All Saints' Commitment to Healthy Packed Lunches

At All Saints, we're dedicated to nurturing not only the minds but also the bodies of our children. As part of our mission to promote healthy habits and well-being, we kindly ask families to support our approach to nutritious packed lunches.

What Makes a Great Packed Lunch?

- Fruit and Vegetables: At least one portion of each to keep energy levels up and minds focused.
- · Protein: Non-dairy sources like lentils, chickpeas, hummus, or falafel are great options!
- Oily Fish: Such as tuna or salmon—once a week is ideal.
- Starchy Foods: Wholemeal bread, pasta, rice, couscous, noodles, wraps, or potatoes.
- Dairy: Milk, cheese, yoghurt, or fromage frais.
- Drinks: Water or pure fruit juice (no fizzy or sugary drinks, please).

Foods to Avoid or Limit

To support healthy choices and reduce sugar, salt, and saturated fats, we ask that you avoid or limit the following:

- Crisps, chocolate bars, sweets, processed meats or fizzy drinks
- · Cakes, pastries, or biscuits

Instead, consider:

- · Fresh or dried fruit
- Vegetable sticks
- Plain rice cakes or breadsticks
- · Small cheese portions

Important Reminders

- No nuts or nut products of any kind due to allergies (this includes Nutella and Kinder Bueno).
- No food sharing to protect children with allergies.
- · No sweets due to dental care.

Farm Visit

Children from Butterfly and Firefly visited Kindling Farm, Tarbock Green. The visit funded by DEFRA (Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs) allowed the children to have an insight to the workings of an arable farm. Arable farms focus purely on the growth of crops. At Kindling Farm, we saw a wide range of vegetables such as Pumpkins, Beetroot and Spring Onions. They are planting apple trees to produce apples in the future. The children explored the fields and were able to explore the sounds and tastes of the farm. At the end of the visit the children sat round a campfire and enjoyed hot chocolate and freshly made popcorn.











Year 4 Art Project

This week students in 4S were visited by artist group Amigo and Amigo to take part in a workshop creating dandelions. This links to the group's piece that will be on display at the River of Light next week. The workshop was organised by Culture Liverpool and the children really enjoyed it. 


Absence Reporting - Seesaw

Supervision After School Hours

We would like to remind you of our after-school supervision policy to ensure the safety and well-being of all our students. Please be aware that there is no supervision available for children after the end of the school day. It is important that all children are picked up promptly at the end of their school day. For safety reasons, any child who is not collected by 3:30pm will be placed in our Night Owls provision. This ensures that all children are supervised in a safe environment until they can be picked up. Please note that there is a £10 charge for this service, which will be billed to parents. We appreciate your cooperation in ensuring that all children are picked up on time and that our school remains a safe and secure place for everyone. Prayer and Liturgy Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus tells us a story about a Pharisee and a Tax Collector which teaches us how to pray and have a good heart.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 18: 9-14

Jesus also told this parable to people who were sure of their own goodness and despised everybody else. "Once there were two men who went up to the Temple to pray: one was a Pharisee, the other a tax collector.

The Pharisee stood apart by himself and prayed, 'I thank you, God, that I am not greedy, dishonest, or an adulterer, like everybody else. I thank you that I am not like that tax collector over there. I fast two days a week, and I give you a tenth of all my income.'

But the tax collector stood at a distance and would not even raise his face to heaven, but beat on his breast and said, 'God, have pity on me, a sinner!' I tell you," said Jesus, "the tax collector and not the Pharisee, was in the right with God when he went home. For those who make themselves great will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be made great."

The Pharisee goes to the Temple to pray, but what does he say and how does he feel? The Pharisee is full of pride. He thinks he's brilliant, that he's done everything right and that God must love him very much.

Then a tax collector comes to pray. But what does he say and how does he feel? The tax collector is humble and sorry. He know that he has done wrong and he asks God for forgiveness.

Jesus wanted the Pharisees (religious leaders) and us, to understand that the things that we say when we pray are not as important as what is in our hearts, what we're thinking and feeling deep down.

The Pharisees thought that the way to enter God's Kingdom was by keeping a lot of rules and by making new rules. The Pharisees thought that all the people who didn't keep their rules were bad and unacceptable to God.

There is nothing wrong with rules. Every family, school, church and organisation has them. We need rules. I'm sure that you have rules at home. Does anyone want to share one of their home rules? What about school rules? Who wants to share a rule that you have in your class?

Why do you think we need some rules in life? Rules are here to guide us and help us not to hurt ourselves or others. Rules should help us to keep ourselves safe and to think about what other people need. We should always care about other people.

Yet, there is something wrong with thinking we are better than other people, just because we keep the rules. We all do things wrong sometimes. We need to own up, say sorry and accept that although others are different to us, they are still loved by God.

The two men behaved very differently in the temple that day, didn't they? The Pharisee was proud and thought he knew better than other people. The tax collector knew that he was no better than anyone else and that only God could give him the forgiveness and mercy he needed.

The Pharisee judged the tax collector. He thought the tax collector wasn't as good as he was. But we are all equal and special in the eyes of God, who loves us all.

No matter who we are, where we come from, the colour of our skin, whether we are rich or poor, tall or short, we are special to God. God loves us all very much.

This week try not to judge others because they are different to you. Try to treat all people you meet with kindness and respect. Also think about the things that you could do better, say sorry to God for the times you get things wrong and ask God to help you to get them right next time. God is always ready to listen and to forgive us when we say sorry.

Loving Lord, help us to know when we are being proud or when we have forgotten to be forgiving towards others. Help us to do what is pleasing to you. Amen.
