# What are we learning this term?

Rotations 1 & 2 (Weeks 1-20):

In this skills building unit the students will look at traditional and contemporary Oriental Art from across various periods in history. They will complete image analysis and look closely at a variety of art sources and explore how they were created. They will create a moodboard showing influences on the theme and create realistic drawings from actual artefacts. This work is then used to create initial design ideas for the creation of a clay tile. A final design is then created to inform a personal response that will be made in clay - Clay safety forms part of the project. The clay work is then created, fired and painted.

## Rotations 3 & 4 (Weeks 21-39):

In the second half of the project, students' will work on producing an A3 mixed media art piece based on 'Oriental art.' They will recall the knowledge and the skills gained from the

previous rotation and produce a personal response. Homeworks will also form the basis of the creative process. Students will be encouraged to look at a variety of materials and techniques to assist with the creation of the end product.

# What are we learning this term?

Rotations 1 (Weeks 1-20):

This term, Year 9 students will take on a fun and challenging project to design and craft their own abstract clocks. Initially, they'll explore the concept of 'abstract,' backed by examples and key terms. Students will create moodboards and draft a design brief, along with two preliminary sketches, all subject to self and peer assessment.

To expand their design skills, they'll sketch four quick designs focused on drilled hole and jigsaw patterns, followed by an evaluation to refine their final clock design. Transitioning from paper to practice, students will build paper prototypes for modelling and testing purposes.

Re-entering the workshop, the class will review health and safety protocols and tool usage from last year, including sessions on the disc sander and coping saw.

Finally, students will manufacture and finish their clocks, choosing from various paint techniques for a personal touch

# What are we learning this term?

As part of the unit students will continue to build on the 5 basic skills we use when performing: Facial expressions, body language, spatial awareness, voice projection, tone of voice.

This unit begins to build on the idea of devising their own work from a stimulus and begins to incorporate more specific techniques in how to build a performance in rehearsal. This includes techniques such as: sustaining character, using persuasive language as well as language applicable to an era, hot seating, forum theatre and narration. The unit also introduces Theatre in Education as a style of performance.

# What are we learning this term?

In year 9 students will spend approximately 20 weeks in the food rotation as it will have been an option choice, this is divided into two 10-week rotations. The first rotation looks at health and safety. Nutrients and the consequences of a poor diet. It considers different dietary groups and their specific needs. Food development is researched and the wants and needs of groups are identified. Students learn how to adapt a recipe looking at alternative ingredients. Food and the environment is researched.

Do-Now general knowledge is included in written lessons and supports students learning of the weekly set knowledge organiser tasks.

Students will make a variety of products in year 9 these include Curry, Chickpea burger, Asian food dish, Samosa and Quiche.

Skills are developed through the dishes and students are encouraged to work as independently as possible with practical tasks ready for possible GCSE in year 10.

### Homework

Students are responsible for making sure they have the correct ingredients and containers organised ready for practical food lessons. Recipes are given out to students the week before and are posted on the Google classroom. Recipes may be adapted to suit dietary needs.



## What are we learning this term?

Rotation 1 & 2 (Week 1 - 10):

In this skills building unit the students will look at traditional Aboriginal Art from a Graphic Design perspective. They will choose a 'dreamtime' story and produce a modern day book cover. In the first rotation, our learners start the project by producing a moodboard in Photoshop, selecting a dreamtime story, analysing existing book cover designs and producing a digital dot piece of work in Photoshop. Students will also have a practical homework in this rotation to produce some drawn design ideas to communicate their book cover ideas.

## Rotation 3 & 4 (Week 30 - 39):

In the second half of the project we will work on Typography skills, learners will explore the possibilities that surround working with Typography in the Graphic Design world. We will explore the use of typography when used in conjunction with paths tools. Using text to shape subjects such as animals in reference to Bemboszoo. Students will explore their own use of mixed media by creating their own typography without the use of IT as a creative homework. By exploring all of these techniques students will have the ability to further develop their Photoshop skills ready for core GCSE modules.



#### Homework

Students will be given practical homework in the first and second rotations. In the first rotation students will be asked to create handmade Mandalas inspired by Ross Holden. In the second rotation students will be asked to make hand made type. This affirms the importance of mixed media and experimentation outside of technology.





# What are we learning this term?

During this first rotation year 9 will be covering two topics. Our first topic will be 'Let's Play Together' is all about ensemble performance. Students will learn to play songs as part of class and as a group showing an awareness of how their parts fit with each other. Students pick their own song for their final performance, creating their own arrangements of the song they have chosen.

# What are we learning this term?

Students have chosen their teaching groups this year and have opted into either a GCSE PE/CNAT Sport preparation group, a creative activities group or a games group. Over the course of the Autumn term, depending on the group they are in, students will cover some of the following activities: hockey, netball, football, team building, badminton, orienteering, volleyball, rugby union, gymnastics, dance and Health Related Fitness. The GCSE PE/CNAT Sport groups will be set two pieces of theory work this half-term to prepare them for Key Stage 4 study. This work will be set as homework using a platform called The Everlearner. We lose the Sports Hall in November for two weeks due to Year 11 mock exams, so students will be able to compete for their house in an activity of their choosing during this period.

## Assessments


We assess students in PE at the end of each activity block. We assess them in three areas: **'Know'** - knowledge of rules and regulations.

# What are we learning this term?

## **Rotation 1: Skills and Techniques**

In the first rotation students will further develop skills they have previously used whilst also learning about new ones. They will build up a portfolio of samples for a wide range of skills and techniques including seams, patchwork, applique, colouring techniques, weaving, embroidery along with others. Each sample will be evaluated giving its strengths and targets.

## **Rotation 2: Product Production**

In the second rotation students will independently manufacture a product using the techniques they learnt and practised in the first rotation. They will decide on which skills and techniques they like and use these in the manufacture of a child's play mat. investigating how they can stimulate the user's senses through touch, texture and sound. Students will be encouraged to work as independently as possible whilst being creative and imaginative in their product manufacture.



## Homework

For homework, students are expected to complete revision of their knowledge organisers by revising the relevant section for the week and self testing in their planners. The sections expected to be learnt are posted in the Google Classroom. In the following lesson students will be guizzed using their Do Now sheets in lessons. Students have access to their Knowledge Organisers on the Google Classroom and if required can have a copy printed for them. A subject drive has been created for all students so that they have access to all materials to help

them at home.

### Assessments

Students will be assessed in two areas in year 9, their written work and their practical work.

Written work consists of designing and evaluating throughout the project.

Practical work consists of any experimentation work they produce as well as the manufacture of their final product.

Students will be assessed as either exceeding, meeting or developing in relation to their work.
