In this unit children learn the names of common articles of clothing, revise adjectives of colour and learn some common adjectives. They will learn to apply these to describing clothes, shopping for clothes and giving opinions about clothes.		In this unit children learn to understand and use the names for places in their local area. They learn to understand, ask and give directions and further develop their dictionary skills. There are opportunities to exchange information about their local area with another school at home or abroad.		This unit can be used at the end of year 6 and the beginning of year 7 as a bridging unit. It allows primary children to celebrate and consolidate what they have learnt. Work might include: preparing for a real or imaginary visit; study of a French-speaking location; planning and executing a joint project with a partner school abroad; planning and performing a concert of French songs and sketches; a French day; meeting MFL teachers from receiving secondary schools; videoconferencing with French-speaking pupils abroad.
