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Congratulations to ...

...the 174 students who completed their **Duke of Edinburgh's Awards** this term! In the case of Year 11, three quarters of the year group, an impressive 138 students, achieved their Bronze award, and in Year 12, 34 students achieved their Silver award. This makes AHS the top school in the South East for both the number of students who start D of E and the number of students who then go on to complete and achieve their awards. It is very easy to start the award, but not so easy to get it all finished, particularly when doing it in the midst of GCSE work. To achieve it, they must complete four sections: physical, volunteering, skills and the expedition. AHS students have done everything from being a scout leader to volunteering at a pig sanctuary, from baking to learning Korean, and from cricket to taekwondo. For some, the expedition section is the highlight, but for others the greatest hurdle, as they must independently navigate around the countryside, carrying all their equipment and food, and camp overnight.

All in all, completing the award gives students a great sense of achievement and allows them to take up and get recognition for many new skills that they would never achieve in the classroom. Even more importantly, they make lasting memories and have a lot of fun whilst doing it. AHS staff give up a huge amount of time helping to run expeditions and acting as assessors across the four sections. We also know how important parents' support and encouragement is to girls completing the award, so I would like to take this opportunity to thank parents and staff. Year 11 Geography Field Trip

On Friday, 8 November, the Year 11 geographers headed to Boscombe and completed the Human side of our fieldwork. An example of the fieldwork we carried out was the environmental quality survey, based on the abundance of graffiti, litter, vandalism and building quality, in different 100m by 100m areas. The idea was to show how the regeneration, which was centred mainly around the seafront and the places closest to the beach, had an impact on the whole surrounding town. We also completed a survey in the area, talking to shoppers about their views on different areas of the high street



Saturday was spent in Swanage assessing the success of the new coastal defences which have been created within the bay. This involved taking measurements from uprights on either side of each groyne - and getting thoroughly soaked through in the process! Later in the day, when we had dried out, we walked along the beach at Studland and learnt about the sand dunes there. One of the many highlights of the trip was seeing Durdle Door on the Sunday; the weather allowed us to have stunning views of the arch and also a lovely time on the beach.

German Trip to Berlin

The A level German Berlin trip this year had so many highlights. Even though it was only four days in the capital, the amount we experienced could have lasted us a fortnight. No one can say that we didn't make proper use of the time we had in Berlin! Even though the days were long, the experience was invaluable. It was unlike any other trips to Germany that I've done with school. We went with 8 boys from AGS, and by the end we were all a tight knit group, even though I hadn't met half the people on the trip before in my life.

Now, I definitely feel more confident speaking to people in German, as we all did a presentation on a landmark whilst there. Berlin is overflowing with history, you can quite literally stumble over it in the streets thanks to the Stolperestein (or tripping stones, commemorating victims of the Nazis). The museums were brilliant, with tons of knowledge for us to try and absorb, however I believe the best highlight of the trip was Amplemann. Amplemann is the man on traffic lights telling people when to cross. A certain design was used by East Berlin and when the West took over they requested that Amplemann was left alone. We have since had an Amplemann day where we wore all our Amplemänner badges and T-shirts to school.

We all had a brilliant time in Berlin and owe the teachers who ran it, a big thank you. Lots of us hope to go back one day to explore much more of the rich history surrounding the city.

It has been a very busy month in Design and Technology. We have had Technology House competitions for Years 7, 8 and 9. The Years 7 and 9 teams of four were required to build the tallest cantilevered structure spanning a gap. It was a tense time building and constructing but in the end Missenden won in Year 7 and Stowe came first in Year 9.

Year 8 House Technology was won by Ascott house and along with the Years 7 and 9 winners will go on to represent AHS at the Aylesbury Hundreds Rotary Club Technology Tournament next February.

Mr Potkin has entered around 100 students from his current Years 7 and 9 classes into the BP Ultimate STEAM competition. This year the theme is Wearable Technology. In groups of 4 students they prepared a presentation and designed a new piece of technology. There are some very innovative designs ranging from virtual reality contact lenses to GPS trackers built into trainers for young children. The winning team will be invited to the BP Upstream Learning Centre in Sunbury where they will be able to see the latest technologies in development, win prizes and work with material scientists and engineers to build their own designs turned into a working prototype.

A team of 6 Year 12 students have been working with mentors from the company Leonardo Selex in producing a Raspberry Pi-controlled landmine-detecting vehicle. They will be attending a workshop at UCL in January to start building their machine.

The F24 racing team is using the winter season to raise sponsorship, successfully bringing on board Fronius, RS Design and Technology Services and have given a presentation to the Rotary (Hundreds) Club of Aylesbury who are very keen to get involved. Designs have been completed and production of the new car has begun - we are hoping to put the car on the track for the new race season.


