
Newsletter 27 June 2025

Dear Parent/Carer



The weather forecast suggests that we will experience high temperatures at the start of next week: 33 and 30 degrees Celsius on Monday and Tuesday, returning to 22 degrees on Wednesday. As such, we are giving students the option to wear their school PE kit instead of normal uniform on these two days.

Please can we ask that students do not come into school in other items of sports kit that are not part of the uniform as they may need to wait elsewhere until their school PE kit is brought in from home and corrected.

We ask that parents/ carers ensure that their children have a bottle for water during this hot period which they can fill up during breaks and between lessons. We also advise the use of sunscreen as well.

We aim to ventilate the buildings as much as possible overnight during the weekend to cool them down for the week ahead, and we will keep a close eye on activities to ensure that students and staff working in these quite old buildings are as comfortable as possible.

For anyone who's in the know – it's "black diamond eggshell".

The noisy lift-shaft work was completed this week, ready for its arrival and the worktops for the kitchen area at the back of the common room have also been chosen.

In the same location the display window from the resource centre, which was passed its best, has been removed and the bricks from the new café window openings reused to fill the gap. This weekend will see the brick floor in "the Street" come up and the new pavers installed in a slightly more modern "Stack Bond" pattern.
















Notes from the PAC

2025/ 2026 Key Stage 3 curriculum tweak

As you may know, May half term is the main resignation date for teachers wanting to take up other roles in September. We will update parents and carers with the specific names in the final weeks, so that those teachers can decide themselves how they want to let their students know in the meantime. However, I am pleased to let you know that the number of changes is lower than in previous years. Nevertheless, some resignations have meant that we have had to slightly modify the curriculum in response to these staffing movements.

Learning from parents/ carer feedback last year, we are keeping our promise of returning KS3 subjects we had to pause, and where necessary, we are only slightly adjusting the time allocations of some rather than temporarily removing them from the curriculum.

Food is returning in KS3 and we have safeguarded the Year 9 into 10 options courses. However, design technology/ food will be taught in one period per fortnight next year in KS3 and PE will stay on four periods (as it is now), with dance on one period (as it is now); we will no longer have to incorporate dance into PE as previously communicated – they can stay separate. We are still bringing back computer science for one period a fortnight, and as previously highlighted we will be reducing English by one period to seven per fortnight and increasing drama to two periods per fortnight.

Year 10 work experience and shaping futures update

Just to remind you that during the week 7–11 July, our Year 10 students will have the opportunity to be involved with exciting and meaningful career experiences. Some students will be going out on traditional work experience placements, developing key employability skills and gaining a valuable taste of working life.

If your child has the opportunity to take up a work experience placement with a suitable employer, there's still time to arrange this. Please do get in touch (email helen.parks@astreastivo.org) and we'd be happy to support and guide the process to ensure it's a safe and valuable experience. Unfortunately, we are unable to find students placements this year, so this will have to come from a contact you have.

At the same time, students involved in the Shaping Futures programme will be bringing their projects to a conclusion. Many of them will be visiting the workplaces of the employers they've been working with, while others will take part in a project finale session in school to celebrate their learning and achievements. This employer supported initiative has provided students with a meaningful introduction to the world of work.

We're proud of how positively students are engaging with these opportunities and we're confident this will be a week full of learning, growth and aspiration.

This week we say goodbye to Mrs Onireti in mathematics and Miss Tweed in student support, and wish them all the best for their future careers. Parents/ Carers may therefore see a slight change in some mathematics groups where other teachers in the department have volunteered to cover the classes for the final three or so weeks of this year.

Interform – Week beginning 14 July

During the final week (WB 14 July) there will be part-day interform sports events for students as follows:
