garment.

They used techniques such as embroidery, hand and machine sewing, applique, and embellishment to personalise their panel. Their panel would be unique to them and their own personal representation of the story, but it will be sewn together along with those panels from other students to reveal one final exciting garment.

## The Process:

As part of the TICE experience, students were encouraged to share some 'behind the scenes' footage of them working on their projects. Take a look

This term in Computing:

Our students have been hard at work these past few weeks developing skills that will see them into a bright future. Meanwhile building up their confidence in the subject and exploring different technologies with their peers.

In Year 8 students have been exploring and developing their Python programming skills, creating shapes, drawings and landscapes using a turtle called Albert. We then progressed to a PRIMM based learning environment where students look at program code and predict what they think will happen. They are then encouraged to run the code and investigate the syntax, followed by modifying the program and then demonstrating their skills by making a new program.

Our Year 9 students are delving deeper into the careers available to them in the digital industry. Mark Wardle, Head of App Development at GlobalBridge came into school to chat with the students about what its like to work in App Development. This complemented the unit of work the Year 9's are currently doing in class.



Meanwhile the Year 10 students are working tirelessly on building their understanding of Architecture of a Computer, and coming to terms with the small details of how each small component works and it's impact on the Computer system as a whole.

The Year 11 students have been working incredibly hard attending programming revision classes, deepening their understanding for their summer exams. I wish them all the luck they deserve.

The aim is to help everyone feel positive about numbers. National Numeracy Day celebrates the importance of numbers for children and adults and inspires everyone to improve their numeracy in order to open up opportunities and brighter futures – and this year it celebrated its 5th birthday! In form time, students discussed what it means to be numerate and the issues caused by low levels of numeracy in the UK workforce - 49% only have the numeracy we'd expect of primary school children. They also talked about their number stories as part of the Big Number Natter. The day saw the launch of Marden's own weekly numeracy newspaper and edition one can be seen below. ## An Exciting Opportunity for a Summer Term Trip!

Students are invited to take part in a full-day creative workshop in July at The Sill in the Northumberland National Park.

What does the workshop entail?


