


Parking Off Site

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about GE RESTRICTION

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

WhatsApp is a free messaging service owned by Meta which allows users to send text and voice messages, make video calls, share multimedia – such as images, videos, documents and polls and have group chats. WhatsApp messages are encrypted, meaning only you and the recipient can view what is sent. While this privacy may sound attractive on paper, this app unfortunately

EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious emergency' and even cons where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to hatsApp, call or text to ask you to repeat the code back to them, giving them access to your rivate messages and personal information.

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FAKE NA

CHANNELS

hannels let users follow interests without sharing their phone numbers or sending direct messages, allowing only votes on polls and reacting to posts with emojis. However, fraudulent channels can impersonate legitimate organizations, tricking people into sharing personal data and even spreading misinformation or hate speech. Additionally, WhatsApp may collect details about followed channels and sell this information to third arties, raising data privacy concerns

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly – whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more "Forwarded many times on the app now display a "Forwarded many times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just received is far from an priginal – and might not be entirely factual aither

comes with several risks that must be considered - especially for younger users

CHAT LOCK

users to store certain messages or chats in a separate 'locked chats' folder, saved behind a asscode, fingerprint or face ID authentication While this usually functions as intended, it can potentially be exploited by younger users to hide conversions and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of – such as the sharing of age-inappropriate material.

DISAPPEARING MESSAGES

Disappearing messages are useful for sharing personal or sensitive information, but young people may have a false sense of privacy regarding the content they share. These messages disappear after anywhere from 24 hours to 90 days – depending on the user's preference – or can even be set to be viewed one message by bookmarking or screenshotting it. making them not as private as they may appear

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's 'live location' feature lets users helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely on the way home, for example. However, children are able to share their location with anyone in their ontacts list or a mutual group – potentially otting strangers identify their live location.

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage children to treat unexpected messages with caution. Get them to consider, for example, whether it sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step erification adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

2 It's wise to change a child's WhatsApp settings to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval. To do this, go to Privacy, then Groups. You can give permission to My Contacts or ontacts Except Additionally if the child needs to use live location, emphasis is function for only as long as they need - and then turn it off.

Careers Events

Year 7 welcomed Jack Dove from MBDA in Stevenage. Jack is a senior engineer specialising in airborne systems. He shared with pupils the many different careers associated with space from those people who work on the ground to design, engineer and build spacecraft to those lucky enough to travel in space. He even shared how personal trainers, chefs, medical staff and teachers all have roles in shaping space travel for the future.

It was very inspiring to hear Jack share his personal experiences especially in his struggles as someone who is neurodiverse. He explained that whilst this presented challenges, he has never let it hold him back or stopped him from seizing opportunities.





Alan Crist from hi-impact ran a workshop with Year 6 pupils where they learnt how to be engineers and built satellites that gathered data from the local environment. This workshop was run in conjunction with the RAF youth impact team who aim to encourage more young people to consider a future in engineering.

It was impressive to see such wonderful team work amongst the pupils who worked hard to achieve a great deal in short space of time.

Careers Fair

Industry Spotlight: Rail Industry



As a town with a major rail network station, a career in the rail industry might seem particularly appealing. The UK as a whole is hugely dependent on its railways with millions of people using the network every day. With the growing desire to tackle climate change, rail is a very green form of transport so investment into the system will continue to grow. This means that the sector will continue to grow. The rail industry has a wide number of job roles so it's not just all about being a train driver. Below we explore just some of the different roles available within the rail industry.

Rail Engineer

Role overview:

Engineers help design, construct, maintain and improve railway systems. They ensure that trains can operate safely and efficiently. They work on tracks, signals and the trains themselves.

Qualification Routes:

- Degree: Civil, mechanical, electrical or other related engineering degree.
- Apprenticeships: Level 3: Rail Engineering Technician

Level 6: Rail and Rail Systems Engineering

- T Levels: Engineering and Manufacturing
- BTECs: Rail Engineering Technician Specialist

Salary

Average: £30,016

Skills Needed:

- Communication
- Good understanding of health and safety
- Teamwork

Railway Station Employee

Role overview:

Working on railways platform or in railway offices with a strong emphasis on customer service. Employees greet passengers and help with enquiries. The role is varied from helping to sell tickets, to making passenger announcements and answering general queries.

Qualification Routes:

 No specific qualifications are required for this role but employers will expect a good standard of English and maths and may value previous customer service or retail experience.

Skills Needed:

- Excellent communication
- Calm under pressure

Train Conductor

Role overview:

Ensures safe and comfortable passenger journeys by checking tickets, answering questions, making announcements, and ensuring the train is ready for departure, while also dealing with any issues that arise during the trip.

Qualification Routes:

• While there are **no specific**, **mandatory entry qualifications** to become a train conductor in the UK, employers generally expect a good standard of English and maths, and may test communication and customer service skills during the interview process.

Railway Operations

Role overview:

Encompasses a wide array of roles and activities necessary to ensure the safe and efficient movement of trains and rail traffic, including infrastructure maintenance, signalling, control, and customer service.

- Apprenticeships: Level 3: Railway Infrastructure Operations

Salary Entry-Level Salary: £24,000 Experienced Salary: £48,000-£50,000+

Skills Needed:

- Problem solving
- Attention to detail
- Adaptability

Train Driver

Role overview:

Primary responsibility is to safely and efficiently operate a train, following routes, schedules, and regulations, while ensuring passenger safety and comfort.

Qualification Routes:

 You do not need a specific academic qualification but will be expected to have a good standard of English and maths at GCSE level. You will need to pass extensive training to be able to drive a train but to also understand the industry regulations. You will also need to take and pass medical and psychometric tests.

Skills Needed:
