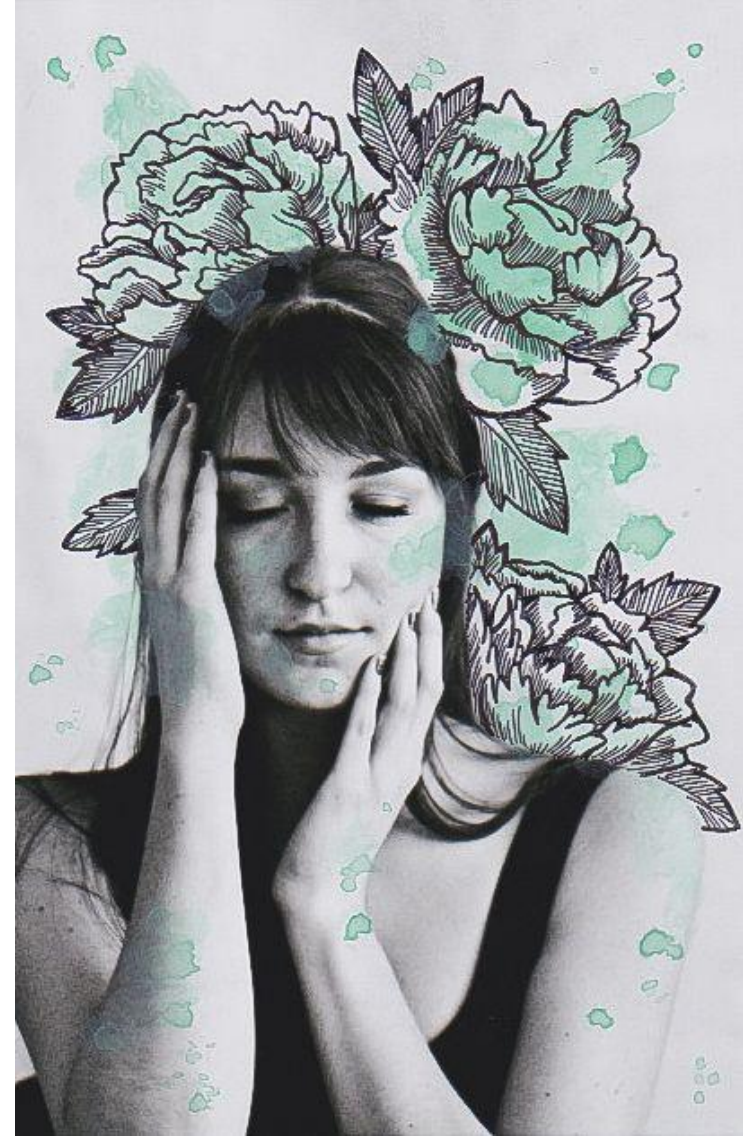




The G.C.S.E.

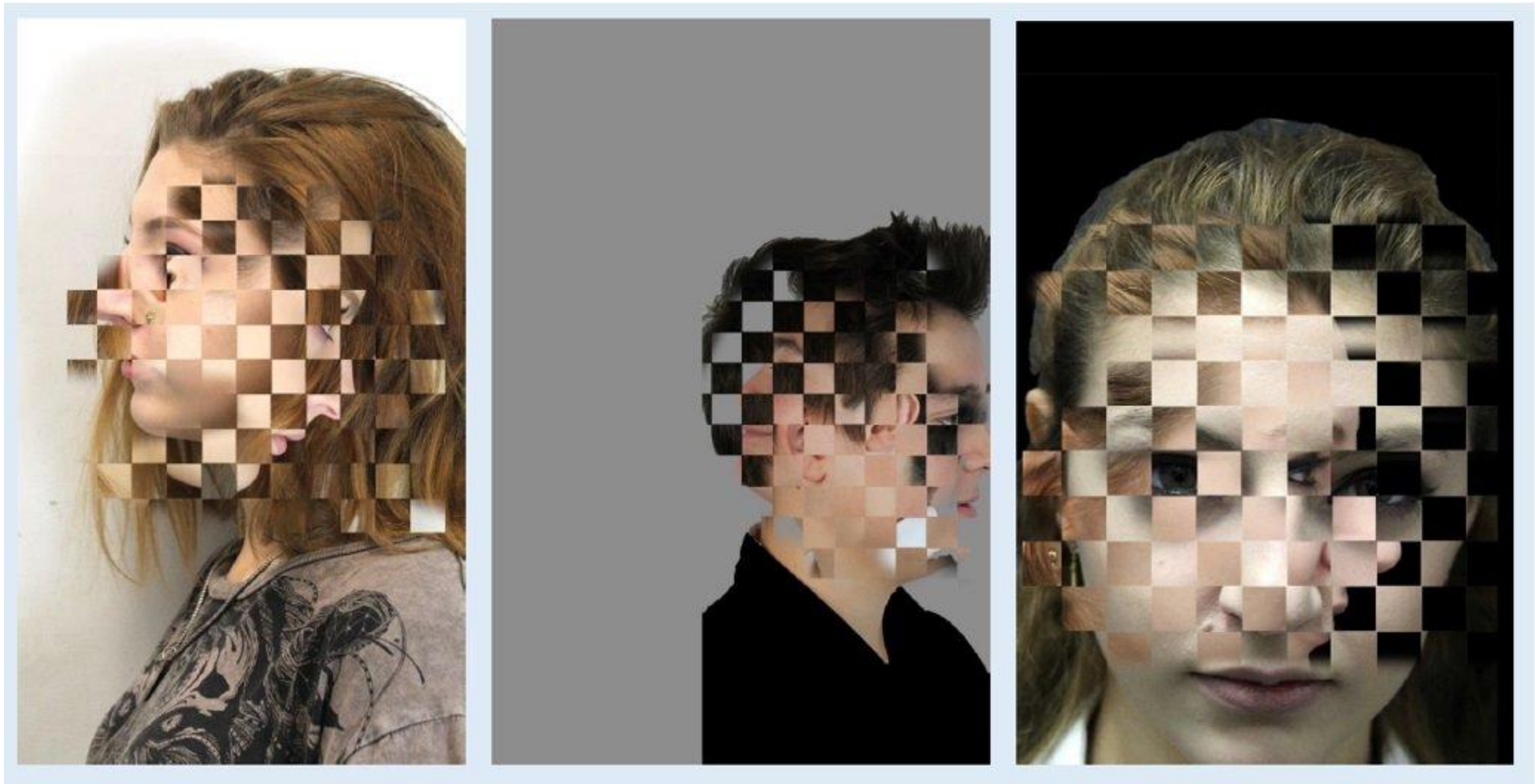

Unit 2: Externally Set Assignment (Examination project) = 40% of the final grade.

In **January**, Year 11 students get their exam project title from the exam board. They then spend **10 weeks** developing techniques and ideas in the sketchbook. Students then use the 10 week preparatory sketchbook in the exam to make a successful final piece.
