SAFEGUARDING INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

As a campus we give the highest priority to safeguarding our children and young people in all aspects of their school and college lives. This means that staff and volunteers must be alert to possible concerns about every student, and to report these in a proper fashion. The campus has a safeguarding and child protection policy which parents/carers can view on our website; www.brookvalegroby.com

In order to effectively safeguard all students and adults on site it is important that all visitors to school, including parents and carers, sign in at reception before they go anywhere else. All adults on the campus are asked to challenge any adults that they see on site who are not wearing identification which indicates that they have signed in at reception. Please do not go directly to the Groby building or any other part of the campus without first going to reception in the Brookvale building.

It is important for parents to be aware that:

- Staff and volunteers in the campus have a duty to report concerns about a child, whether this means the child may be in need of
 additional support or help of some kind or whether it is thought that a child may have been abused or be at risk of abuse.
- In some cases the campus is obliged to refer children to children's social care staff, for children to be assessed for their needs or if an investigation into possible child abuse is required.
- In many cases there will already have been discussions between campus staff and the parents of the child, and the situation and concerns will not be a surprise to the parents. However, parents may not be told that the campus has referred their child to children's social care if it is thought that this might put the child at risk.
- Children's social care tries to carry out its enquiries in a sensitive fashion. It has to gather information and generally it can be
 open with parents about the steps being taken.
- If you think your child may have been abused, or may be at risk, you should contact the children's social care office. If you think the abuse may have happened on campus, contact the Headteacher or the Designated Senior Person for Child Protection; Mr Godwin, Senior Deputy Headteacher. If you think your child has been hurt, arrange to visit your doctor. Comfort and reassure your child.








GERMAN LANGUAGE BERLIN RESIDENTIAL TRIP

On Tuesday 13th February, Mrs Ainsworth, Mrs Craig Fisher and Mr Tagg were lucky enough to take a group of 26 year 10 German students to Berlin. After a very early start at BGLC we arrived at Luton, took the flight to Berlin and walked to the hostel. It was an enormous hostel with over 600 guests per night. Most of these were other school groups from all over Europe. We showed our excellent manners and the hostel remarked on this at the end of our stay. Once we had checked in, we took the underground to the Topography of Terror, a museum and tour about the Nazi Era in Berlin. We then walked to the famous Checkpoint Charlie to see the crossing between East and West Berlin. To keep us going, we then took a stop in
















Day two started early with a typical German breakfast of bread rolls, cheese and ham. We then headed out to explore a bit more; starting with a trip to the East German DDR museum. This interactive exhibition really captured their interests. We then hopped on the bus to Kurfurstendamm (Ku'Damm): the longest shopping street in Germany. Here we visited the Kaiser Wilhelm Gedächtsniskirche, a church which was bombed and partially destroyed during the second world war and also the newer blue stained-glass part which is extremely impressive. The students then had some free time to

explore and do some shopping. We had a great lunch all together and then onto the Brandenburg Gate, took some pics and then walked to the Memorial for the Murdered Jews of Europe. This is a very powerful exhibition which the students found very moving. We then walked to the Reichstag building (the German parliament). We were able to view Berlin from above on the roof terrace and from the huge glass dome on the top of the building which gives 360-degree views. After all this culture we decided to head to UV Black Light Golf at the docks, where we had to wear 3D glasses and not fall over the crazy designs. This was a lot of fun, and we realised that most of us are not destined to be golf stars (except for Mr Tagg who managed shole in ones!)







Day three was a bit of a lie in (9:00!) We had breakfast and then we walked to the East Side Gallerie on Mühlenstrasse. This is a 2.2km stretch of the Berlin Wall which was decorated by artists following the fall of East Germany. The artists came from all over the world and painted murals on sections to remember and provoke people. This is a very important landmark in Berlin's recent history. We then took the underground to Alexanderplatz and the students had time to explore before we went to the TV Tower. This 203m building was the tallest building in Europe when built. It has a high-speed lift which takes you to the top of the structure and from there you can see the panoramic views of the city. The students were blown away by the size of it and seeing all the things they had already visited from above. Our next stop was to the Palace of Tears. This exhibition at Friedrichstrasse, is the real location of the passport control for those people who had crossed from East into West Berlin. We had a guided tour from an East German who had been through the control multiple times during the 80s and who told us of how he had been pulled in for questioning and how scary this had been. This was heavy going but really interesting. To lighten the mood, we headed over to Potsdamerplatz (where the camera crews were setting up for the Berlinale - like the Oscars in Germany and protesters were also being filmed). Here we had a blast in Gamestation - a neon arcade, where the students were able to run off any excess energy for an unlimited hour of gaming!

Our final day began with a huge room clean up (beds, floors and packing). We then took the S Bahn to the Deutsche Technik Museum. A huge science museum with boats, planes and other exhibitions that you could actually board! After a final shop at Alexanderplatz and a very German Döner Kebap, we grabbed our bags and started our long journey home.

We were so proud of the students, how polite they were, how sensible and how much they took in what was all around them. I hope that they enjoyed it as much as the teachers did! Mrs Ainsworth, Subject Leader for German.











SKIING IN THE USA

Over the February half term 28 students and 4 members of staff travelled to Waterville and Cannon Resort, New Hampshire for our annual ski trip which also included a 2-night stopover in New York. Our first day started with parent drop off on Campus for 8.45am and off to the airport, with no delays we were soon on route to Boston Airport, followed by a 3-hour bus journey to New Hampshire.

The first two days of skiing were at Cannon resort then three days at Waterville. The majority of the group had never skied before. The first two days saw a steep learning curve and all beginners were off the nursery slope by the end of day two, with all of the groups skiing more difficult runs, including blue and black runs by the end of the week. The conditions for skiing this year were extremely good, the sun shining bright, and the snow falling for three of the days. There was a couple of days of skiing where it was a little more challenging as the temperatures dropped, and with the wind chill it had been the coldest of the week at -20. In the evening students got to experience, bowling and visit the cinema, and being Presidents Day on the Saturday, we went to the local firework display, which was beautiful over the frozen lake.



















We then travelled into Manhattan to see the amazing views from 'Top of the Rock', then taking a short walk to 'Times Square'. Finishing of a perfect day, we had our evening meal at 'Hard Rock Cafe'.

Our last morning started with a big breakfast at the hotel, loading the coach with our luggage then off to Staten Island for the ferry crossing. Having a clear view of the Statue of

Liberty, we then took a short walk past the Charing Bull and Wall Street. All of our students showed respect and were surprised at how quiet and eerie Ground Zero was.

Then off to 5th Avenue for the students to have more retail therapy and before we knew it, it was time to leave for the airport,

ICELAND **RESIDENTIAL TRIP 2024**

Year 8 had the best fun in Iceland. We arrived in Reykjavik at lunchtime on Monday 4th March, after a very early start and our first stop was the Lava Tunnels, where we were able to witness the inner workings of a volcanic eruption as we walked in the path of lava that flowed during an ancient eruption. This was made even more magical when our guide turned off the lights! We've never seen darkness like that before! We then checked into our hotel, then headed off for a walk to the best pizza place in the town.













Day 2 –We made our way to Sólheimajökull Glacier where the wind was intense! We gathered our helmets, ice axes and crampons and took a very windy and wet walk to the glacier. This was the coldest we felt, but we persevered and made it! What we experienced while on this glacier was one of the most rewarding views we've ever seen! Colours of blue and white from the ice, and dark grey from the lava swirl around to make peaks that pop out into a triangular maze. Some of us even tasted the fresh glacier water (see picture to the left). After a quick pit stop at Seljalandsfoss waterfall we made our way to our countryside accommodation, and had fun playing in the games room.

Day 3 - The south coast tour. We visited Skogafoss waterfall and tried to count the steps up to the top. I think we counted 550 in the end. The black sand beach was amazing, we climbed the rocks, and went hunting for the best example of lava rock on the beach. On the way home we visited a cave and what an achievement it was climbing that (very small) hill.



























Day 4 - The golden circle tour - We visited the oldest swimming pool in Iceland...Shhhh, it's a Secret. 40 degrees of warm calming water, we rested our legs and had a float in the naturally heated water. We saw Geysirs, waterfalls, tectonic plate boundaries and smelt lots of sulphur. It was a glorious day but the temperature was about -15 degrees with the wind at the waterfall. In the evening we visited the local swimming pool where students braved the cold temperature to go on the waterslide and played basketball in the water. Some even had a dunk in the cold plunge pool! You're braver than

To end our trip we went to the Hamburger Factory before going back to our hotel in Reykjavik to pack our bags for a 2:15am start.

On behalf of the staff on the trip I'd like to say that the students were fantastic! They behaved impeccably, they followed instructions (mostly), they were polite, kind and friendly to each other and the Icelandic people. They went to bed in the evening, they listened well to the guide, and most of all they giggled and had a bloomin' great time!

- 1. Following early experience as mentors, Year 12s come together again for Part 2 of mentor training with deeper case studies and practical next steps for each student mentor.
- 2. Alongside resources provided for peer-peer sessions, Oppidan will run an online focus group with selected students to gather feedback and offer advice for scheme improvement.
- 3. After a group assembly, adult mentors meet Year 12s for 30-minute 1:1 sessions, providing an external ear for goal setting, guidance and motivation for what lies ahead.



MINDFULNESS & MEDITATION LIFE COACH







Digital Media Stop Motion Animation Lesson


If you are unable to collect your certificates personally we will need YOUR permission (via email) for someone else to collect on your behalf.

ACTIVE REVISION TECHNIQUES

1. MNEMONICS

Useful for learning key words and forcing students to develop their thought processes by rearranging information.

Example: Science

My Very Easy Method Just Speeds Up Naming Planets

2. PODCASTS

A great way to learn is to record your notes on to MP3 and listen to them on your mobile phone or iPod.

There are also some podcasts for your subjects to download from the Learning Platform or iTunes.

3. FLASH CARDS

To condense your revision notes, try transferring the key points for each topic onto a flash card.

Alternatively, test yourself with a question on the front and answer on the back.

4. COLOUR CODING

Use colours to link together all the knowledge you need for a topic - you could use different coloured highlighters to select key points in your notes or create revision cards on different coloured pieces of paper.

This will also break your revision down into manageable chunks.

5. QUICKFIRE PLANNING

Looking at past exam papers is one of the most useful ways to revise. Try planning your answers for as many exam papers as you can find, spending five or ten minutes on each paper.

This will also train you to plan quickly in the exam.

6. POST ITS


Write key quotations, equations, or facts onto Post It notes and stick around your room as a reminder.

You can also rearrange these to plan answers or group together information.

7. DOODLES

Transform your notes into small sketches and doodles to break up long texts or concepts.

Example: History



8. MINDMAPS

Start by writing a key word or question in the middle of the page. Stemming from that, write down as much information as you can remember relating to that topic.

You can then reorganise these notes into an essay plan.

YEAR 11 FORM TIME

From the beginning of this half term, we have adapted the weekly form timetable for Year 11 tutor groups, in order to further support students in the lead up to the exam period. Each week still begins in the same manner, with students' organisers checked and signed by tutors and students plan the upcoming week, in terms of homework deadlines, extended support opportunities, extra-curricular clubs and revision schedules. During this time, we urge students to continue to make effective use of their 'revision timetable', a valuable resource that was provided as part of the 'revision packs' each Year 11 student received prior to the mock exams.

The week itself now also includes three days that are dedicated to revision of English, Maths and Science specifically. Students can independently revise these core subjects, making use of the wide range of resources available, including: Tassomai, Sparx Maths, Google classroom and drive resources, past papers and more. After Easter, Thursdays will also centre around the implementation of the PIXL strategy: Prepare to Perform. Each week there will be a different focus that is based around ensuring students are fully prepared for the summer exam period. The spotlight will be placed on areas such as, organisation, sleep routines, nutrition and revision environments. During this time, tutors will be able to support students with revision strategies and help to embed crucial routines in the build up to the summer exams.

Furthermore, the assembly programme continues to support our Year 11 students with tailored assemblies focused on managing stress, establishing routine and driving aspirations among other key topics. Some of these assemblies will be led by the progress team, which continues to meet on a regular basis to ensure all students are being supported appropriately and are being given the tools they need to succeed. PERSONALISED LEARNING CHECKLISTS (PLCS) TO SUPPORT EXAM PREPARATION

All Year 11 students use PLCs within their subjects. These help ensure staff and students have an understanding of their particular subject and know exactly what they need to teach / learn. The PLC does this by listing the key areas of knowledge and understanding needed for a student to be successful in an examination / subject at a particular level or grade. Some faculties have adapted their PLCs to take into account the advance information released.

The PLC should be used to aid revision and address gaps in student learning on an ongoing basis. They will be colour coded red, amber or green depending on how a student is engaging with a particular topic. Any red and amber sections should be where students prioritise their revision.

G	I am confident about this topic and I know what I need to do.		
Α	I am not too sure about this topic. I may need to check with my teacher and spend more time working on this topic.		
R	I am not confident I could answer a question on this topic. I need to check with my teacher and ensure I have what I need to do it.		

Copies of each PLC can be accessed from our campus website here.

Top tips for using these PLCs:

- Click on a subject and download the PLC for each of your subjects or alternatively bring your copy home from school
- RAG rate (red, amber, green) for the topics you need to revise
- If you need further help revising certain topics then DO ASK your teachers
- Create a revision plan to cover all the topics between now and the exam season
- Spend longer on those that you rate as amber and red.

As parents/carers it might be beneficial to help your child to plan how and when they will cover each topic. Initially, it could seem daunting, but by continuing to work on topics each night students will be in the best possible position they can be. It is these small habits that will compound into remarkable results.


The MFL Faculty would like to help you better understand what Languages revision looks like so you can plan your revision in the run up to the GCSE exams.

Component 1A Television: Cuffs and The Avengers. Remember you will be shown a 3 minute clip of either Cuffs or The Avengers and make notes for half an hour before answering questions on the clip. The last two questions will be about the text not

included in the clip

Component 1B Promoting the Media: These are questions on either The Lego Movie, the Trailer for the film, the posters or The Lego

Movie Videogame.

Component 2A Music: This includes questions on Mojo magazine, the music videos Sk8er Boi and Teenage Dirtbag and Radio 1 Live

Lounge. You will be given a front cover of Mojo magazine to annotate and then compare with another unseen music magazine, which will probably be of a different genre. You do not get clips of the music videos, just questions.

Component 2B Newspapers: Questions about The Observer newspaper, both online and print. Later questions will be on context and

the newspapers from the 1960's.

Revision Ideas:

- Watch the episodes of Cuffs and The Avengers on the Google Drive
- Use the audio-visual language sheets to make notes on codes and connotations from any 3 minute extract.
- Read through the scans of the revision guide on the Google Drive
- Go back through the PowerPoints and resources on the Google Classroom provided for you after each lesson.
 They are all in categories to aid revision.
- Revise theories such as: Representation, Audience, Genre and Narrative.
- Revise representation of characters, ethnicity and gender in relation to texts.
- Revise Audience theories like Uses and Gratification Theory in relation to the texts.
- Read the Knowledge Organiser for all texts as a starting point for revision and create mind-maps to embed the information.

- Know the texts.
- Order of events, what has happened to lead to the various outcomes, which characters are involved.
- Read the guestions carefully.
- Read the whole question, some contain more than one focal point. Make sure you understand exactly what you are being asked.
- Show originality.
- You do need to know how you will structure your responses to ensure you cover all the relevant AOs but don't walk into the exam with pre prepared answers.
- Focus on the question throughout your answer.
- Comparisons, context fully woven into your argument, critical voices for Shakespeare used to support your own viewpoints.

You are all familiar with the Assessment Objectives, but if you still get a little confused, look back at the cover sheets on your marked essays – they are all there.

- Know which AO applies to which question.
- Examiners use the assessment objectives to mark your work, so show them your understanding of them.
- Remember there are numerous materials on the Drive to help you with your revision.
- There is also the pink folder in B16 containing sample essays from past students you are welcome to photocopy any of these.

A LEVEL ENGLISH LANGUAGE

Component 1: 23rd May 2024 Component 2: 7th June 2024

Component 1A Language Under the Microscope. You get a single text for this question, could be any kind of article, blog, speech, online extract, ect.. Annotate the text and answer questions paying attention to AO1 (Language Features) and AO3 (Context).

Component 1B Writing about a Topical Language Issue. You will be asked to write about an issue affecting language. This could be about technology, gender, power, the media, language change, or anything which affects the use of language in society. You will be assessed on AO2 (Theories and concepts) and AO5 (Your ability to write appropriately for the audience, form and purpose).

Component 1C Comparing and Contrasting Texts. You will be given two texts to compare, at least one will be spoken in the form of a transcript. You could get two transcripts. Focus on: spoken language features, the difference between spoken and written (if appropriate). Annotate both texts and respond to AO1, AO3, and AO4 (Comparison of texts).

Component 2A Child Language Acquisition. You will be given a single transcript of a conversation between a child and either an adult or an adult and more children. Annotate and respond to the question by discussing AO2 (theories and concepts) and AO1 (Language features).

Component 2B Language in the Media. You will get an article, which could be multi-modal to annotate and respond with discussion of AO2 and AO3.

Component 2C Language Change. A contemporary text and a text from the last 300 years to compare (AO4) in terms of Language (AO1) Context (AO3). The theme across both texts is the same, the comparison should be of the way language has changed over time in order to address the subject matter and the influences that have caused language change, either social or technological.

- Revise terminology in the current Section of the study guide by making flashcards or mind maps
- Do the short tasks in the study guide to reinforce the learning in lessons
- Make mind maps or flashcards for Concepts and Theories and Theorists
- Use the exam papers and marking criteria on the Google Drive to do practice papers
- Use the resources on the Google Classroom each week to revise and embed the teaching after lessons






