# The numbers that matter

Data tells a story that's worth understanding. These aren't arbitrary targets, they're thresholds that mark real differences in outcomes. Let's look at what the numbers actually mean for your GCSE journey.



## On Track

This is where you want to be. At 95% attendance, you're consistently present and building the foundation for exam success without unnecessary gaps in your learning.

## Nearly 1 Day Off Every Fortnight

This might not sound like much, but it adds up to roughly four weeks of missed school over the year. That's a significant amount of teaching and learning lost.

## Persistent Absence

Below 90% is classified nationally as Persistent Absence. This level of absence makes achieving good GCSE grades significantly more difficult and limits your post-16 options.

## Why Gaps Don't Stay Small at GCSE

At KS4, content is designed to build systematically towards exams. Each lesson connects to what came before and what comes next. When you miss time, you're not just losing isolated facts; you're losing the connective tissue that holds your understanding together.

A 10% absence rate means you've missed nearly a full month of school. Imagine trying to prepare for exams knowing you weren't there for a month's worth of content across all your subjects. That's the reality behind these percentages.

The pattern is clear: **higher attendance correlates directly with better outcomes**. This isn't coincidence; it's cause and effect. The more consistently you attend, the more solid your understanding becomes and the less stressed you'll feel when exams approach.

# KS4 is different

If you think you can "catch up" at GCSE level the way you might have in Years 7–9, you need to understand why that doesn't work anymore. The volume, complexity and interconnected nature of KS4 content changes everything.



## 5 or 6 Subjects per day

One missed day isn't one missed lesson. It's typically five different subjects, each with its own content, skills, and exam requirements. Multiply that across a week or longer and you're looking at dozens of gaps across your entire curriculum.

## Exam content delivered live

Your teachers aren't just covering general knowledge; they're delivering specific exam content, teaching exam techniques and helping you understand mark schemes. This precise, targeted teaching can't be fully replicated by reading notes.

## Teacher explanation matters

When a concept is taught well the first time, it sticks. When you miss that explanation and try to piece it together later, you're often building understanding on shaky foundations. Teachers know how to break down complex ideas, notes can't capture that.

## Practice you can't replay

Lessons include practice activities, discussions, and worked examples that develop your exam skills. Missing these means missing the chance to make mistakes, ask questions and refine your technique in a supported environment.

This distinction is crucial. Revision helps you remember what you've learned and practise applying it under exam conditions. But revision can't teach you something properly for the first time. That's what attendance does. **Understanding builds in the classroom, layer by layer, lesson by lesson.** Miss those layers, and you're trying to revise content you never fully grasped in the first place.

**Revision fixes memory. Attendance fixes understanding.**

Your attendance directly powers your GCSE results. More time in class means more chances to practice, truly understand, and boost those scores. Great grades don't just happen; they open essential doors.




## Keep every door open
