

Enjoy this festive, magical look at Christmas with the Christmasaurus.






Recommended for Years 3-4

This trilogy of Christmas books by Matt Haig are full of humour, warmth and a sprinkle of Christmas magic!

Recommended for Years 5-6

A Partridge in a Pear Tree: Read a story set in the countryside, the forest or a jungle.

Turtle Doves: Turtle doves symbolise love. Read a book where there is a strong relationship between the characters. This does not have to be romantic love!

Three French horns: Read a book set somewhere other than the UK.

Four Calling Birds: Read a book where one of the main characters in an animal.

Five Golden Rings: Read a book where there is a treasure or something precious that the main character seeks. Six Geese a Laying: Snuggle down! Make a cosy reading den with lights and decorations. Enjoy your choice of book with a family member.

Seven Swans a Swimming: Read a book where there is a link in some way. This could be a river, lake, sea, snow, etc...



Eight Maids a Milking: Read a book where the main character is a female.

Nine Ladies Dancing: Read a book that brings you joy and happiness.

Ten Lords a Leaping: Read a book where one character has got a lot of power, e.g. king, queen, pharaoh, headteacher.

Eleven Pipers Piping: Read and perform a winter-themed poem.

Twelve Drummers Drumming: Read a book from an author you have not come across before.
