

Welcome

15th May 2020 This week has been an incredible week to work in education and I am certain this has been a similar experience across many other professions. Following the Prime Minister's announcement on Sunday 10th May about the government's aspiration to re-open schools to more pupils (in exam years 10 and 12), some guidance papers for education and childcare settings have been shared for widening participation, though we await the details. Our school has never been closed, we have remained open throughout the 'lockdown' for specific groups of students and children of key workers. This provision continues so do contact us (attendance@bosworthacademy.org.uk) if you are a key worker and have returned to work and require supervised childcare.

Weekly Newsletter for parents & Students We know as parents and carers you are doing your very best to support home learning, (and doing magnificently well), but we also understand that being at school is a great place to learn and enables those important social interactions for your child with their peers.

We do want to see children back in school but this must be at a time when scientific advice confirms that this is safe for all. Since I wrote to you on 12th May we have made some progress with our possible planning of scenarios for more children returning to school and in developing a risk mitigation plan. We are not preparing for a specific date to widen student participation, this will be guided by science, but are directly addressing risks associated with coronavirus so that sensible measures can be put in place to minimise those risks for our young people and staff.

This week we have set out some of our classroom blocks with a socially distanced seating plan, so that all single classrooms sit no more than 10 students, (though the government advice is 15). We have started to introduce a one way system in our corridors for movement around our building, with regular 2m apart floor markings. In the canteen we have set-up a different table arrangement to allow for 2m social distancing, and taped lines for queuing like in supermarkets. We are well-stocked with sanitisers, soap, cleaning materials and of course toilet roll.

We are currently looking at scenarios for widening the numbers of year 10 and 12 students that can have some face to face support in school. We are hoping we can bring every student in those year groups into school at least once a week for a session,

possibly for a morning or an afternoon. Whole year groups will not be in school at one time. Once in school we aim to evaluate their progress with home learning, and provide expert curriculum input on key learning points to enable improved progress once they return to home learning for the remainder of their week. Depending again on the government, backed by scientific advice, we would love to be able to offer this wider provision to years 7, 8 and 9 but at present unfortunately there are no plans for this.

> We will endeavour to do all we can to provide high quality home learning for all. Next week we intend to issue a google form to collect some parental feedback on how we can improve our provision further to continually strengthen how we meet the needs of our children.

I'll conclude where I began, with this apt quote, "There are decades where nothing happens; there are weeks where decades happen." Vladimir Lenin, Russian politician, (for our Historian students). I think you'll know what that means - it's been an eventful week in our history!

Widening Participation Transport

Florence Nightingale

On 16th March I spoke to all staff in our weekly Monday morning briefing about this remarkable woman, Florence Nightingale. I shared this quote from Florence;



"How very little can be done under the spirit of fear."

My aim, like Florence's in the mid-19th century, was as a rally cry as her nurses faced the spread of disease during the Crimean War. Back in March our teachers and support staff were bravely aiming to keep our children safe whilst at school, continuing to love learning, with all the angst and trauma growing around us because of coronavirus.

This week it was the 200th Anniversary of Florence's birth. Florence is remembered as the founder of modern nursing, but she was so much more; a female icon in her own lifetime, a healthcare pioneer, an influential statistician, a trailblazer and a leader. Nuffield Research Placements are engaging, hands-on research projects, where students have the opportunity to make a meaningful contribution to the work of a host organisation. They are a fantastic opportunity for students to apply skills and knowledge learned at school and work alongside researchers and industry professionals.

The programme has had to be fine-tuned due to the current situation and has been rebranded as The Nuffield Future Researcher programme. It will provide a meaningful and rewarding research experience where students will develop essential science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) skills by working with a professional researcher on a live research question and embark on new and innovative ways of working within a virtual learning environment.

Fabien is very excited to be working with the PhD researcher, Simon Joyce, and the lecturer Dr Johnathan Nichols, on a project entitled 'How do stars affect the chances of life on exoplanets?'. This is an area of current research and also links to the A2 Physics specification.


On our return it is vital we return to 'where we were' as quickly as possible, and getting the uniform right is critical in this.
