

Why is reading important?



Department for Education

Research from the **Department for Education** and **National** *Literacy Trust* shows that students who regularly read for pleasure:

- Gain better access the curriculum and, beyond school, go on to fully participate in society and the workplace.
- Develop higher levels of self-esteem and a greater ability to cope with difficult situations.
- Have better sleep patterns.
- Are three times more likely to have **better mental health** than those who don't.
- Achieve better grades.



Choosing the right reading material

- Use our Library and Recommended Reading Lists
- Use your local library
- Look out for books in local charity shops.
- Get your child to agree to read the first chapter and see how they get along.
- Ask our dedicated staff for their book recommendations.





- The Library is open for students to use every day before school from 8:15am and after school until 4:15pm as well as break and lunch times.
- Students can borrow up to **three books over a fortnight** with the option to renew up to three times.
- **Beanbags** are available for students who would like to relax with a book or who need a quiet space during social times.
- After school **book club** on Thursdays for students who would like to discuss books with others.
- Librarian always on hand to offer recommendations to students who aren't sure which book is right for them for them.
- **Dyslexia friendly books** for students who need support with reading also helps students who may be reluctant to read.
- **Reading Lists** available on website updated annually.
- Students can **browse online** using our online service on the website.

- Stock up your home with plenty of reading materials.
- Figure out what kind of books your child enjoys.






