Message from the Head of School Mr Musson

Dear Families

Next week our assemblies will be covering the national issue of knife crime. While we do not have any direct experience of this issue at Ansford, we know it has been an issue in neighbouring schools and continues to grow nationally, so feel it is vital our students understand the risks and consequences that carrying a knife can lead to.

I would not normally reference a Netflix series in my headteachers message; however, I felt I should share the recent release of 'Adolescence'. There has been much discussion recently of the new release of this hard-hitting drama covering the aftermath of the stabbing of a teenage girl. The story shines a light on the corrosive impact of social media and misogynist influencers on some teenage boys. I am part way through watching this series and as a parent it made me reflect even more on how social media can impact our children and that we need to educate them (at home and in school) to manage some of the messages being targeted towards them.

Trips

REMINDER: Lateness to Lessons

We have some students for whom lateness at the start of the day and to lessons can be a problem.

Over the next two weeks we will be trialling a slightly different model for issuing detentions as a sanction for repeated lateness. This will involve moving from a daily to weekly review and issuing more significant sanctions for repeat offenders.

To allow this to happen, the school will NOT be issuing any daily late detentions for next week and will instead issue them the following week as an aggregate of combined lates. These will appear on ClassCharts as usual. We expect this system to have more impact on some repeat offenders and simplify the system for all.

As ever, many thanks to the vast majority of students who manage to get themselves into school and lessons on time and to all our parents/carers who support us in prioritising punctuality.

Are you interested in becoming an HGV mechanic or driver?

Here are Billy's top tips:

"For anyone wanting to become a HGV mechanic be prepared to get your hands dirty, and be prepared to have to spend time away at college. I had to go to Derby to a Renault trucks college. The toughest part of my Apprenticeship was trying to remember everything you've been taught over the 3 years for when you sit your final exams. Both in the workshop and in the classroom.

You hope you get given jobs that you were taught about in the beginning to jog your memory in the lead up to your exams. The best bit is learning new skills and having the satisfaction of fixing a truck and watching it go back out on the road.

I took my class 1 HGV driving test with Yeovil driver training when I was 18, and I passed with just one minor. It means I can now drive articulated lorries. I had the best week out on the road learning, finally getting to do what I've always dreamt of doing, having grown up around my Grandad's trucks! I currently work for AE George Commercials but hope to one day work for my Grandad at W Rolls Ltd driving a truck."

Consistent support and motivation from you plays a pivotal role in their success, and this begins with school attendance – that isn't just about adhering to school rules; it's about shaping their future, one day at a time.

YOU CAN HELP YOUR CHILD BY:

- ensuring your child understands the importance of excellent attendance and punctuality.
- asking about school work and encourage them to get involved in school activities.
- discussing any problems they may have and inform their Form Tutor to pass on concerns.

- arranging appointments after school hours, at weekends or during the holidays, to prevent disruption to your child's education and to the school.

Our School Attendance Target is 95% - We Need Your Help!



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Your child's future is built each day they are in school; support them in fulfilling their full potential by ensuring regular attendance to school.

Next term there will be a real focus on promoting the importance of high attendance and the link between attendance and attainment. Having a good education is an important factor in opening more opportunities in adult life.

Did you know that:

- a child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life
- 90% of young people with attendance rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE

and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all

- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable
- 7.5 million school days are missed each year through unauthorised absence

GCSEs may be near or may seem a long way off for you and your child but all absence at any stage leads to gaps in your child's learning.

This in turn can:

- mean that they fall behind in work
- affect their motivation
- affect their enjoyment of learning
- lead to poor behaviour
- affect their desire to attend school regularly affect their confidence in school
- mean they miss out on the social life of school and extra-curricular opportunities and experiences
- affect their ability to have or keep friendships.

Last week we saw the roll out of the 'Attendance Passport, this is an initiative that will support students in tracking their attendance and will open further lines of communication between tutors and tutees surrounding improving and declining attendance. Where there are persistent concerns, parents will be contacted by the tutor or pastoral team to discuss any presenting barriers to regular attendance to school.

Attendance reward points will be routinely issued to those students whose attendance is above the school target of 95% on a monthly and termly basis. Attendance success will also be acknowledged in our end of term award assemblies and those students who exceed the school target of 95% will be entered into a raffle with a chance to win a £20 amazon voucher – 5 to give away.

There are often good reasons why children become reluctant to attend school. If there are concerns preventing your child from attending school regularly then we urge you to contact the school at your earliest convenience, we are here to help.

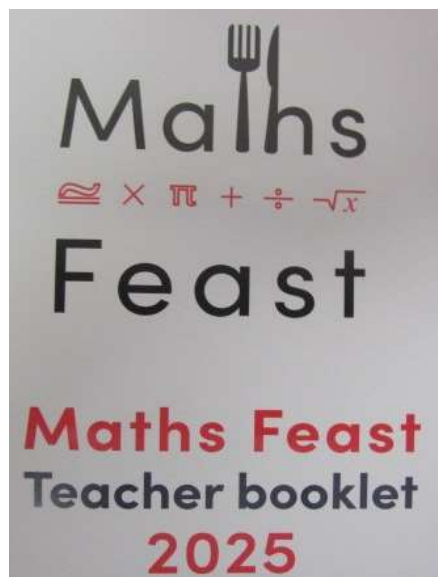
We came away with a certificate for sportsmanship and all students were respectful to the referees who were Year 10 students from Bridgwater College Academy.

Maths Feast - Monday 17th March



On Monday 17th March four Year 10 boys represented Ansford at the annual Year 10 Maths Feast held at Hayesfield School. The four boys were Charlie H-S, William R, Thomas G and Liam H. There were four gruelling rounds of maths challenges which consisted of the calculator relay round, broken calculator round, the cube and ribbon round and 'The would I lie to you round'.

The first round was 'The would I lie to you round' which was working out which answer was correct. The second round was the ribbon and cube round to work out the path of the ribbon around the cube. The third round was the broken calculator which consisted of finding out which part of the calculator was broken.

The boys did well at this round and the final round was the relay. They represented Ansford well and came a respectable 10th out of 20 - just one

point from being 8th!

AMSP KS5 Inspiration Trip - Tuesday 11th March

On Tuesday 11th March sixteen Year 10 students travelled to Bucklers Mead School for an information session about KS5 Maths. There was a brief outline given by both speakers about the different types of Maths A Level that are available to students to study (Maths Core, Further Maths and Maths), and the advantages of taking Maths as an A Level. Also, there was talk about the different career paths there are for students that take a Maths A level.

There were also some activities to problem solve such as getting three houses connected to the three utility companies without the lines crossing, and trying to answer the question: 'are you smarter if you are born in the summer or winter' with the Maths involved in this.

All students that attended fully engaged and listened well. Some have already decided that they would like to take A Level Maths when they go to college!

Millfield Maths Challenge - Wednesday 12th March

On Wednesday 12th March four students represented the school at Millfield's Maths Challenge. The students were Jack G and Chloe C from Year 11 and Millie C and Abi H from Year 10. Millfield put on a great spread for the students

and there was a wide range of schools from across two counties, both state schools and private schools.

The students had to participate in 5 different rounds of Maths challenges. One challenge was FIZZ, BUZZ, MOO AND BAA which consisted of students as a team trying to count to 100 with Fizz being a certain type of number e.g. square, Buzz being multiples of 7, Moo being odd numbers and so forth and every time they got it wrong; they had to start again! Another challenge was relay, and they had to split into pairs and one pair would get a question then once they answered correctly or had got it wrong twice, they had to get another question and give it to the other pair and there were 15 questions in a time limit of 10mins.

Another round was the head-to-head they were given something like this and had to go up against another team and alternate between players guessing the missing numbers:

If $x = 5$ then $y = 10$ and if $x = 6$ then $y = 8$ then complete the table:

One round was 45 mins with 10 very challenging questions and then there was a 2 min speed round where each member of the team was given the same questions, and they had to answer as many as they could in the time limit.

The four students represented Ansford well and they finished 16th place. They felt quite disappointed by their placing, but I think they did very well.
