Dear Families

We have had a really busy couple of weeks in school with a number of events taking place to widen experiences and opportunities for our young people. These have included the Careers Fair at Yeovil College for Year 10 students, an author visit for KS3 students who were fortunate to spend time with local author Jacky King, an in-school event for our Year 11 Geographers whose field visit was cancelled due to poor weather (which even included ice creams at the end!), our regular inter-form Sports competition for students in all year groups as well as strong team performances in matches against other local schools, support from our KS4 Sports Leaders with the Year 2 Primary Sports Festival and ongoing rehearsals for this year's production of Beauty and the Beast - phew! We are really grateful to the staff who lead and organise these events for our young people to enrich their experiences beyond the classroom.

In the last fortnight we have also hosted our Open Morning Events and welcomed over 100 visitors to Ansford to see the school in action during the usual school day. The feedback from families at the end of their visits has been so lovely to hear; they have commented on the calm and purposeful learning atmosphere, the confidence and pride of the students who have toured them around as well as the friendly family feel of the school.

Thank you to families for the generous donations of dried food items which we collected today and which will be delivered after half term.

Key Tips: Child Safety through the Winter Months

As the clocks go back and the nights draw in, it is an overnight adjustment for all of us keeping children safe in the dark. The darker evenings can have a big impact on our usual routines of picking children up from friends, after-school clubs, or cycling home from school. They can be very different experiences in the dark! The following simple steps can be taken to help avoid additional risks of accidents that the dark evenings can bring.

<u>Visibility is key</u>

Children need to be seen, not just by other motorists and cyclists but by other pedestrians. It is vital to teach your children good road safety basics from an early age. Think about what your child is wearing. Some school uniforms are dark. They are safe if they are visible - you can easily add high-visibility strips on their clothing, school bags or bike helmets.

What about teens?

As children grow up and become more independent, there are more risks that they may encounter as they start walking to school by themselves. Peak times for the number of fatalities or seriously injured are the 'school-run' periods between 8-9am and 3-4pm.

<u>Be aware</u>

As any parent knows it can be very difficult to get a teenager to part from their mobile phone. Whether they are talking to friends or listening to music on their mobile, they can be distracted. As a result, they are less aware of dangers in their surroundings such as other people or traffic.

If your teenager insists on wearing their headphones, encourage them to use ear bud types and ideally only use one side. Often teenagers walk in groups and are chatting or simply not paying attention. Sadly, it is often on these occasions that accidents can occur. What is firework misuse?

- Possessing CAT F1 fireworks whilst aged 15 or under
- Possessing CAT F2 or CAT F3 fireworks whilst aged 17 or under
- Letting off fireworks between 11pm and 7am (midnight on Bonfire Night)
- Throwing or setting off fireworks in a public place


