

## Maths - Year 11

#### Work expectations



- Completing homework to a good standard is crucial, homework will be set weekly on Sparx between and an exam paper once a fortnight.
- Students should use additional resources for their own practise.

In year 11 all students will sit two sets of mock exams, this will consist of all 3 papers.

#### **Exams**



Foundation Edexcel Certificate in Maths GCSE.

Higher Edexcel Certificate in Maths GCSE

- Both qualifications involve three exams at the end of year 11; one non-calculator and two calculator, all with equal weighting.
- Expected distribution of students studying Higher to Foundation on the 9-1 exam is 60% to 40%

#### Foundation Edexcel Certificate



\* This course has a heavy emphasis on number and functional skills of mathematics needed in adult life.

\* Possible grades achieved from the foundation course are 1-5 (5 being an old high C, low B).

#### Higher Edexcel Certificate



\* This course has a heavy emphasis on algebra and application of mathematics.

\* Possible grades achieved from the higher course are 9 - 4.

#### How can you help?



- A little maths everyday helps!!!
  - Encourage your child to practice a skill everyday: times tables, long multiplication.
  - Talk about time with them: get them to read timetables for bus routes or trains.
  - Ask them to measure ingredients when cooking, discuss metric measures.
  - Revise with flashcards the formulas they need to remember.
  - And please remember maths is FUN! It is OK to enjoy Maths, like it is OK to enjoy reading....

# Next steps – Apprenticeships, A levels and degrees

- A significant amount of courses, that you would not necessarily relate to maths require a grade 4 in maths and in some cases a grade 6.
- \* For instance to become and Art teacher you need to have passed maths at GCSE.
- \* Another example: To study psychology at some of the top universities you need a grade 6 in maths.



#### **Exams- AQA Sciences**



Students sit two exam papers for each of the science subjects (six papers in total) covering different content from the course (paper 1 and paper 2).

- \* Combined science (AQA Trilogy) papers are 1h 15mins each; Separate science are 1h 45 mins.
- Combined students must sit the same tier for all 6 papers.
- Separate science students will receive a grade for each science; Combined students receive a double award for combined science eg. 4/4, 5/5

#### Current teaching




- Students will sit a paper 1 mock in October.
- We are currently teaching paper 2 content.
- Paper 2 content will be completed by January/February with paper 2 mocks taking place in Jan/February.
- In March and April, we will focus on intensive exam practice, with exams taking place in May.

#### Tiers of entry

- Students have been given tiers of entry based on their year 10 mock. This may be amended with further data.
- \* Final tiers for the summer exams will be decided in January based on mock performance.
- Students not gaining at least a grade 5 on the higher paper are likely to be recommended for the foundation paper in line with guidance.
- Combined science students must sit the same tier for all papers
- Separate science students can sit a different tier for each science eg Biology (H) Physics (F) to suit their strengths in each subject.


#### Homework and Revision

- \* The expectation is that students spend around an hour on homework each week.
- \* Exam question booklets will be set each week, if students follow this schedule, they will have revised all topics thoroughly. Your help therefore in ensuring students complete the work directed is very important.
- We will also do full past papers at relevant points.

#### What else is there for free?





Cognito has lessons, videos, questions and past papers organised across the science subjects by topic. Students can sign up for free which allows them to track progress in each unit.

Seneca has free services with both information and explanations — either online or via the app. Students can create their own account or join classes set up by teachers.





We will be working through selected exam questions in class and placing some on SharePoint. However, any students who need more will be able to find notes and questions on for all sciences on Physics and Maths Tutor.





- Homework is set weekly.

#### Beyond GCSE- English Literature 'A' Level

English Literature is one of the Russell Group universities' 'facilitating' subjects — so called because choosing them at A-level allows a wide range of options for degree study.

English Literature A-level is an essential subject for an English degree. Some drama, media studies, American studies and law degree courses will also ask for an English literature or language A-level. The Russell Group Informed Choices guide also recommends English Literature A-level for those who want to take degree courses in classics, French and other modern languages, teacher training, history, history of art, politics and religious studies.

#### What careers can studying English Literature lead to?

It is widely recognised by universities that the skills developed through the study of English Literature are among the most transferable, with English graduates going on to develop the widest range of careers — among the most popular are publishing, broadcasting, marketing and PR, journalism, law, teaching and politics

#### Consistency


- Make a weekly timetable of when they will study and for how long. Be realistic.
