# Character Education: Assembly Programme

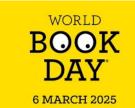
Each Year group has an assembly every week where we address key issues that occur, globally, nationally and locally. The assemblies have included:

# PSHE and RE content Autumn term:

PSHE (Personal, Social, Health, and Economic) education plays a vital role in schools by equipping students with essential life skills and knowledge to navigate the challenges of growing up and adulthood. It covers important topics such as mental health, relationships, financial literacy, and personal well-being, helping students develop



resilience, empathy, and decision-making skills. PSHE fosters a safe space for open discussions, encouraging students to understand themselves and others better while promoting respect and inclusivity. By addressing real-world issues, PSHE empowers young people to make informed choices, build healthy relationships, and contribute positively to society, making it a cornerstone of holistic education.

# Key stage 3 and 4 students have been covering the following content in their PSHE lessons in this term:

**Year 7:** Health & puberty and Diversity and equality: Healthy and unhealthy lifestyles, vaping, smoking, personal hygiene and puberty, Identity, prejudice, discrimination, stereotyping and bullying. Protected Characteristics and the Equality Act 2010.

**Year 8:** Emotional & physical health and Labour market information: Mental health, healthy and unhealthy coping strategies, energy drinks, caffeine, digital resilience & body image and Professional behaviour, health and safety, LMI. Action planning.

**Year 9:** Opportunity awareness and Intimate relationships: Decision-making, work motivation and challenging stereotypes and Relationship and sex education including consent, contraception, the risks of STIs and attitudes to pornography.

**Year 10:** Mental Health and Healthy relationships: Looking after your wellbeing, impact of drugs and alcohol, managing pressure, benefits of sleep, relationships, consent, sexual harassment, sexual pleasure and challenges, including the impact of the media and pornography

**Year 11:** Self-examination & sexual health and Families and relationships: Sexual health & self-examination. Pregnancy outcomes. Routes to parenthood, fertility and the menopause and Parenting and family conflicts. Different long-term commitments, marriage and forced marriage

# In the Summer term, the following topics will be covered in PSHE:

Year 7: Digital safety and self-awareness

Year 8: Citizenship and financial decision making

Year 9: Drugs and Health and employability skills

Year 10: Citizenship and financial awareness

**Year 11:** Being independent, Financial decisionmaking including budgeting, saving and take-home pay



### PSHE and RE content Autumn term:

Studying RE (Religious Education) in school is crucial for fostering understanding, respect and tolerance in an increasingly diverse world. It provides students with the opportunity to explore different religions, beliefs, and cultures, helping them develop a deeper appreciation for the values and traditions that shape societies. RE encourages critical thinking and reflection on ethical and moral questions, equipping students with the tools to



navigate complex issues with empathy and open-mindedness. By promoting dialogue and mutual respect, RE plays a key role in building cohesive communities and preparing young people to engage thoughtfully in a multicultural world.

# Key stage 3 and 4 students have been covering the following content in their RE lessons in this term:

Year 7: Why are religions so diverse?

Year 8: Why is Christianity the way it is?

**Year 9:** How did Islam begin and develop? What are the challenges of being Muslim is 21st century Britain?

Year 10: Are religious views on crime and punishment reflected in modern day society?

Year 11: What influences people's views on human rights and social justice

# In the Spring term, the following topics will be covered in RE:

Year 7: How do creation narratives shape what it means to be human?

**Year 8:** To what extent does religion reflect or react to society?

**Year 9:** What is the function of religion?

**Year 10:** How can we learn about the real lives of those who lived and died during the holocaust?

### Form time curriculum:

Tutor time each day is a vital part of the school routine, providing structure and support to help students start their day positively. It's an opportunity to receive important notices, ensuring everyone is informed about school events, deadlines, and updates. Attendance checks

help maintain accountability, while equipment checks ensure students are prepared for their lessons. Tutor time also sets the tone for the day ahead, allowing students to mentally prepare and organise themselves. Additionally, it complements PSHE lessons by covering topics such as well-being, resilience and current affairs, fostering personal development and creating a safe space for discussion. This daily practice strengthens relationships, builds routines, and supports students' overall growth and readiness for learning.



#### **ENRICHMENT AT NETHERWOOD**

Attending extra-curricular clubs in secondary school is incredibly valuable as it offers opportunities to develop both personally and socially. These clubs help students build strong relationships with peers who share similar interests, fostering teamwork and a sense of belonging. They also provide a platform to develop new skills, whether it's through sports, music, drama, or academic societies, helping students discover and nurture their talents. Participation in extra-curricular activities enhances time management, leadership and communication skills,

which are essential for future success. Beyond the classroom, these clubs encourage confidence, resilience and a well-rounded education, making them an integral part of the secondary school experience. A number of our amazing students have completed a sports leaders qualification and have supported a variety of primary sports events so far this year. The feedback they have received has been outstanding and we are looking forward to see how they develop as leaders in our school and within the local community.





In the summer term we are starting a 'Go Lead' programme with our Year 7 and 8 students. Training is being arranged for these students and they will support whole school secondary and primary competitions.

Our Year 7 students visited London in January this Year, taking in the sites and seeing shows, they were so well behaved and really engaged in all planned activities. They were a credit to the school.

We have also run various trips across all Year groups to Magna, GCSE Science Live, HeppSY Go Further Go Higher university visits and we have visited a climate conference where students, teachers and schools discussed their climate education journey. From reducing carbon emissions in their school to moving on in society as active citizens with respect for the world environment.



We are continuing to add to our enrichment offer, and have included some new trips to our schedule this Year. Our students are going skiing in the Easter Holidays in Obertauern, where The Beatles filmed their music video 'Help', and our students will be going on a football trip to Holland in July, where students will play against Dutch opposition and visit the Ajax stadium.





### CAREERS INFORMATION ADVICE AND GUIDANCE:

This term we have focused heavily on preparing our Year 9 students for the options process.

We have had guest speakers in to discuss various options pathways and provide advice and guidance on the different options available and how these decisions can impact post-16 and post-18 pathways.

Shortly after we return from the Easter holidays, our Year 10 students will be taking part in a mock interview event. Mock interview day is an invaluable experience that prepares students for the real world by simulating professional interview scenarios. It helps build confidence, improve communication skills, and teaches students how to present themselves effectively to potential employers or colleges. By receiving constructive feedback, students can identify their strengths and areas for improvement, refining their interview techniques. Mock interviews also encourage self-reflection, allowing students to articulate their skills, achievements, and career aspirations clearly. This practice not only reduces anxiety around real interviews but also equips students with the tools to make a positive and lasting impression, setting them up for future success in their chosen pathways.

And as always, we have been meeting with Year 11 students to discuss their chosen post-16 pathway, offering advice and support in completing applications and how to prepare for interviews. If your child/dependent in Year 11 hasn't had a guidance meeting yet, please don't worry. We are still arranging appointments throughout the remainder of the academic year.
