

A Year 7 pupil talks about the Queen's Jubilee?

Why do we celebrate the Queen's Jubilee?

Elizabeth II was born in London on 21 April 1926, but she wasn't expected to ever become queen. Her uncle Edward was King and the rules meant that if he had children, they would one day succeed him.

However, when Elizabeth was 10 years old, her life changed forever. Edward gave up the throne and, on 12 May 1937, her father took over to become King George VI. When her father died in February 1952, Elizabeth who was 25 at the time, became the Queen.





During the month of June, the UK celebrate to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. On the 6th of February 2022, (roughly 4 months ago) Queen Elizabeth II became the first ever British Monarch in history to achieve a Platinum Jubilee which is 70 years of reign and service to her people (the United Kingdom the realms and the Commonwealth).

Due to the Queen's Jubilee celebrations the UK gets a bank holiday which started on Thursday the 2nd of June until the next day; Friday the 3rd of June. Many people have asked or wondered why the bank holiday takes place in June as the 70th anniversary happens in February. The reason for this is because the 6th of February was also the anniversary of the Queen's late father so due to this the Queen did not wish to celebrate her Jubilee on the same day.

It is also important to know that many other countries celebrate the Jubilee as well as the United Kingdom. Countries in the Commonwealth celebrated the jubilee by lighting beacons in all 54 capital cities that currently exist within the Commonwealth. Infact, even Australia is renaming an island within its national capital 'Queen Elizabeth II Island' in her honour!

This will be her 4th ever jubilee; her 1st being in 1977, second in 2002, third in 2012 and now her fourth in 2022.

A Year 10 pupil talks about the benefits of apprenticeships

Why is it so important?

An apprenticeship is a form of work experience that allows students to simultaneously work and apprehend skills before they officially step foot into their field, all while getting paid. There are many skilled and intelligent university students across the UK. Companies often offer apprenticeships to teach these students skills they would otherwise not learn in their mundane classroom environment. Students get the opportunity to work under contracts with set wages and holidays all to prepare them with skills and knowledge for their future careers. So why not learn these skills in the classroom?



The appeal of an apprenticeship not only lies in what you learn but also *how* you learn it. Learning different aspects of your field through textbooks, lectures and online can be helpful, however it also leaves a lot of unanswered questions and can sometimes be subjective to different peoples' opinions. Everyone's experiences and skill set differ so questions about these topics aren't answerable in a way that applies to everyone. As well as this there are many skills and principles an apprenticeship could instil, that classrooms would not properly teach or explain the importance of. Learning these things first hand, through real world examples, not only better prepares students for their future careers, but saves them the hassle and stress of learning these skills on their own, before they start work, or after they've already started working, possibly setting them behind.

Furthermore these skills, or lack thereof, could also hinder a student's chances of employment. In a survey of 1000 employers, 49% said they would prefer students with work experience in their relevant fields and favoured students who had participated in apprenticeships. Another benefit of an apprenticeship is that it caters to practical learners. Many people can comprehend information in classrooms, lectures and textbooks however find it difficult theorising situations and therefore have trouble learning skills that aren't necessarily needed in that situation. Many students need genuine scenarios to learn, comprehend and apply skills, and apprenticeships are the perfect programmes to utilise this. This is especially true for students whose jobs and fields require a lot of practical work such as doctors, engineers and teachers.

Students who experience genuine difficulties during their apprenticeships and persevere, tend to ingrain the skills needed to escape these situations better than those who learn these skills through anecdotes or others' examples and situations. As well as this, the practicality of apprenticeships and programmes instil good work ethics into young people as they are forced to confront real time pressure and deadlines that have actual consequences for not completing. Overall, apprenticeships allow students to learn skills organically and have an easier transition into the working world.

Why is it important to celebrate Refugee Week?

On the week beginning 20th June, Lister celebrated Refugee Week. It's a week to celebrate the contributions and successes of Refugees and displaced people in our society. From reading refugee-themed poems over the tannoy, to having discussions in tutor time, there are many things the school did to celebrate. However the two most noticeable things we did for Refugee month were raising money for charity and hosting a panel discussion.



The panel was comprised of three people who had experience of working with refugees and asylum seekers in various different countries, from Britain to France to Greece, these professionals have helped better the world we live in. Students listened intently to their experiences and asked lots of questions to further learn about what it was like to work with refugees. What I found most interesting was learning about all the different volunteering options and career paths to take if someone wanted to work in a charity.



The school also raised money for a wonderful charity called Refugee Council, which provides support and advice to refugees and asylum seekers, as well providing support for other organisations that work with refugees. We raised money in two ways: by having a trainer day and urging students to bring in a £1 donation, and busking (playing music / performing for money) in the agora before school and in the playground at break time. In total we raised £130!

Especially considering how refugee crises effect so many people, it is as important as ever that we continue to support those in need and those who don't have the same rights as us. A big thank you to all students and teachers who contributed.


