
Highlights Easter 2019

New Erasmus+ Project

Through Comenius and now Erasmus+, AHS has been collaborating with the Lycée Georges Brassens (France), the Institut d'Educació Secundària Massanassa (Spain) and the Liceo Statale Guarino Veronese (Italy) for more than ten years. Taking part in the Erasmus+ programme helps students and teachers to develop personally and professionally: they gain valuable international experience, broaden their horizons, experience new cultures and discover new ways of working. It is of particular benefit to young people who can learn new skills to improve their employability, acquire life skills and develop their confidence.

This year has marked the start of our new Erasmus+ project, which will run until July 2021. This project, called "A StandArt for Europe: Renaissances, Resistances, Dreams", aims at reinforcing the education of young European citizens regarding the artistic and cultural background of their own country and that of their European neighbours. It wants to give students the keys to access and understand the arts.

The first Erasmus+ event this year was the visit of the Italian students from San Bonifacio as part of an exchange for Y10 and Y12 between 17-24 March. They had a wonderful week with their partners, going to lessons with them or taking part in day trips or activities related to our Erasmus+ project, like a street art tour and workshop in East London or a Shakespearean treasure hunt in Stratford-upon-Avon. The highlight of the week was the Erasmus+ day, when 49 French students from our partner school in Rive-de-Gier came to join the AHS and Italian students for a whole day of activities about European art. It was brilliant to see students from different nationalities working collaboratively to learn about their artistic heritage. We are now looking forward to visiting our Italian friends in San Bonifacio next month!



AHS Geographers explore Aylesbury

On 5 March Year 12 Geographers ventured out into Aylesbury to investigate their 'local place', for our topic Changing Places. The day provided a valuable insight into the impacts of the changes that are taking place within the town centre and the external influences that are driving the regeneration of the Market Town.

The day started with a talk from a town planner who works for Aylesbury Vale District Council. We learnt about the complexities of her job and how difficult it is to get all members of the community on board with new planning projects; for example, many local residents were against the building of the Travelodge Hotel and Waitrose by the Waterside theatre.

We then went out into Aylesbury collecting primary data such as environmental quality surveys to assess the quality of the built environment of Aylesbury, as well as speak to local people to see how the lived experience of residents, visitors and workers has changed over time.

It was great to see that there are many different place identities associated with Aylesbury, and there was even time for an ice cream and a selfie with Bowie!
