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“You can’t revise for English!”

- Flashcards, mind maps, posters, notes, annotated texts
- Plot, characters, themes, context, quotes
- Tassomai
- Practice questions
- Reading skill practice - comprehension, summary, analysis, comparison, evaluation
- Writing skill practice - planning, spelling, punctuation, grammar, paragraphing, linguistic and structural devices, writing with flair and creativity
- Exam technique - timings, expectations, structure

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Top Tips for Parents:

- Make sure your children are exposed to a range of texts: reading for pleasure, and newspaper articles in particular.
- Discuss what your child is reading, and discuss topical events - build understanding of the world, and how to convey ideas.
- Ask them to explain their knowledge organisers or make flashcards - ensure they know how each exam paper is structured. Quiz them on their texts and ask them to explain to you how they will structure questions in their exam.
- Documentaries are brilliant for revision. When revising something like *Animal Farm* for Literature, watch some good documentaries on George Orwell to give them that extra boost.
- Learning together in this way is really good for keeping students interested and engaged.
- Don't be shy about asking their teachers for advice on what to cover with them at home.

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Top Tips for Parents - Tassomai:

- Tassomai is a fantastic tool for revising key knowledge if used correctly.
- Encourage your child to complete little and often, not cram it all in on a Sunday night.
- Ensure they are checking their dashboards to see their weakest areas - this should be the main focus of their revision.
- Four daily goals every week ideally need to be completed over 4 days throughout that week - this helps them to balance their English revision with their other subjects too.
- Encourage them to answer as many questions as they can, while keeping their accuracy high.

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Top Tips for Parents - Quick Wins to Boost Grades Now:

- Answering one practice question a week that is handed in to be marked by their teacher (Language and Literature).
- Produce revision posters of key linguistic and structural devices (Language and Literature).
- Read through the Model Answer booklets on the drive to see what an excellent answer to a question should look like (Language and Literature).
- Ensure the basics are correct - capital letters, punctuation and spelling (Language and Literature).
- Making flashcards for key quotes (Literature) and learning them.
- Creating mind maps for the context for each text (Literature).
