# Options for Post-16 Education Information Sheet




As soon as the autumn term starts you will start the process of applying for your Post-16 options. It is useful to start to have a look around and think about what you may like to do once you finish Year 11.

These are your main options:



- ⇒ An A Level is a two year course, you study three or sometimes four subjects
- ⇒ You can combine A Level study with BTEC subsidiary subjects, you still pick three subjects between the two different types of qualification
- ⇒ There are general college/sixth form GCSE entry requirements as well as specific subject entry requirements



- ⇒ A T Level is a two year course and is equivalent to three A Levels
- ⇒ As well as studying at college, you will have a minimum of a 45 day work placement in a work environment related to your course
- ⇒ Courses are currently available in: Digital, Construction, Education & Childcare and Health & Social
- ⇒ Entry requirements for these courses are generally Grade 4s or above in English, Mathematics and Science



- ⇒ A BTEC is a broad qualification in a sector such as Travel and Tourism or Uniformed Services
- ⇒ A Vocational course is specifically designed for a particular job role such as electrician, carpenter, hairdresser or chef
- ⇒ Has various levels you can start at depending on your GCSE results and interests
- $\Rightarrow$  Can be a 1 year or 2 year course
- ⇒ Practical based qualifications; gain experience in classroom or out in the field
- ⇒ Apprenticeships are real jobs with pay and qualifications
- ⇒ You have to find your own apprenticeship
- ⇒ Entry requirements vary depending on level and type of apprenticeship
- ⇒ Your employer will give you time off to attend college to practical your skills and develop your knowledge
