## Homework:

Reading: Ideally, children should be reading daily; however, we understand that this may not always be possible and therefore we set an expectation for children to read at home for a minimum of 4 times per week. Children should bring their reading record and book into school daily. An adult should sign the childs reading record weekly. These will be checked and signed by a school adult. Reading records will be checked and books changed on a Wednesday during Autumn 1 and a Monday for the rest of the year. If the reading record has not been handed in, not been signed by a parent/guardian or does not evidence that the child has read at least 4 times in a week at home, children will be given a chance to do so by the next day or attend reading club during their break time.

<u>Spelling:</u> Every Monday, Year 3 will be tested on their spelling. This test will consist of 5 words from the Y3/4 statutory word list (set the Monday before) and 5 words that are chosen in relation to the spelling rule that we have been focusing on in lessons that week.

<u>Times tables:</u> TT Rockstars will be set online on a Monday and due to be completed by the following Monday. <u>Writing:</u> As in Year 2, the children will receive writing homework each week. This consists of writing 3–5 sentences based around a task provided on a sticker inside the book. These books are due in on a Monday and will be sent out with a new task on Wednesday. We expect the children to keep these in good condition and hold the same expectations for homework presentation as we do in lessons. Children should write their homework in pencil.

<u>Uniform:</u> Please ensure that all uniform, lunchboxes, water bottles etc are name labelled. This helps us to ensure that items can be returned. A copy of the uniform policy was sent out with the newsletter on the first week of term. Please encourage your child to take pride in their appearance and represent the school with pride when in their uniform.

Attendance: Regular attendance is vital for your child's success in school. Every day offers new learning opportunities, and frequent absences can cause children to fall behind in both their academic progress and their social development. Consistency is key in building skills and confidence, and missing lessons can make it harder for children to keep up with the pace of Year 3. We kindly ask that you prioritize attendance to ensure your child has the best chance to reach their full potential and make the most of this exciting year of growth.

<u>First Holy Communion:</u> We're excited to begin preparations for the children's First Holy Communion, with more details to follow once everything is confirmed. Although preparations will likely start a bit later this year, the Commitment Mass is scheduled for the 13th of October. We encourage parents and children to reflect on whether they are ready to make this important step. Father Paul is looking forward to seeing a strong commitment to faith, parish life, and regular Mass attendance, and this year presents a wonderful opportunity for families to deepen their involvement.
