To change the settings, pinch the screen when the app is open and this will load the map. Click on the icon in the top right hand corner, where you will be able to tick a box putting ghost mode on. Is your daughter old enough to have Snapchat? The minimum age for Snapchat is 13.

There was recently a new update to the SNAPCHAT app. It allowed users to add their location to a worldwide map of Snapchat users. If you do not have location enabled on your phone, you will be asked to turn it on.

Police have issued child safety warnings about the use of this app and time has been used in form time to discuss these concerns and to encourage our students to consider the potential dangers involved; Eg sexual predators knowing their location, providing burglars an opportunity to know when no one is home.

Once you enable this feature it adds you to a global map with potentially every Snapchat user able to see your exact location. Users of the app can also search for locations such as individual schools, with the app displaying public photos and videos sent by students.

The UK Safer Internet Centre said: "It is important to be careful about who you share your location with, as it can allow people to build up a picture of where you live, go to school and spend your time. "Given how specific this new feature is on Snapchat - giving your location to a precise pinpoint on a map - we would encourage users not to share their location, especially with people they don't know in person."

- Exam results will be sent to the students' school email addresses
- A Levels will be sent by 8am on Thursday 17 August and GCSE results will be sent by 8.30 am on Thursday 24 August.
- Should there be any email problems, we will post a message on twitter @AylesburyHigh in which case, students will need to come into school at the times stated below.
- The results sent home will **not** contain unit marks but will be overall grades only.
- Should students require more detailed information, they will need to come in at the following times:
 - On Thursday 17 August, school opens at 9am for Year 13 students only.
 - Students in Year 12 may collect results after 10am if they wish.
 - o On Thursday 24 August, school will be open at 9am for Year 11 students only
 - Year 10 students may collect their results after 10am if they wish.
 - Year 11 students will also be sent an online form to confirm their intentions for 2017/18, including subject choices. These must be completed and returned promptly please.
- After midday on both results day, any stamped addressed envelopes will be posted. Those unstamped can be collected from Reception at the start of the Autumn Term.
- Any students wishing to discuss their choices are welcome at the following times, no appointments are necessary:
 - Thursday 24 August between 9am and 3pm

Changes at AHS to on-line communications and payments

You should hopefully have seen my communication about AHS moving to ParentMail for our on-line payments and parent communication system. We are quite excited that this will streamline the bulk of our communications with parents and give you all the information on trips in one place. The key advantages include:

- an integrated system for both letters home and payments
- a user-friendly phone app
- for parents with children at more than one school using ParentMail there is only one login required
- as a bonus, we estimate we will save over £2,000 a year by switching money which we can put back into student resources.

Initially you will get an email from ParentMail, possibly as early as the afternoon on 20 July, which will contain the process to set up your account. We anticipate you being able to pay for meals, trips etc on ParentMail from 1 August.

We will close ParentPay to new payments at approximately 1430 on 21 July to allow us to reconcile the cashless catering accounts and start the transfer of balances to ParentMail.

Teaching & Learning Update by Mrs Tominey, Teaching & Learning Mentor

Over the last few months I've been carrying out an audit of where our strengths as a school lie. Each department or area of the school was asked to come up with what they consider their Unique Selling Points (USPs) to be. I then worked with three focus groups from Years 8, 10 and 12 to ask them what they particularly valued about each subject area. Next term we'll be looking at comparing teachers' perceptions with those of the students. In the meantime, however, a clear picture has emerged from the students as to what they really enjoy in their lessons at AHS.

AHS students like it when:

- They can relate their learning to the world around them and cover a broad range of topics
- There is a relaxed atmosphere in the classroom with fun activities
- The lessons are interactive
- They get the chance to be creative
- They work in groups or as a pair
- They have the chance to express their opinions in discussion
- There is a choice of task or the way in which they carry out a task

- Technology is used to support their learning and make it more fun
- Different abilities are accommodated
- There are trips to support their learning
- They can track their progress through effective marking
- There is a variety of different types of assessment
- There are frequent opportunities to practise exam skills
- They are given clear guidelines on how to revise

Alesbury Vale Teaching Partnership



National Funding Formula update by Mr Rosen

The Secretary of State announced her proposals for the long-awaited funding formula, to take effect from the 2018-19 financial year onwards.

We are very short of details at the moment but it is looking as though the SoS's statement was, to put it mildly, incomplete. She said that, "This formula settlement to 2019-20 will provide at least £4,800 per pupil for every secondary school" but it appears this isn't true for schools such as ours. I have asked the Education Funding Agency to look into this and clarify. In any case, we are expecting more details on the implementation of the NFF in September.

Chair of Governors Update by Mr Chaudhry

As we approach the welcome relief of a summer break for teaching and support staff, students, parents and Governors, it's worth highlighting the busy academic term we have had.

Governors have supported a range of school events and activities during this last term. As well as holding our various Governing Body meetings (Resources, Personnel and Teaching & Learning) we have given the 'vote of thanks' at the Years 7-10 Presentation Mornings, the welcome address to our new Year 7 parents, supported an Open Evening and importantly from the Governors' perspective had the opportunity to spend a day at school as a full Governing Body. The Governor feedback from that day included;

- At the Presentation Morning it was great to hear the students talking about their own forms in such a positive way.
- It is good to see the school in action and I was impressed by the diversity of activities.
- There was so much high energy around the school (despite being so close to the end of the year).
- Students were engaged in research projects and other interesting tasks in all lessons.
- Impressive use of technology to support learning and consolidation. It was nice to see non-traditional teaching and learning styles.
- Breadth of activities planned by teachers to ensure that all girls' needs are catered for.
- Students keen to share with us what they were working on.

At the last Full Governing Body meeting of the academic year I announced that we would, unfortunately be losing four long standing Governors (Cindy Bull, Sarah Marsh, Jane Blagg and Jane Lewis) all of whom have made significant contributions to the development and success of the school. Cindy had been a former Chair of Governors, most recently was Chair of the Teaching & Learning Committee and had been an AHS Governor for over 10 years. Sarah was a former Chair of the Teaching & Learning Committee and our Maths Governor, Jane Lewis had been our SEND, disabilities and Pupil Premium Governor and Jane Blagg had recently been our Deputy Chair of Governors.

As I look forward to the next academic year the key challenges will be setting our school budget, agreement of the revised national funding formula, completion of the existing building programmes, working with the Senior Leadership Team to implement the School Improvement Plan (SIP) and importantly recruiting three Parent Governors and a third Staff Governor. I am keen to build on the skills set of the Governing body and would particularly welcome parents who can bring strategic development, marketing, accountancy, financial and project management expertise.
