Usually provided by local authorities

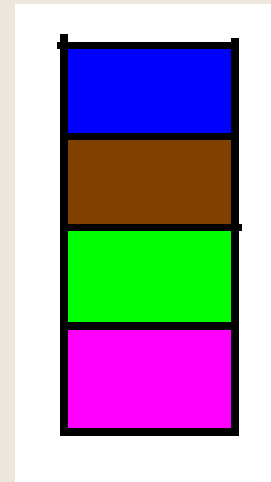
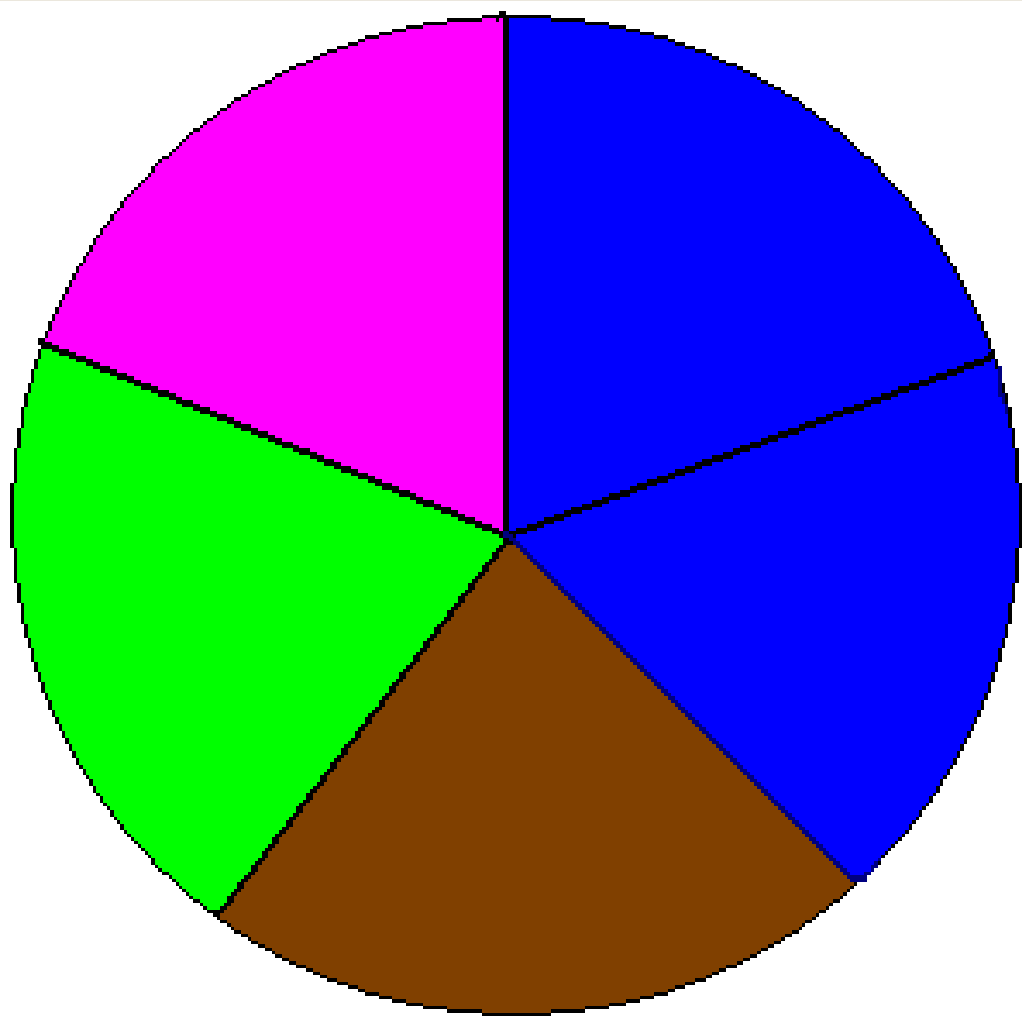
GP, Dentist, Optician, Physiotherapist, Community Nurses

Family centres, advice and information, child minding, basic education.

Word	Definition	Examples
Statutory provision	This means it is funded and provided by the Government and these services must be offered by law. It is divided into Statutory health and Statutory local authority.	<u>Health Services</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •NHS <u>Local Authority Services</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Children's services such as children's centre's •Education •Social Services •Leisure services
Private provision	These are made by businesses that make profit	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Private companies such as hospitals •Private professionals eg. physiotherapist
Voluntary provision	This is provided by charities or community groups that do not make a profit. They help statutory services to cope.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Charities (age concern etc) •Local support groups •Non-profit organisations (the Samaritans)
Informal provision	This is when care is provided free by families, friends and neighbours.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Family •Friends •Neighbours
