#### Task 1


Here is an example of the first verse:




Task 2

<u>Activities we have played in class:</u>

**Sets of times tables flash cards** (matching pairs; Snap; Memory etc)

# Design Technology

<u>Planning:</u> Following on from last week, where you investigated different board games, this week we will be planning what our board game will be. We need to have a clear idea about the theme of the game; the rules of the game; any instructions you need to give the players, and how the game would be won or lost.


<u>Theme:</u> Is your board game based around a certain theme, for example geography (e.g. capital cities); a particular TV programme or game (e.g. Minecraft); a certain setting to inspire your game (e.g. Treasure island – pirates, or a Jungle scenario)? Think about what interests you, and try to be really specific.

<u>Rules</u>: These need to be really specific, and should be numbered to make it easy for the players to understand. You need to think about: the number of players; who starts; how the characters move around the board; if you use a dice to move or a spinner; if there are challenge cards that players may land on, in which case you need to explain what each card does.

<u>Materials</u>: What materials will you need in order to make your board game? Try to be realistic with what you will need, so you will be able to make a prototype (example) next week.

Once you have all the above organised, ask a family member to read through your rules to check they make sense. They may also have some suggestions about things that you may have missed or could be improved. Make sure you are as ready as you can be for the making stage next week!
