- The Shema is the most important prayer for Jews and is one of only two prayers commanded in the Torah. It is recited twice daily. In the prayer Jews recite that they believe in only one God.
- God is a single unity who is whole, complete and invisible. It is impossible to divide God into parts or describe him by physical attributes. To try to do so is simply man's imperfect attempt to understand the infinite.
- God is the only being to whom Jews should offer prayer and praise.

Creator

Belief that God created the universe and that his creation is good is important for Jews because it means that:

- Creation is a gift from God and therefore Jews must look after it.
- Since God created the universe and all things in it, life has meaning and purpose given to it by God.
- God's work of creation did not stop after Genesis 1, God is continually involved in creation. In their prayers everyday Jewish people praise God who, "In His goodness renews the works of creation each day continually."

Lawgiver

The best example of God as a lawgiver is in his gift of the Torah - the Law - to Moses on Mount Sinai. In Exodus the Jewish people were freed from slavery in Egypt and needed guidance. God gave them the Law so they could live good lives.

- Jews believe that they are the children of God; as such he is father like.
- Only God has the power to rule and judge and destroy.
- There are 613 laws or mitzvot that can be found in the Torah. Following these laws given by God is the basis of Jewish life.

Judge

- The world is protected from chaos.

- People who are faithful will be recognised by God.
