9	Who is Macbeth loosely based on?	True events in Scotland in the 11 th century, which would have been known to King James, a throne he inherited through Banquo and Fleance, who appear in the play
10	When was the play set?	11 th century (Medieval period)
11	Who does Macbeth kill at the beginning of the play and why?	A traitor-foreshadowing his own death as a traitor himself
12	Who kills Macbeth?	Macduff
13	Who is King at the end of the play?	Malcolm
14	What does the term 'hamartia' mean?	A fatal mistake or a fatal flaw in a tragic hero

15	What does the term 'hubris' mean?	Excessive pride or self-belief
16	What does the term 'peripeteia' mean?	A reversal of fortune, a turning point
17	Why is ambition a key theme in the play?	The witches' prophecies spur Macbeth and Lady Macbeth to fulfil their ambitions, but they never make them do anything
18	How does the play open?	The 3 witches gather to discuss meeting with Macbeth
19	Why does the play open with 'thunder and lightning'	Creates an uneasy and ominous tone and highlights the possibly danger of the witches
20	What does the term, soliloquy mean?	The act of speaking one's thought aloud
