Do you think the joke is funny your adult is telling you?

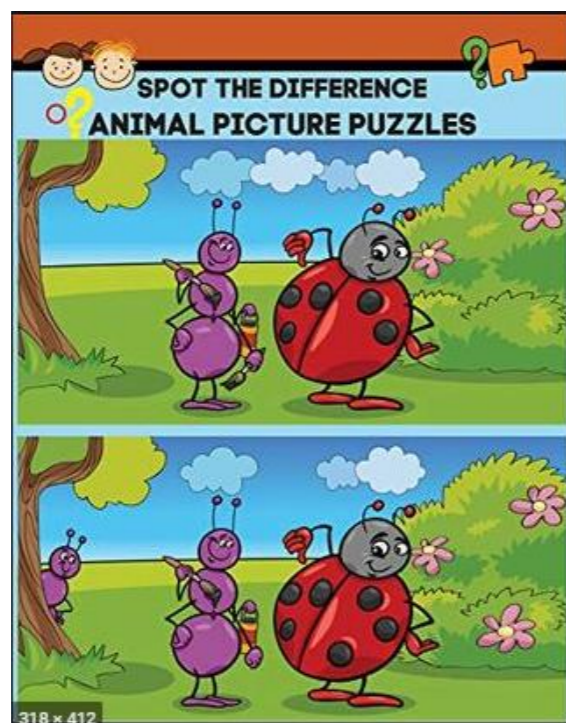

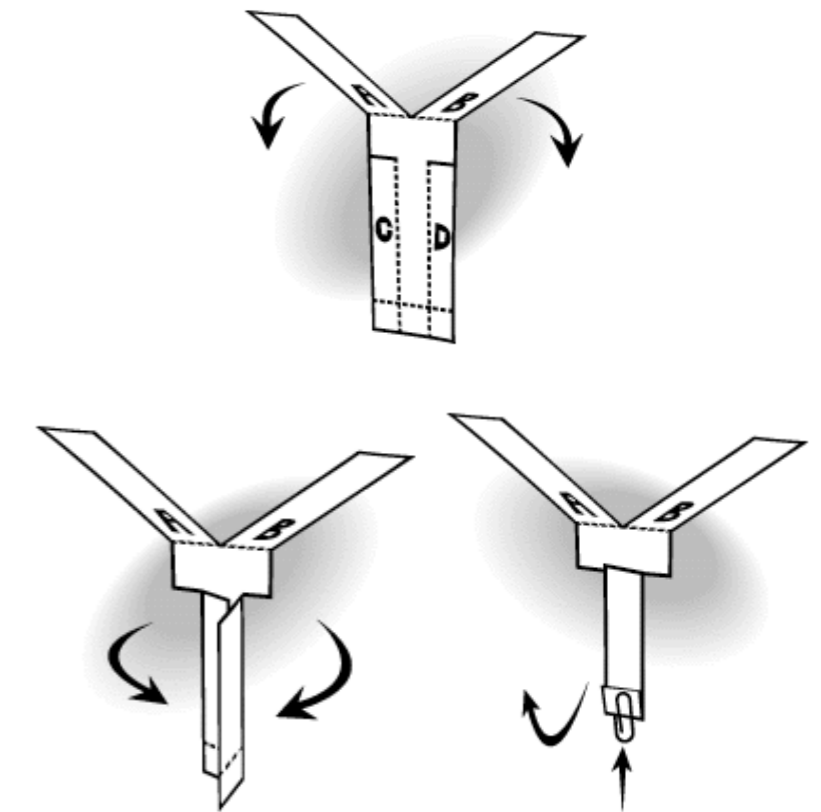
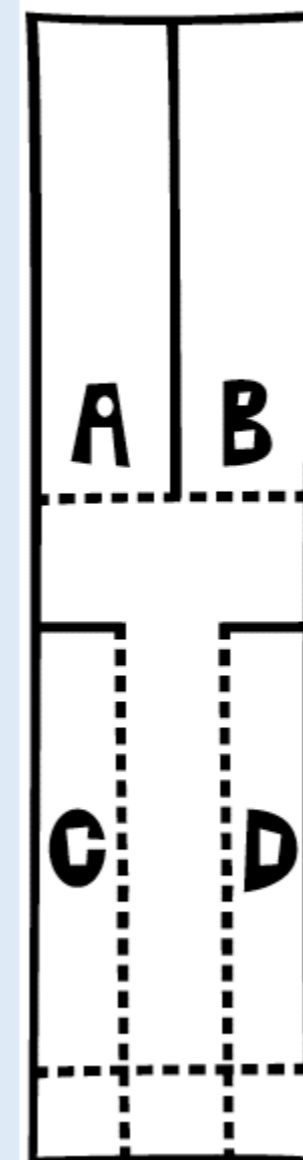
There are 5 differences to spot. Can you find them?
