School Opening update

Our school continues to be open for pupils whose parents are keyworkers. At this point we are at capacity for the number of pupils we can safely have in school and maintain social distancing. We have to ensure that all members of our school community are safe and therefore will not yet be opening to any other pupils. We are reviewing this situation regularly, following guidance from the Department for Education and Central Bedfordshire Council, and as soon as we are able, will begin to invite more pupils into school. We will keep parents and carers updated on this situation.

Science Curriculum: Year 5 and Year 7

Year 5 will be this term be exploring the curriculum strand 'Animals including humans'. This will include sections on changes during puberty and will include words such as 'asexual' and 'sexual reproduction' but will not go into lots of detail. Your child may have questions at this time so you may wish to discuss some of these points before they begin the work.

Year 7 will this term be exploring sexual reproduction in more detail having briefly covered this topic previously in Year 5. Your child may have questions and you may wish to discuss this topic before they begin the work.
