

Overview of Bridging Course

Department: English Literature

What is the focus of this bridging course?

- Students will be introduced to Tragedy as a literary genre.
- Students will be introduced to King Lear as one of their set texts.
- Students will begin to apply ideas they learn about tragedy, to their reading of the opening scene of King Lear.

King Lear.	
w/b 27 April	 Overview of what students will cover this week: Students will learn about what the course entails, and the different aspects of the A-level in English Literature. Students will be recap ideas they might already have learn about tragedy when studying Macbeth at GCSE. Students will then begin to learn about the genre elements in more detail. Students will learn about Aristotle and Poetics. They will understand that there are a range of ideas about tragedy as a genre and begin to read about how the genre has changed over time. Students will watch King Lear to get a sense of the whole play and then read the opening scene from King Lear. Students will answer comprehension questions, and more open questions to secure understanding.
w/b 4 May	 Students will recap and consolidate ideas on Aristotle's Poetics. Students will learn about other ideas associated with tragedy. They will learn about ideas proposed by Hegel and Nietzsche. Students will learn about how to analyse a dramatic literary text. Students will then apply what they know directly to Act 1 Scene 1 of King Lear, focusing specifically on a detailed and close analysis of how Lear is presented as the tragic protagonist in the opening scene.
w/b 11 May	 Students will learn about contextual ideas about gender. Students read articles on tragedy – Peck and Coyle, and Richard Gill to continue to consolidate understanding. Students will then closely analyse how Cordelia, Goneril and Regan are presented in the opening scene. Students will learn about the concept of order and how this is presented and then subverted in scene 1 of the play.
w/b 18 May	 Students will learn about some of the ways to approach, plan and write essays. Students will plan: "In the opening scene of the play, it is impossible to see Lear as a great king or a great father." To what extent do you agree? Remember to analyse Shakespeare's dramatic methods. Students will then write their essay.
