Gold Crest Award for Sixth Form Students

Last year, a team of six Year 12 students entered the EDT Gold competition, where we designed a bird deterrent. We worked alongside mentors from the company Leonardo and Mr Potkin. Our brief was to design a bird deterrent that will scare birds away from office buildings without emitting loud noises. When a bird sings, the microphones on the deterrent will pick up the signal, and then a bandpass filter cleans the input data. This stream of data is inputted into the Raspberry Pi (a type of computer), which will then set off a mechanism of flashing lights to scare the bird.

Despite the COVID restrictions, we worked together as a team and managed to create a prototype. Each of us has received a Gold CREST award for the project. **Maiurie Rasakulasuriar**



MFL

Just before the summer holidays, The MFL Department entered 17 students for the inaugural Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators. The competition received over 1000 entries from schools across the country and a team of translators from across the UK, along with Oxford undergraduates, worked together to judge the competition. We were delighted to have winning students in all three languages:

French Level 4 - Isla Lloyd Evans (then Y11) Spanish Level 3 - Maryam Seraj (then Y11) German Level 3 - Elizabeth Maher (then Y9)

Isla did particularly well, as her translation was up against entries from Y12 and Y13 students, and she has been invited to participate in an online translation workshop run by the University of Oxford. Unsurprisingly, Isla is currently studying both French and German for A Level!

We also entered 16 students for the Stephen Spender Youth Translation Prize, where they had to translate a poem from a language of their choosing into English. Our entries showcased the languages taught in school (French, German and Spanish), but also featured some of the many languages spoken at home by our students, including Polish, Urdu, Tamil, Hindi and Telugu.

Many congratulations to Zoey Chung (then Y10), whose translation of a Chinese poem was Highly Commended in the "16 years and under" category.

This year, we will be participating in the UK Linguistics Olympiad for the first time and joining forces with the English Department for a special Jane Eyre-themed translation and writing competition. We would love to have more entrants than ever this year, so look out for details on how to enter!
