AHS pupils inspired by Anthony Nolan to help save lives

A record breaking 113 sixth form students were inspired by Anthony Nolan, a charity that helps to save the lives of people with blood cancer or blood disorders, to register for stem cell donations as part of their 'Hero Project'.

Every day, the charity matches incredible individuals who are willing to donate their stem cells or bone marrow to people who desperately need transplants to save their life.

It is good news that 69% of Northern European stem cell transplant recipients receive the best possible match, however that falls to 20% for patients of a black, Asian or ethnic minority background as there are not enough people from ethnic minority groups on the register. But the Anthony Nolan trust are working hard to combat this.

When asked how they felt about entering their names on the stem cells donor register, the most common answer from AHS pupils was, "it's a great feeling to know that we can help save the life of someone who may not even be related to us and it's amazing that it takes no more than 5 minutes to register to save someone's life".



Tins, cans and aerosols



Newspapers, magazines and shredded paper



Paper, envelopes and phone directories



Milk, juice and soup cartons



Glass bottles and jars (lids off)



Foil, clean and scrunched up



Cardboard, greeting cards and wrapping paper (without foil or glitter)
