

PUPIL PREMIUM GRANT (PPG)

Overview

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is a government initiative that was introduced in 2011 to target resources on those students deemed to be from a financially disadvantaged background. Specifically, the PPG is provided for those students who are currently entitled to Free School Meals (FSM), or who have been entitled to FSM at any point over the past 6 years (Ever 6) and students who are looked after by the local authority (LAC). There is also a smaller provision for students whose parent(s) are currently serving in the armed forces to address the emotional and social well-being of these students.

This initiative is based on research showing that young people from low income families perform less well at school than their peers. These students can sometimes face challenges such as poor language and communication skills, less family support, lack of confidence and issues with attendance and punctuality.

PPG is additional to main school funding and is used to provide additional educational support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement of students who are eligible.

Free School Meals

PPG is awarded to all students who are eligible for Free School Meals. If the student is not wanting to receive the benefit of free school meals, it is still in their interest to apply so that they can benefit from the PPG. Details of criteria are available at:

Contributions

The school receives the following amounts for each student:

- Looked after children/young people
 - LAC defined in Children Act 1989 as one who is in the care of, or provided with accommodation by, an English local authority

 - Children who have ceased to be looked after by a local authority in England and Wales because of adoption, a special guardianship order, a child arrangements order or a residence order.
- Students in Year 7 to 11 recorded as FSM Ever 6

Main barriers faced by disadvantaged students at Aylesbury High School

- Reduced access to resources due to a lack of understanding or reluctance to gain available financial and supportive initiatives
- Parents experience of education may prohibit student engagement in co-curricular opportunities for participation in learning support
- Restricted access to all the opportunities offered as part of our co-curricular programme potentially due to;
 - Distance from school to home
 - o Financial system currently offered by AHS
- Students not staying on for Sixth Form

Plans for 2019/20

The school has looked carefully at the needs of each PP student, applying the following intervention strategies as necessary for each young person.

Academic Support

We aim to:

- Improve quality first teaching and ensure that all teaching staff are aware of PP students that they teach encourage individual strategies to be logged on the Intervention Sheets.
- Arrange annual one to one meetings with our PP Learning Assistant to audit need
 - Explain the funding
 - Discuss extra-curricular visits
 - Offer and organise additional resources such as revision guides
 - Provide equipment (e.g calculator)
 - Provide study skills
- Monitor performance and attendance and provide appropriate additional support for students in KS3/4.
- Use targeted learning (one to one or small group) to focus on helping students to make improved progress and to raise their standards of achievement.
- Increase access to additional Maths and English support from Year 10.
- Provide opportunities for independent study and homework completion both after school and via the Learning Support drop-in sessions.

Co-curricular Opportunities

We aim to:

- Improve the access to co-curricular opportunities outside of the classroom that help build self-esteem and improve motivation for learning.
- Improve the Request for Financial Assistance Form to parents/carers and publicise more effectively.
- Improve communication with all students eligible for the Pupil Premium Funding to explain what resources are available.
- Improve access to information about careers and further education

Service and Pupil Premium Pastoral Support

We aim to:

• Offer additional pastoral support provided through the school's Student Welfare Coordinator.

Resources

We aim to:

- Support the purchase of Chromebooks to new Year 7 and ensure surplus are available in the library for loan.
- Continue to provide school breakfast as necessary.
- Continue to offer a £100 towards uniform for Year 6 on FSM and £50 each year afterwards.
