Spelling, punctuation and grammar (SPaG)


Spelling, punctuation and grammar will be assessed in 12-mark questions.

Spelling, punctuation and grammar (SPaG) will be assessed against the following criteria:

Example 1



'The Four Noble Truths are the most important Buddhist teaching.' Evaluate this statement.

[12 marks + 3 SPaG]

Example 1

Answer A

In the second paragraph the student discusses the fourth Noble Truth as a 'however' point (as opposed to continuing the discussion as the Middle Way is the fourth Noble Truth). However, in the fourth paragraph, a second viewpoint is discussed. There is overall a reasonable discussion of different points of view, demonstration of understanding of key concepts and a fairly logical chain of reasoning. The answer also ends with judgements directly related to the statement, so this response meets the criteria for Level 4.

Level 4, 10 marks (251 words)

SPaG 3 – despite misspelling of 'enlightenment' throughout, other technical terms are correctly spelt. Grammar used with effective control of meaning overall, therefore meets the criteria for 'high performance'.

Answer B

The first paragraph is redundant as it does not add anything to the response, furthermore the student did not need to copy out the statement in their second paragraph. There is limited evaluation here, and some reasoned consideration of two points of view but the response is too generalised to meet the criteria for Level 3. There is some use of relevant teachings, and a good attempt at application of the chain of reasoning in the fifth and sixth paragraphs.

Level 2, 6 marks

SPaG – 2 marks. The answer is about the expected length (234 words) but there are several spelling mistakes and misuse of capital letters. Subject terms spelled correctly 'Buddha' and 'enlightenment' which could help push this to 3 marks. However, overall style and grammar means best fit is 2 marks.

Answer A

A very brief response (60 words) but it does include two relevant points which address the content of the question. Both include some development and explanation, therefore the response goes slightly beyond Level 1.

Level 2,4 marks



Answer B

The response gives two points of view in the first two paragraphs, with reasons and evidence. The third paragraph makes use of scripture although contradicts itself in terms of the line of argument supported, the conclusion also contains a repeat of points made previously. As such the response does not demonstrate the logical chains of reasoning or development required to reach Level 3.

Level 2, 5 marks


Answer E

This response is well argued, with well explained points on both sides of the argument. The student demonstrates logical chains of reasoning and applies religious beliefs to the issue at hand. There are some generalisations made such as in the conclusion that the Bible says all who are baptised with go to heaven, however at this level the nuances of such claims can be overlooked. Overall the response fully meets the criteria for Level 4 and deserves full marks.

Level 4, 12 marks

Example 3



'For religious believers, sexual relationships should take place only within marriage.' Evaluate this statement.

[12 marks + SPaG 3]

Answer A

This response drifts significantly from the focus of the statement in the question, which limits the mark that can be awarded. The first sentence is not relevant, and the rest of the first paragraph is more focussed on marriage and having children than sexual relationships. Again, paragraph three focusses on having children. There is reasonable religious content here, despite some inaccuracy of expression concerning Jesus birth, but the accompanying reasoning is limited. Therefore the response just meets the criteria for Level 3.

Level 3, 7 marks

SPaG 3 – good use of sentences and punctuation, high accuracy in spelling.


Answer B

This response is about the expected length (241 words) and is well-argued. The response is well focused on the question set, and makes reasonable use of religious teachings. As such, the response is firmly within Level 4, but does not quite reach the top mark. A tighter focus on the question of sexual relationships, rather than the purposes of marriage could have aided this.

Level 4, 11 marks

SPaG 3 – this response fully meets the criteria for high performance with a good level of accuracy throughout.





'War is the best way to solve problems between countries.' Evaluate this statement.

[12 marks + 3 SPaG]

Answer A

This response gives points on both sides of the argument but lacks evaluations and development of the accurate and relevant points that are given. There are some inaccuracies and confusion, for example the second paragraph and the point about civilians in the third. Furthermore, the reference to holy war and Gandhi are not made relevant with reference to 'countries.' Due to some inaccuracies and lack of focus on the statement, this response does not meet the criteria for Level3.

Level 2, 6 marks

SPaG 3 – good use of spelling and grammar, which allows clarity of meaning throughout.

Answer B

A well-argued response of the expected length (246 words). The religious arguments are used well, although throughout the answer there could have been more focus on the issue of 'between countries'. This clear focus on the exact statement at hand is required for a top mark.

Level 4, 10 marks

SPaG 3 – this response meets all the criteria for high performance. Good use of subject vocabulary, accuracy of spelling and clear communication of meaning.
