Flu Vaccination


Your child's annual flu vaccination is now due. This vaccination is recommended to help protect your child against flu. Flu can be an unpleasant illness and sometimes causes serious complications. Vaccinating your child will also help to protect more vulnerable family and friends by preventing the spread of flu. Even if your child had the vaccine last year, we still recommend that they have the flu vaccine again this year. Flu viruses can vary each winter, so it is recommended to have it again this year or they won't be protected.

Attendance and Punctuality

Please report any absences before 9.00am via Seesaw or telephone call. If you have any difficulties getting your child to school and especially around lateness please contact Mrs Kelly. If you are taking your child out of school during the school day, you must show a letter/email/appointment card. Please do your best to make appointments outside of school hours.


Absence Reporting - Seesaw

When reporting an absence please make sure you select both the 'Absence Reporting' and 'School Office' options as well as your class teacher. This will ensure the right staff are receiving the information needed and you are not being contacted unnecessarily. If you are sharing information regarding collection of a child or appointments they may have, please make sure you select the 'School Office' option as well as your class teacher. Thank you!

Supervision After School Hours

We would like to remind you of our after-school supervision policy to ensure the safety and well-being of all our students. Please be aware that there is no supervision available for children after the end of the school day. It is important that all children are picked up promptly at the end of their school day.

For safety reasons, any child who is not collected by 3:30pm will be placed in our Night Owls provision. This ensures that all children are supervised in a safe environment until they can be picked up. Please note that there is a £10 charge for this service, which will be billed to parents. We appreciate your cooperation in ensuring that all children are picked up on time and that our school remains a safe and secure place for everyone. Prayer and Liturgy Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

This week we hear the story of two men, one of whom is rich and feasts every day on good food. The other man, Lazarus, is poor and he longs for something to eat. This story helps us to see how we should treat one another.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to St Luke 16:19-31

There was once a rich man who dressed in the most expensive clothes and lived in great luxury every day. There was also a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who used to be brought to the rich man's door, hoping to eat the bits of food that fell from the rich man's table. Even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried by the angels to sit beside Abraham at the feast in heaven. The rich man died and was buried, and in Hades, where he was in great pain, he looked up and saw Abraham far away, with Lazarus at his side. So he called out "Father Abraham! Take pity on me, and send Lazarus to dip his finger in some water and cool my tongue, because I am in great pain in this fire!"

But Abraham said, "Remember my son, that in your lifetime you were given all the good things, while Lazarus got all the bad things. But now he is enjoying himself here, while you are in pain. Besides all that, there is a deep pit lying between us, so that those who want to cross over from here to you cannot do so, nor can anyone cross over to us from where you are." The rich man said, "Then I beg you, Father Abraham, send Lazarus to my father's house, where I have five brothers. Let him go and warn them so that they, at least, will not come to this place of pain." Abraham said, "Your brothers have Moses and the prophets to warn them; your brothers should listen to what they say." The rich man answered, "That is not enough, Father Abraham! But if someone were to rise from death and go to them, then they would turn from their sins." But Abraham said, "If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone were to rise from death."

The rich man wears fine clothes and feasts every day on the best food that he can get. He has more than he needs. Lazarus sits outside the rich man's gate. He is poor and he is hungry. He is also sick. He wishes that he could eat the leftovers that fall from the rich man's table. What does the rich man do to help Lazarus? How do you think Lazarus feels about being ignored while the rich man eats his tasty food?

What do you think about how the rich man treats Lazarus? What do you think the rich man should do? Can you think of a time when you have ignored someone? Or a time when you have been ignored? How did you feel? We all have times when we could help others. We all have times when we need some support.

Why do you think Jesus told this story? God created the world with enough food for everyone. But we are not sharing fairly. Some of us are like the rich man and we have more food than we can eat. Some of us are like Lazarus and go to bed hungry every night. How does hearing this make you feel? What do you think we can do to make sure everyone has enough to eat? We can take no more than we need, share what we have and call on people in power to make sure that everyone has the food that they need. Every single person in the world is special. We are all loved by God. And every single person in our big global family has the right to enough food to live a healthy life. But some of us aren't able to get enough food. This is a big problem, and it's not easy to solve. Sometimes when something is difficult we ignore it, hoping that the problem will go away. Can you think of a time when you've hoped a problem would just go away? What happened? The rich man in Jesus' story is a bit like this. He ignores Lazarus, even though Lazarus is right outside his gate. God calls us to give what we can, of our time and our talents and our money, and to do all that we can to help each other get enough to eat. God asks us not to ignore each other, but to help one another.

How can you work together with others locally and around the world to make sure that all the members of our global family have enough food to eat? How will you help to build a better world?

Generous God, you created the world with enough food for all people, but we have not shared fairly. Help us to play our part I n building a better world, where all have enough to eat, just as you intended. Amen.

Children are rewarding, stimulating and fun, but looking after them can be stressful and challenging.

The Nurturing Programme helps deal with those challenges so that you can have a calmer, happier life.

A tried and tested programme, it helps us think about what we do, why we do it and how it makes us feel.

The Building Blocks of the Nurturing Programme

What does it cover?

Over the 10-week Programme, you will look at lots of different topics, including:

- Understanding why children behave as they do
- Recognising the feelings behind behaviour (ours and theirs)
- · Exploring different approaches to discipline
- Finding ways to develop co-operation and selfdiscipline in children
- Learning the importance of looking after ourselves


