In Year 2 of the A Level course, we study Forensics, a unit which covers criminal profiling, plus explanations and treatments for offending behaviour. There are many related programmes that will appeal, e.g. 'The Making of a Murderer' and 'I am a Killer' series provide some insight into why individuals commit the crimes they do and how they are investigated. Age ratings for these programmes are unclear; some episodes will be suitable for 15+, but please check with your parents/guardians first and consider your own sensitivity to the issues before you watch them!
