Year 11 and the future

Students in year 11 have been completing a 'VESPA' Skills Project over the last 2 weeks. A task is set daily for students to complete. We have had some amazing work from our students. Next week students will enter the last week of their project and will then be set new learning depending on the pathway they will be taking next year.

Two pathways; a BRIDGING group for students whose aim is to study at A-level, and a BRANCHING group for students who hope to study on college courses or on an apprenticeship. Students have nearly all now completed a google survey so we can see which pathway they are following. Please ensure that your child has completed this so that we can ensure that we have your child in the correct group. In addition to this some students have opted to continue their GCSE studies, supported by a subject specialist, as they might wish to challenge themselves in the new Autumn Exam series (further information should be shared in the coming weeks by Ofqual).

If your child has been set specific transition work for a new

college or Sixth Form please ask them to inform their Year 11 tutor.




