The two-day trip ended in the History of Science Museum where, among other fascinating items, the students looked at a blackboard containing lecture notes by Albert Einstein.

### **Mock Trials Success**

A talented team of Year 12 students competed in this year's Bar Mock Trials Competition, which was organised by Young Citizens.

The budding barristers were tasked with preparing both the prosecution and defence cases for two criminal trials. The cases, both devised especially for the competition, were written to challenge the students in various aspects of the law and legal procedure. The first case involved a charge of witness intimidation and the second was a trial centred round an allegation of actual bodily harm.

St Mary's prosecution and defence teams performed brilliantly across both cases. They took on a number of roles, including that of barrister, court clerk and usher, and delivered a range of extremely well-prepared opening speeches and showed quick-witted thinking when cross-examining witnesses.

The students' ability to adapt their lines of reasoning was commended by the real-life judges, one of whom commented that the standard of argument and performance was at the level of an undergraduate. The judges also singled out St Mary's witnesses for being well-briefed and remaining very calm under questioning.

The competition gave the students a fascinating insight into the workings of a criminal court. All the team did superbly well in both their preparations and performances during a gruelling day. The sophistication of the team's arguments and the confidence with which they were delivered were a real strength and led the students to win two of their three trials.

### **Chess Team Through To Two Finals**

St Mary's has enjoyed amazing success in chess this term in two national competitions. In the regional final of the prestigious Under-19 National Schools Chess Championships, which was held late in March, the school's 'A' team beat the Royal Grammar School 4–2 in a nail-biting match. RGS has been the local dominant force in chess for decades and so this victory for St Mary's can, without any exaggeration, be defined as historic.

Daniel Francis, St Mary's Board 4, opened the score with a convincing win after claiming a rook. For a few minutes St Mary's threatened to go 2–0 up when Feitong Wu on Board 3 went ahead by a knight, but his opponent played an astounding sacrifice to win by checkmate. Equally thrilling was Hyunwoo Lee's amazing fightback on Board 6 when, looking down and out, he somehow conjured an attack that gave St Mary's a 2–1 edge.

On Board 5, Jonathan Jativa-Calle placed St Mary's firmly in the driving seat with a comfortable win. This meant that, with two games remaining, a single draw would suffice to end RGS's involvement in this year's tournament. However, St Mary's top player, Ciaran Macdonald, succumbed to a sustained assault and so everything rested on the outcome of the Board 2 encounter.

In a tense match, Alexander Johnston went into his endgame two pawns up but had to sacrifice his remaining rook to prevent his opponent from promoting a passed pawn. This created an unusual battle between a king and four connected kingside pawns against a king and rook. Thankfully, the marching pawns proved too strong and so, with seconds remaining on both clocks, the RGS player graciously resigned. With this win, St Mary's secured its place as one of only twenty schools – among them Eton, Winchester, Westminster and St Paul's – that will compete across two days this summer in the national final.

Less than a week after claiming this famous victory, and showing that success breeds success, Ciaran, Alexander, Feitong and Daniel won the regional heat of the National Schools Team Chess Challenge. This was held at St Mary's and involved sixteen teams, each containing four players, from nine schools who had travelled to Longbenton from as far away as Berwick and Hexham.

Going into the last of four rapidplay rounds, St Mary's 'A' — with a score of 11/12 — were in second place to RGS 'A'. However, St Mary's beat their nearest rivals by 3.5—0.5 to win the competition outright with a score of 14.5/16. The school's 'B' team — Hyunwoo Lee, Harry Keller, Alistair Craggs and Jan Siemens — also did well to finish in equal-fifth place on 11.5 points. The 'A' team will now compete in the national final of the Team Chess Challenge at Imperial College London in September.

### **Theatre Trip**

It was a real joy to see some live theatre for the first time in two years and this production had everyone smiling and talking. Seeing the play has really helped to bring to life the heart-warming story of Christopher on his journey of self-discovery. All the students have continued discussions in the classroom with their teachers as they analyse the text for their GCSE course.



## **TICE Fashion Project**

Design and Technology students in Years 9 and 10 pupils have recently worked for ten weeks on This Is Creative Enterprise fashion projects in partnership with the Royal Grammar School. Some opted for the challenge as part of their Duke of Edinburgh skills element; others just wanted to know more about design.

The students were given a number of options for their projects and chose the following: 'Muses and Movements', 'Retold Vintage', 'Romeo and Juliet', 'Go Back and Step Ahead' and 'Fable'. All the design briefs were described in detail and related to different aspects of the fashion industry.

Before starting their projects, the students attended a workshop at the RGS to learn about the industry. They were also given information on the key skills – including sketching and modelling, branding and presenting ideas – that are needed to succeed in fashion.

The students were guided through online presentations by people working in the industry and by academics. They even managed to visit the University of Northumbria's School of Fashion to work directly with the mentors and to attend sessions on, for example, fashion illustration, journalism, copywriting and photographic styling.
