We are delighted that you are considering joining St Mary's Sixth Form as a place to continue your studies. Whether you're moving up from our school or joining us from elsewhere, our Sixth Form offers a highly distinctive experience.

Being the only mixed Catholic Sixth Form in the city, our Sixth Form is a vibrant and energetic place to study. Sixth Form life involves much more than simply academic study. At St Mary's, we are proud of the provision we offer, which allows students to develop a wide range of skills and knowledge, as well as providing many opportunities for students to develop as individuals in a more social, moral, ethical, and spiritual sense.

Our Sixth Form is characterised by its strong sense of community, and wide-ranging curriculum and its broad offer of extra-curricular opportunities. We have an outstanding Sixth Form Centre, a highly dedicated team of pastoral staff, teachers, and leaders, as well as a highly talented and industrious student body, characterised by its enthusiasm, talents and intelligence.

Ethos

As a Sixth Form that is proud of its Catholic tradition, our ethos is very important. We are a very caring and supportive community where every student is valued and where every student's gifts, talents and interests are nurtured and encouraged.

Students are given many opportunities to explore and develop in faith, whether that is through contributing to form assemblies, leading prayers, or using the opportunities to develop faith, through Masses, pilgrimage, being part of the Pope John Paul II Award. Our Faith in Action is seen through much of the work we do. Students regularly make contributions to charity, by organising events such as cake sales, car washes and other events, and Sixth Form students make a significant contribution to the care and support offered in the main school by leading and helping others in many activities. Students in our Sixth Form are trained Peer Mentors, subject tutors and reading coaches who help support students who are vulnerable or require support.

Integral to the Sixth Form is an embodiment of a clear set of fundamental Gospel values in the community, which provide opportunities for all students to achieve their full potential, whilst placing the teachings of Christ at the centre and promoting the Catholic ethos.

St. Mary's Sixth Form is committed to excellence, approaching everything with a commitment to diversity, inclusivity, and an aspiration to provide the best all-around education for all students irrespective of their faith, ability, culture, or ethnicity.

Achievement

At St Mary's, we are proud of the excellent exam results students achieve year on year.

A-level results are now among the very highest in the northeast. Over the last three years, the A-level pass rate has averaged 99.3%. An impressive 44% of all A-level entries were A*-A, 71% A*-B and 90% A*-C. Vocational A-levels are equally impressive. The pass rate has been 100% over the last three years, and an incredible 75% of entries were Distinctions or starred Distinctions, with 99% at Merit level or higher.

In 2020, there was a 100% pass rate in A Level courses, with 92% of students gaining A*-C grades and over 75% achieving A*-B. Impressively, over 46% of grades awarded in 2020 were A*-A. In vocational subjects, 95% of students achieved a Merit or above, with 90% gaining a Distinction or above. Remarkably, 29 of St Mary's A-level students each achieved straight A*-As in their A-levels last year, and 8 of those students achieving straight A*'s.

In recent years a number of students have gained places at Oxford and Cambridge to read Natural Science, Medicine, Modern Languages, Linguistics, Mathematics, History & Politics and Engineering, with more than half the cohort going off to other Russell Group universities.

Opportunities

There are many exciting opportunities for students to take up over the course of their time in our Sixth Form. We offer many opportunities, not only to pass examinations and gain important qualifications for future career paths, but also to develop as an individual in a Catholic environment including spiritual development and providing service to your community. In a competitive market, we seek to ensure that our students stand out from their peers. For example, students are offered opportunities to lead others in the school community and provide service to others in the Student Leadership Scheme, carry out charity work throughout the city and the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

Life in the Sixth Form is vibrant, busy, and exciting. There is an atmosphere of focus and direction, but also a sense of camaraderie and mutual support. The support for sixth formers begins now, in Year 11, as we work with students and their families to ensure students are placed on appropriate courses that are suitable and that are linked to students' future career aspirations.

From this prospectus, you will get a strong sense of what is on offer at our distinctive Sixth Form. However, should you wish to discuss any aspect of the Sixth Form in more detail, you are more than welcome to contact the Sixth Form Pastoral Team at the school. We look forward to working with students in Year 11 and their families to ensure a smooth and enjoyable transition into the Sixth Form.


We believe that it is our duty to offer a variety of experiences for our students, so that they can develop as dignified and fulfilled young people who can leave our Sixth Form as well-rounded individuals ready to make a positive contribution to society.



Every day, students have the opportunity to join their form tutors and peers in Morning Prayer. There are regular opportunities for collective worship throughout the year in the form of voluntary Masses and special Liturgies at important times in the Church's year such as Advent and Lent.

Sixth Form students have the opportunity for an annual Retreat, an annual Day of Aspiration and to work with JustIs; they are also given the opportunity to take part in pilgrimage and the Pope John Paul II Award. This award recognises the work young people undertake in their local, school and parish communities, where they have used their God-given talents in order to serve others. We believe firmly in putting our faith into action, and students do this in a variety of ways.

In recent years, students have worked closely with a range of charity organisations to raise awareness of the troubles women face in Kenya or the crisis in the Congo, as well as supporting charities such as CAFOD and Macmillan by organising fund-raising events.



Our students also demonstrate their faith by taking on supportive roles in school to help students who are vulnerable.

Our Sixth Form has a supportive atmosphere and, although we are a distinctively Catholic Sixth Form, we welcome and celebrate other faiths in our community too.

Our students have high aspirations and so there is a strong focus on achievement and diligence. For example, during independent study periods, our students stay on site to continue their studies in areas dedicated for focus work such as the Sixth Form Supervised Study Room, the Sixth Form Library and the Sixth Form Work Area.





Personal Support

The transition into Sixth Form can sometimes seem daunting. Specialising in certain subjects, and being expected to be able to work autonomously and prioritising work, can be difficult for some. To support this transition, students have daily contact with their form tutor who will be experienced in supporting students and helping them to achieve their absolute best.

The relationship between the form tutor and student is essential to success in the Sixth Form, as tutors will monitor and support students throughout the two years of their studies, acting as both a pastoral guide and academic mentor. They will work with their tutees, getting to know them well as individuals, helping to nurture their talents and interests as well as supporting them academically. Form tutors will have the holistic overview of how our students are progressing in the Sixth Form and they will be the first point of contact if parents or students have any concerns or problems.



As well as a form tutor, students are currently supported by a Sixth Form Pastoral Team

consisting of two Heads of Year (each dedicated to either Year 12 or Year 13) and an Assistant Headteacher leading the Sixth Form. As key and senior leaders in the school, they work with students and their families to ensure their needs are met. They will monitor students' pastoral and academic progress very closely to ensure all students are fully supported in reaching their full potential, and provide intervention if this is not the case.

We work hard with parents and carers to ensure all of our students' needs are met. We are happy to discuss with parents any aspect of your child's needs and developments at any point throughout the course of the year.

Financial Support

16-19 Bursary

Students at St Mary's have the opportunity to apply for financial support to help them continue with their Sixth Form studies. The 16–19 Bursary was introduced by the Government and payment should be used to help students fund such things as:

- Travel to and from school
- Stationery
- Travelling to university open days
- · Books and revision guides

There are two types of bursary, standard and enhanced. Your child can only apply for one of these, depending on their personal circumstances.

The payment of the bursary will be conditional on your child meeting the requirements of the St. Mary's Sixth Form expectations on behaviour, attendance, and punctuality.

Your child can apply for either bursary by completing the form on the Newcastle City Council website.

The application process for this support opens in June and closes in December of every academic year.







Students from other schools

We warmly invite students who have studied their GCSEs at other schools to apply to our Sixth Form. The process is straightforward. Complete an application form, available from the school website, and submit it to the school by 18th February 2022. You will then be invited into school to meet Mr. Turnbull, Assistant Headteacher – Sixth Form, to discuss aspects of your application and to discuss your options. Any offer of a place at St Mary's will be subject to entry requirements being met for specific courses and to receiving a satisfactory references from your current school.


Nurturing High Ambition

St Mary's Sixth Form prides itself on creating a learning culture of high expectation, where all students are actively encouraged to maximise their potential. In doing so, we believe our students leave us as confident, articulate and caring people who are well-equipped with the academic skills to succeed and flourish in higher education or the workplace. At St Mary's, students attend lessons that are stimulating and challenging and, as an inclusive school, we endeavour to ensure that the needs of our talented and ambitious students are met in a variety of ways.

We are extremely proud of the academic achievement of our students. St Mary's Sixth Form has a track record for high achievement by the most able who consistently achieve grades A*/A in their chosen subjects at A-level. Students mostly achieve A*-B grades in the most demanding subjects.

As well as ensuring our students are catered for through excellent teaching in lessons, our talented and ambitious students have recently been involved in a variety of opportunities.

- The Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), to develop and strengthen study skills in an area of a student's own choosing. Students research a topic, evaluate sources, and prepare a 5,000-word-long essay. Guided by a mentor, students have to work autonomously to complete this original piece of work and, as such, an EPQ is highly regarded by universities.
- Completing the Thinking Skills AS qualification in Year 12. Throughout the course, students are given the opportunity to develop a strong ability to think independently, present well-reasoned and logical arguments, and deconstruct, examine, and judge claims made by a wide range of sources.
- Working through the Career Ready scheme (formerly Careers Academy UK) to secure placements in a variety of



sectors including law and banking, as well as working with leading business mentors to work on developing skills to be successful in the workplace.

- Attending subject-specific lectures and workshops at local universities, in the Sixth Form area and remotely via Teams. Students are regularly given the opportunity to look at further opportunities to prepare for life beyond Sixth Form, including a dedicated KS5 careers fair held in the school.
- Reece Scholarships, which are awarded to students who show an aptitude in and talent for Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths subjects, and who have an interest in pursuing Engineering at university. This prestigious award gives students the opportunity to work with companies on 'live' engineering tasks.
- A thorough 'Aspire to Oxbridge' programme to prepare a high-quality Oxbridge and Russell Group university application, including residential visits to Oxford and Cambridge Universities and mock interviews.
- A dedicated 'Medicine and Dentistry' society run in collaboration with the Science Department to give students an insight of these careers, opportunities to build their experience in these fields and support in the application process for these competitive courses.
- Successful summer school placements at various leading universities including the Durham Progression Scheme and UNIQ, the summer school at Oxford University. Student involvement with the Sutton Trust Programme has allowed students to experience university summer school in America. Students have applied to leading universities in America with the support of the Sutton Trust.

Progression


At St Mary's, we take very seriously the responsibility that we have to ensure students are well-prepared for whatever they plan to do after school. Whether that is university, an apprenticeship or a job, we want our students to use the skills they develop during their time with us. We spend time during our Pastoral Programme, in our form activities and in special form time briefings developing future employability skills with our students and offer the students chances to experience opportunity to give their future decisions.

We have an excellent record for students securing places at their first-choice university. For those who decide that university is not for them, we have an employability group that meets a designated member of staff regularly to discuss interview techniques and CV writing. Students are supported as they attempt to secure apprenticeships, internships and employment.

Our significant revamp of the Sixth Form area, include a Sixth Form Café, Sixth Form Work Area, Sixth Form Library, Sixth Form Quiet Area and Sixth Form Supervised Study Room. These rooms also have advanced ICT facilities for the students to use. The new facilities have proved to be a success with the Sixth Form, and this new space is a very impressive addition to our already outstanding facilities.



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Curriculum 2022-2023

From September 2022

Each year, we welcome approximately 140-160 students into the Sixth Form. This group is largely made up of students from our current Year 11 with, additionally, a small number of students who join us from other local schools.

Students joining us in September will be placed on a pathway that you can read about in further detail below. For most, this will involve studying 3 A-levels, or their equivalent, during Year 12 and Year 13. A very small, select, number of students may opt for 4 A-levels.

For students starting Year 12 in September 2022, all A-levels will be linear. This will involve studying for courses for which the content is assessed entirely by examination at the end of Year 13 in June 2023.

Choosing the right pathway and subjects is, therefore, vitally important.

Pathways

We work closely with all students to give them individual guidance on their subject choices. It is very important that students start with an appropriate programme of study. We have to balance a number of elements, including aspirations and interests, with the relative difficulty of courses in order to ensure that our students leave St Mary's having achieved their full potential.

We use a range of national data in order to identify the relative difficulty of subjects. This information is then used to guide students towards choosing a suite of subjects for which they are suitable. At St Mary's we offer the following pathways to students:

- 4 A-levels
- 3 A-levels and an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)
- 3 A-levels
- A combination of A-levels and vocational courses
- 3 vocational courses.

Students are directed towards a pathway and advised to pick subjects based on their GCSE performance and their average GCSE grade. Many students at St Mary's complete 3 A-levels and an EPQ.

Entry Requirements

Students who join our Sixth Form do so voluntarily. In signing up for Sixth Form, therefore, students agree to abide by all of the general requirements of students at our school. The decision to join Sixth Form should be carefully considered. Our high expectations of all students in school extends also to Sixth Form students. All Sixth Form students are

expected to adhere to the Sixth Form Code of Discipline throughout their time in the Sixth Form. An excellent work ethic, attendance and punctuality record are all essential for success, as is a contribution to the wider dimension of Sixth Form life, such as full attendance at, and participation in, all aspects of our Core Curriculum and support for the school ethos. A student with poor attendance (unless there are genuine medical reasons), poor punctuality or a poor work ethic in Year 11 is unlikely to succeed in Sixth Form where the academic demands are greater. Throughout Year 11, all of these factors will be reviewed and, if necessary, discussed with students during the transition to the Sixth Form process.

For each specific course in Sixth Form, entry requirements will vary, depending on the degree of difficulty of the course, as well as each student's track record over their two years' study of the subject in Key Stage 4. The 'make up' of a student's GCSE grade in the subject is evaluated too. For example, a student may have a 6 overall at GCSE in a particular subject that they wish to pursue at A-level but, if the key written exam component was a 5, our strong advice might well be not to take the subject at A-level, if extended writing is a key feature of the A-level. Some courses will require a higher minimum entry grade, either in the subject itself or in a related subject. For example, entry to certain Science courses will have a minimum requirement not only in Science, but in Mathematics too, given the degree of Mathematics involved in the A-level. Many subjects will have a minimum requirement in English if written work is a key feature of the A-level. Finally, we also look very closely at the combination of A-levels that a student is proposing to study. For example, we may feel that a student has the potential to succeed in one of the harder A-levels, but a combination of two or three such subjects may well prove too much and, in such cases, we may well advise strongly against the proposed combination.

In general, students are most likely to succeed on the traditional academic A-levels if they have obtained GCSEs that include, as a minimum, a number of grades in the 7-9 range and some at grade 6. Ideally, a student would have a 7 or better in their chosen subject, but some of these subjects may consider a 6 if there is evidence of strong performance in some of the key components of the GCSE or of mitigating circumstances that affected the GCSE grade. In a number of A-levels (for instance, some with a strong practical component), grade 6 or above will be considered and, exceptionally, a grade 5. Students achieving grades largely in the 4-6 range will be best suited to our vocational courses. Further information about individual courses is contained in the Curriculum booklet and, throughout Year 11, entry requirements and their suitability for different subjects will be discussed with students.

Our curriculum is reviewed regularly, and subjects being offered are subject to viability. For further information on subjects, please refer to the booklet included in this prospectus. Our Core Curriculum is part of what makes our Sixth Form distinctive, as all students also study as part of their timetable Religious Education, Sport, and the Pastoral Programme. Students are encouraged to take part in a wide and varied Enrichment Programme including our Student Leadership Scheme where students are encouraged to lead Main School students in activities and provide service to the local community. This curriculum provides excellent foundations for studying in the Sixth Form and allows the students the opportunity to develop a variety of skills

that will enhance their overall Sixth Form experience.

Core Curriculum

NOCN Level 3 Award in Religious Education

All students in the Sixth Form continue to study Religious Education. As part of a Catholic Sixth Form, students are encouraged to study and reflect upon moral, ethical and philosophical issues that have an impact on our lives. Studying RE provides students with an opportunity to explore the pressing and relevant issues of a modern society, as well as

to share and develop their own understanding of living by the Gospel values in a modern world.

We begin by developing further an understanding of spirituality, theology and ethics that continues from our work at GCSE. As a part of this, students are taught to understand the demands of religious commitment in everyday life and to consider different faith traditions within contemporary society. Moving from Year 12 to Year 13, we extend our work to focussing on the relationship between religious belief, personal faith and lived experience. The course is also focussed on putting faith into action, and so there are opportunities for students to take on Service Tasks in the school and local communities in a practical way. Students leave St Mary's with a national Level 3 qualification in Religious Education.

Sport

Keeping fit is central to a healthy life so we encourage all students to keep fit and take part in sport, whatever their ability or interest. In doing so, they are able to develop self-confidence, learn the importance of teamwork and explore their own strengths. All students are encouraged to engage in a wide variety of sports and physical education opportunities throughout the year. Students will be provided with an opportunity two hours a fortnight to participate in a variety of recreational sporting activities, including activities off-site.

Pastoral Programme

Our varied and exciting Pastoral Programme offers students the opportunity to develop skills that will help them in their studies and in their preparations for life after Sixth Form. Students spend two hours a fortnight in the Pastoral Programme.

The intent of the Pastoral Programme curriculum is to prepare our students for the modern world. This includes ensuring students are well versed in issues prevalent in the modern world, have the appropriate skills for employment and further education, understand the responsibility of adulthood and are well prepared for any academic assessment.

This programme will make a critical contribution to helping them shape their future as a fulfilled and open-minded people who are ready for the next stage of their life. There are 4 key areas to the Pastoral Programme curriculum:

Knowing the World

Entering the World

Preparing for the World

Being in the World

Choosing your subjects

What subjects should you choose?

Picking subjects to study in the Sixth Form can be a difficult task and requires careful consideration. Here, we offer some advice and key questions to ask when thinking about which subjects you might want to choose.

Which subjects do you enjoy the most?

The amount of time you will have to spend studying your subjects in Sixth Form means you should pick subjects you enjoy. In Year 12, you will have nine hours for each A-level every fortnight. In Year 13, this increases to ten hours. You should then look to ensure these are subjects that you will be able to cope with at a higher level, you enjoy learning in, and that you meet the entry requirements for the course.

In which subjects are you expecting to excel?

Your predicted performance in your GCSE subjects will be a real indicator as to what you want to study at A-level. The work you do at GCSE will lay the foundations for the work in the Sixth Form. Talk to your teachers to discuss whether they think it would be suitable for you to study their subject in the Sixth Form.

Do you have a career / university course in mind?

Do you require specific subjects? Some degree courses specify subjects that should be taken in the Sixth Form. For example, to study Medicine you will need to secure a high grade in Chemistry. Think carefully about what you may want to do after Sixth Form and then look to see if you are required to have certain subjects. If you do not yet know what you

want to do after Sixth Form, then opting for a range of types of subjects will help keep your options open. You will, of course, have to ensure you meet the entry requirements for these courses.

What subjects will be most useful and will give you the best chance at success?

As mentioned above, it might be that you want to keep your options open for when you make decisions about life after Sixth Form. Think carefully about the combinations of subjects you are studying too. Russell Group universities have published a guide of what they call 'facilitating subjects', which are subjects that they think will help prepare students for the demands of an undergraduate course. These subjects include: English Literature, History, Modern Foreign Languages, Geography, Maths, Further Maths, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. However, you can secure a place at leading

universities having not studied these subjects. It is important to get a balance between the subjects you enjoy, have the best chance to succeed in, and that will be relevant to you for the next stage of your life.

Who can you talk to about your options?

All students in Year 11 at St Mary's will complete an online form to outline their current plans for September, including the Sixth Form options they are currently interested in studying next year.

Students will then have the opportunity to discuss their options with a member of the St Mary's Pastoral Team or the Sixth Form Pastoral Team. They will guide you and discuss with you the most appropriate options and pathways. Remember, discussing your options with teachers will also help you to get a good idea of what is involved in a subject in the Sixth Form and your suitability for it.



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Extra-Curricular

Sixth Form Sport

There are many opportunities to develop sporting interests at St Mary's. We currently have a very successful basketball team as well as netball and football teams. Sixth Form students have been very keen, in the past couple of years, to organise a range of charitable sporting fixtures. Not only do we offer a range of team sports, but students also have access to a modern, state-of-the-art gym. Students who have a keen interest in sport and fitness are encouraged to share their expertise by taking on a Sports Leader role. With this responsibility, students help other students as well as staff to use the gym or could help run a sporting activity, such as Running Club, which involve students from the Main School. Students who are talented in sport and who compete at a high level are supported by the school.

Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award

We are pleased to be able to offer students the opportunity to pursue the Duke of Edinburgh Award. This well-recognised and highly valued award offers students the chance to develop a variety of life skills. They will take part in voluntary work, sport, and expeditions, and has proven extremely popular since its introduction to the Sixth Form.





Drama and Music

Sixth-formers enjoy taking part in drama productions. We have many talented musicians in our student body and there are also various opportunities to take part in the orchestra and the school choir.

Student Leadership Team

All Sixth Form students are expected to participate in the Student Leadership Scheme. As the most senior students in the school, Sixth Form students are expected to act as positive role models for all other students in the school community guiding them both academically and pastorally. Students are entrusted with leadership roles in various aspects of school life, with activities such as running extracurricular activities, acting as classroom assistants, and assisting the duty staff. It is of paramount importance that Sixth Form students are visible in all aspects of day-to-day school life to assist and enrich the experience of other students whilst preparing them for leading others in the modern world.





Leadership Committee

Sixth Form students are also encouraged to become involved in leadership, by taking on key roles and responsibilities within school. The Sixth Form Leadership Team is a visible and respected group of students whose presence can be seen across a huge variety of school events. Students are asked to apply for a position on the Sixth Form Leadership Team in Year 12 and fulfil their responsibilities until they must focus on their preparations for their examinations at the end of Year 13.



Sixth Form Dress Code

We are extremely proud of the way in which our Sixth Form students present themselves, both in school and more widely. Our dress code ensures that our Sixth Form students lead by example in school, as mature young adults who are role models for our younger students. Our Sixth Form dress code helps to create a purposeful, academic environment in which our students are able to achieve highly, both academically and holistically. The dress code also helps to prepare our students for the world of work, where the vast majority of professional workplaces expect such attire. Students take great pride in their appearance and the dress code standards at St Mary's are excellent. We appreciate the support of parents in ensuring that students always follow the dress code below.

Dress Code

- · Plain, dark smart tailored/suit trousers.
- · Dark suit jacket or blazer jacket.
- · Plain formal shirt with collar in white, black, grey, blue, or cream.
- · Tie.

OR

- \cdot Plain, dark smart tailored/suit trousers or skirt, or plain, dark knee length dress.
- · No skirts or dresses higher than 2 inches above the knee.
- · Dark suit jacket or blazer jacket.
- \cdot Plain formal shirt or blouse with collar in white, black, grey, blue, or cream.

Hairstyles/Accessories/Make up

- \cdot Neat, sensible hair styles only. No 'extreme' haircuts.
- · Natural hair colour only.
- \cdot A student who, for religious reasons, wears a head covering, must ensure that it is a dark colour.
- · Only one pair of stud earrings. No other piercings.

In July 2019, nineteen Year 12 students travelled to Zambia to work on a life-changing expedition project for the local community of Sinazongwe. During the expedition, students built a chicken coop food, storage building for Chisyabulungu Community School. The eggs are sold to the local villagers, with the profit being spent on educational resources for the school. Being able to buy the chicken feed in bulk and store this on site will save them money, which can then be spent on resources for the students too. As well as the main building project, students taught English and Maths to a wide range of age groups, and organised a Sports Day for the local children. In the months leading up to the expedition, students organised and participated in a variety of fundraising events, both in school and
