Industrial action, Thursday 10 July



Trips and Visits in 2013-14



School Funding



It is probably not headline news that we have a really tight budget and we don't expect too much sympathy as many businesses will be in the same position! Our main funding is in two parts - for the Sixth Form and for Key Stages 3 & 4. The Sixth Form funding is determined nationally and has been going down for several years, and will continue to do so. The funding for Years 7 to 11 has also gone down (despite the government's contention that this part of the budget is protected), although not by so much. At the same time, we have had inflation, changes to pensions, pay awards and

the need to continue to look after and develop the school site.

In March, the government announced additional funds for 'the least fairly funded local authorities' and the results of the consultation on their proposals will be announced later this month. Bucks is one of the lowest funded authorities for mainstream schools' funding (147th out of 151 authorities) and should be receiving additional funds for 2015-16. Secondary schools have been working hard to understand the way that funding is presently allocated to Bucks schools and are preparing plans to try to ensure that each pupil in Bucks is fairly funded. We have met with MPs and with Ministers, and will soon be in a position to submit proposals to Bucks to try to make the funding within the county more equitable.

At the same time, the DfE has published an interesting study into whether school funding affects attainment, ie does additional funding lead to higher exam performance? The answer seems to be that there *is* an effect but it is quite small and there is a remarkable lack of research in this area, given successive governments' initiatives, including the current (worthy) policy of directing scarce money to address disadvantage through the Pupil Premium.

As one of the lowest funded schools in the country, as are our fellow local secondary schools, we have always had a policy of managing our budget extremely carefully. As I hope parents and students will agree, the school is in a strong position at present, in terms of its curriculum, staff and facilities. To maintain and even improve that position, we will be launching a Development Campaign early in the Autumn Term, aimed at enhancing the school's ability to provide the best possible education to every girl (but not to fund our core activities). Please watch out for this!
