All Saints Tour New HART Base

Some of our children were given a behind-the-scenes experience yesterday as they visited the brand-new home of our Liverpool Hazardous Area Response Team (HART) in Anfield.

The children experienced a guided tour of the new facility, where they had the opportunity to see their artwork proudly displayed on the walls. This marked their connection to the local community and the life-saving work of the ambulance service over the last fourteen months.

During their visit, the pupils explored the incident response vehicles and tried on some of the specialist equipment used by HART paramedics in emergency incidents. They also practiced CPR on some mannequins, learning essential life-saving skills in a fun and interactive way.

One of the highlights of the day was seeing a rescue from height demonstration, where the children saw first-hand what's involved in a specialist rescue carried out by the HART Team.

The visit also included a trip to the site where the school had planted time capsules this time last year, and they got to meet the mascot Pandamedic.

Roadworks

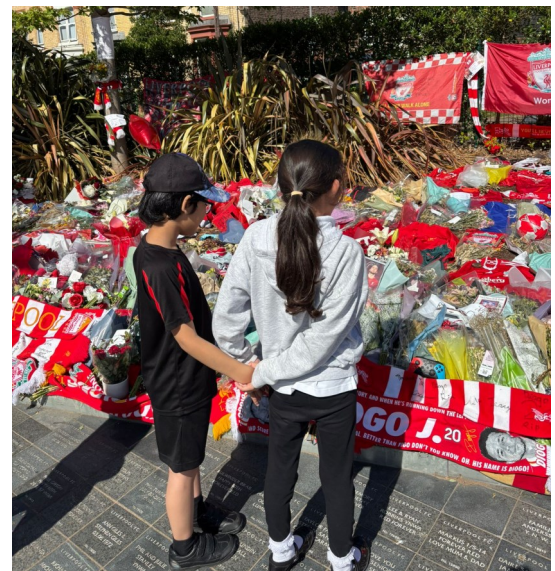
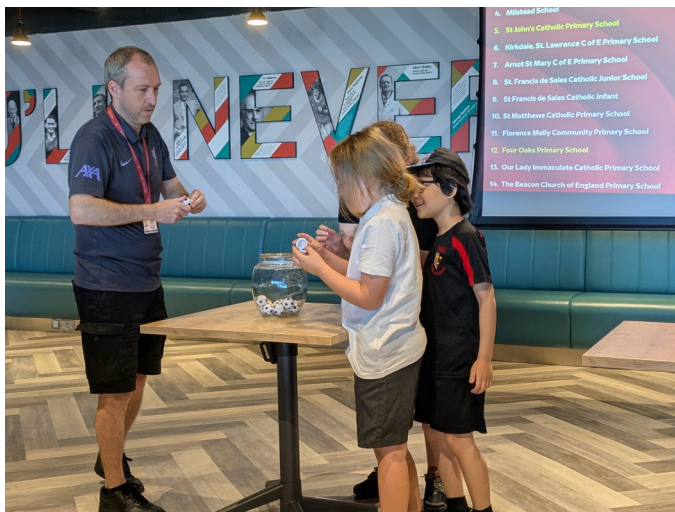

Supervision After School Hours

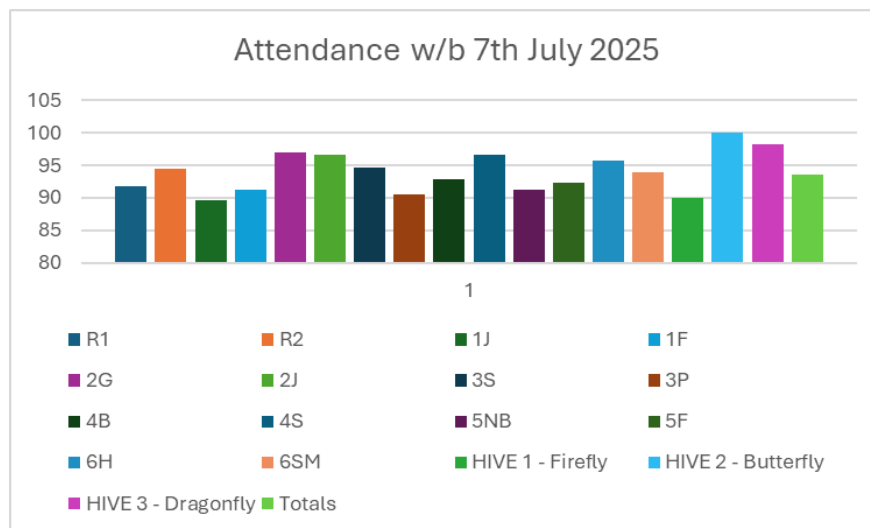

For safety reasons, any child who is not collected by 3:45 PM will be placed in our Night Owls provision. This ensures that all children are supervised in a safe environment until they can be picked up. Please note that there is a £10 charge for this service, which will be billed to parents. We appreciate your cooperation in ensuring that all children are picked up on time and that our school remains a safe and secure place for everyone.

Prayer and Liturgy

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

This week we hear how a Good Samaritan helped a man who was hurt when a Priest and a Levite had both ignored him. Let's think about who our neighbour is and how Jesus shows us that we should help anyone in need.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 10:25-37

A teacher of the Law came up and tried to trap Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to receive eternal life?"

Jesus answered him, "What do the Scriptures say? How do you interpret them?"

The man answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind'; and 'Love your neighbour as you love yourself.'" "You are right," Jesus replied; "do this and you will live." But the teacher of the Law wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbour?"

Jesus answered, "There was once a man who was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho when robbers attacked him, stripped him, and beat him up, leaving him half dead. It so happened that a priest was going down that road; but when he saw the man, he walked on by, on the other side. In the same way a Levite also came there, went over and looked at the man, and then walked on by, on the other side. But a Samaritan who was travelling that way came upon the man, and when he saw him, his heart was filled with pity. He went over to him, poured oil and wine on his wounds and bandaged them; then he put the man on his own animal and took him to an inn, where he took care of him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Take care of him,' he told the innkeeper, 'And when I come back this way, I will pay you whatever else you spend on him.'" And Jesus concluded, "In your opinion, which of these three acted like a neighbour towards the man attacked by the robbers?" The teacher of the Law answered, "The one who was kind to him." Jesus replied, "You go, then, and do the same."

A man asks Jesus who his neighbour is. Who should he be loving and caring for? So Jesus tells a parable – a special story – to explain.

A man is travelling to Jericho when he meets some robbers who beat him up, take all his money and then leave him injured on the side of the road. A priest and a Levite (the Levites helped the priests in the Temple) see the wounded man, deliberately cross over the road and walk on by. Do you think this is the right choice for these important people to make? Why/why not? What would you do if you came across someone who was hurt, unwell or sad? Then Jesus says that a Samaritan (the Jewish people and the Samaritans didn't get along) saw the man on the ground. He felt sorry for the injured man and went to help him. What did the Samaritan do for the man on the ground? Why do you think the Samaritan wanted to help the injured man? Imagine you are the man who is hurt and lying on the ground and the Samaritan is helping you. What would you think and feel? You might be very surprised because Samaritans and Jews didn't usually talk to each other or help each other. Next, the Samaritan takes the man to an inn to rest, he pays the innkeeper and promises to return to pay any more expenses. When he has finished the story, Jesus asks who the better neighbour is. The priest, the Levite or the Samaritan? What do you think the answer is and why? What does this story tell us about how we should treat people?

Jesus is saying that everyone is our neighbour, no matter where they come from, or where in the world they live. At the end of the story Jesus tells the man who asked the question about who our neighbour is to go and do the same as the Samaritan. This what we are all called to do – to try and help one another.

Our gospel story today shows us that everyone is our neighbour in Christ. How will you show your love for your neighbours both here and around the world in the coming week? What will you do?

Loving God,
help us to see that all people
throughout the world are our neighbours.
Grant that we may be ready to help anyone in need,
whether they live near or far from us.
Amen.
