Make sure there is dedicated time and a quiet place for you to revise

Print out a blank copy of a poem, or extract and practise your skill of analysis

Read the poems out loud to help your analysis of tone, rhythm and rhyme

Look for alternative and critical opinions about your set texts – do you agree?

Find your own extracts for Language paper 1 and 2 – write your own questions

Use the advice on your essays to improve your writing and analysis – really think about your STAR time

Set yourself a goal – and stick to it. Don't cram the night before, it won't pay off for you

Create a study group or a group chat – support each other and share ideas

## HOW TO REVISE FOR ENGLISH

Complete practice essays, hand them in to your teacher for marking. Ask for more questions, or access them on the student shared area, Google Classroom or the Google Team Drive for your class.

## Be proactive!

Ask your teacher to help you with personalised revision: know your strengths & weaknesses

Make sure you have the right texts, notes and writing equipment before you start

Create quote cards for Literature: quote on the front, summary/analysis on the back

Blu-tac revision cards around the house where you will see them every day

Read your Literature texts
again – you need at least 3
readings before the exam.
Watch a film version, listen to
an audio reading

Create character profiles or main plot points for Literature; draw a timeline

Practise planning for both
Language paper section Bs and
hand these to your teacher
